2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 stick marga
1 stick margarine
1 cup water
$1 / 2$ cup shortening
$31 / 2$ tables
$31 / 2$ tablespoons cocoa (or $1 / 4$ cup chocolate syrup)
1/2 cup buttermilk

## 2 egg

teaspoon soda
teaspoon vanilla (or 1 teaspoon cinnamon)
Combine sugar and flour in a large bowl. Do not use mixer in a saucepan, combine margarine, water, shortening and co coa; bring to a boil. Pour over flour mixture. Combine renaining ingredients; add to batter and blend thoroughly. Pour into $12^{\circ} \times 18^{\prime \prime}$ greased pan.

you will be wasting mutrition you will be wasting nutrition fuel.
How much you should spend on food varies with each individual family, Keeping re cords of the money you spend for food alone will help you analyze your food spending, the food plan you make to get an accurate picture. With Atlanta in the lead Georgia was making great progress in his transition period of race relations.
But then Stokely Carmichael went to Atlanta, a riot ensued fine Mayor and a progressive city were thrown into turmoil. There was a "backlash" and Mayor Ivan Allen says of "Mean" Maddox that he is probably the least competent, most unfit candidate to be offered Georgia voters in decades. The Maddox victory is not, unfortunately, simply limited to eorgia. In Maryland a splendid candidate elged out by a racist. There are signs of more such results in tight races elsewhere in the country, in from the backlash.
What will the end result be? On the oubtedly means no more new civil rights legislation for a long time to come.
But more than that it may also mean that those whites who have been so active in helping the civil rights movement wil ose interest, repudiated on all sides, by the segregationist Negroes.
