Of course, roses are favorites of nearly everyone. A nd, they can be beautifully grown here on the high plains. Given careful attention, 10 well
chosen varieties will produce as many flowers and produce more pleasure than 50 poorly tended plants.
Roses may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is preferred to let the plants become well established in the soil before the grow ing season (and dry spring
