## Homemaking Notes

Can you get better nutrition for your family without spending more money for food?
You may be able if you are willing to spend some time planning and informing yourself. In many cases you will be able to spend fewer dollars and eat better for the money you spend.

you spend,
First, base your plan on an adequate diet. A list of foods you should eat each day to be well nourished is listed in several Extension Bulletins available from my office"Food For Fitness", "Nutrition Up To Date. Up To You" Food For Fitness", "Nutri-tion Up To Date, Up To You"

ure" and others.

Do you use a food plan to see what your family needs?

A food plan helps you know that over a long periof of time you are getting enough essential foods and not too much sugars, fats and starch-

es.

Knowledge on making intelligent substitutions on basis of nutritional values may pay big dividends.

Are you using up-to-date methods for food preparation? If you overcook your food, you will be wasting nutritional value as well as time and finel.

fuel.

How much you should spend on food varies with each individual family. Keeping records of the money you spend for food alone will help you analyze your food spending. Compare your expenses with the food plan you make to get an accurate picture.

Try keeping a record of food bills for at least one week (food only-don't include soap, cleaning supplies,

cigarettes, etc.) Repeat at
2 or 3 month intervals to help
guide your food spending.

If you plan ahead for the
food you buy, and make your
grocery list from these plans,
most families can cut down
lots of expense. It helps counter any impulse buying you
do.

do.

In preparing meals, if you spend more time in preparation, the cost is usually less than if you buy that article already prepared. Meals prepared at home from individual ingredients usually cost least, while those purchased ready to serve cost most, with the partly prepared meals some-where between. You can make your own comparisons

make your own comparisons here.

Do you keep the waste in your kitchen at a minimum? A careful check on the waste from your refrigerator alone may surprise you, and the garbage pail can teach you valuable lessons if you will study it closely.

What about your food storage facilities? Do you have a cool, dark storage for flour and cereal products that is insect proff, dry, and large enough to handle the amount your family will eat in a reasonable time? Do you use your refrigerator to greatest advantage?

Sometimes home produced foods can cut your food costs, but for many families, this is impossible to do. We have to look to these other ways to cut our family food bills, I hope these hints help you to look at your own food buying habits and see where you can improve.

ICING ICING 1 stick of margarine 3 1/2 tablespoons cocoa (or 1/4 cup chocolate syrup) 1/3 cup evaporated milk 1 lb. powdered sugar 1 cup chopped nuts 1 cup coconut When the cake has baked 18 minutes, combine margarine, cocoa and milk in same saucepan used for chocolate mixture. Bring to a boil and add remaining ingredients. Pour over cake as soon as it is removed from the oven. NOTE: Coconut may be omitted and 1 teaspoon of vanilla used in its place.



## Extremism

Extremism begets extremism. Violence produces counter-violence. Everyone knows this, except the extremists.

Now we have Lester Maddox chosen as Democratic candidate for Governor of Georgia. "Mean" Maddox they called him after he began distributing ax handles to patrons of his restaurant who did not wish to eat where Negroes ate.

Would Georgians have chosen Maddox, after giving such a large plurality to Ellis Arnall, a racial moderate, only a few weeks ago in the pre-run-off votes? Most observers say "no".

With Atlanta in the lead Georgia was making great progress in this transition period of race relations.

But then Stokely Carmichael went to Atlanta, a riot ensued, a fine Mayor and a progressive city were thrown into turmoil. There was a "backlash" and Mayor Ivan Allen says of "Mean" Maddox that he is probably the least competent, most unfit candidate to be offered Georgia voters in decades.

The Maddox victory is not, unfortunately, simply limited to Georgia. In Maryland a splendid candidate edged out by a racist. There are signs of more such results in tight races elsewhere in the country, in from the backlash.

in the country, in from the backlash.

What will the end result be? On the legislative front it undoubtedly means no more new civil rights legislation for a long

But more than that it may also mean that those whites who have been so active in helping the civil rights movement will lose interest, repudiated on all sides, by the segregationist whites and Negroes.

Carmichael may take some comfort from this, because it gives some validity to one part of his argument, that Negroes must do more for themselves. But at the same time it is evident that real "black power" results only from good working relations with the majority of American citizens who are white, 10 to 1.

A very large part of the Negro community is sick of Carmichael and disheartened by the Maddox vote. I have talked with many of them who know-as Carmichael does not-how hard and p painful and long the march towards equality has been. To see it all blown up by a wild man, whose organization according to the New York Times claims exactly 135 members, is discour-

faster, may begin to realize just what is involved and how dif-ficult it is to work out better race relations.

Mayor Daley of Chicago recently said television has a big responsibility for what has been happening. The kooks and psychotics are put on the air; on both sides, he might have added But those who are working hard for domestic tranquility are not considered "newsworthy". Their voices are unheard of on the most important medium for reaching the people.

Perhaps the Maddox vote will stimulate a new look at TV coverage of race relations. If it does, that might be one salu-

In some cities police are admonished not to speak to a suspect in a "rough tone of voice."

To cap it off, policemen are underpaid. Houston Police Chief Herman Short says 75 percent of his men are "moonlighting" on extra jobs just to make ends meet.

The most discouraging aspect of the whole picture is the fact that society is not particularly in favor of good law enforcement.

If society doesn't begin backing its law enforcement agencies,

we may see anarchy or quasi-anarchy sooner than we think.




