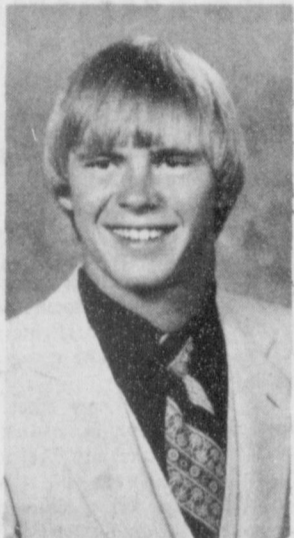

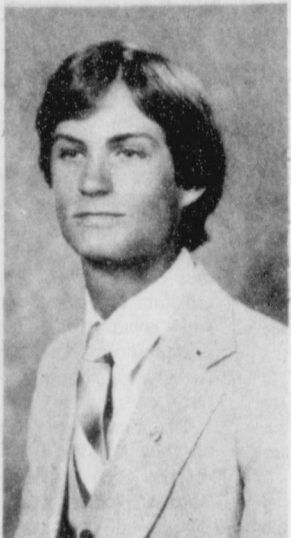

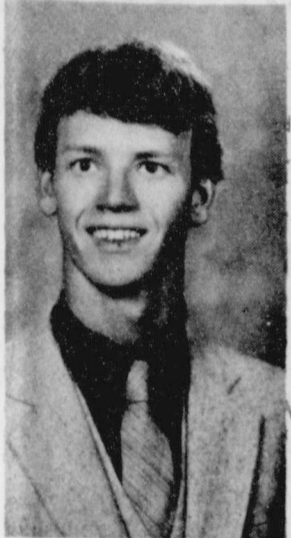

It's not too late! However the time is now. We are closing the family story section on March 16. We are finishing

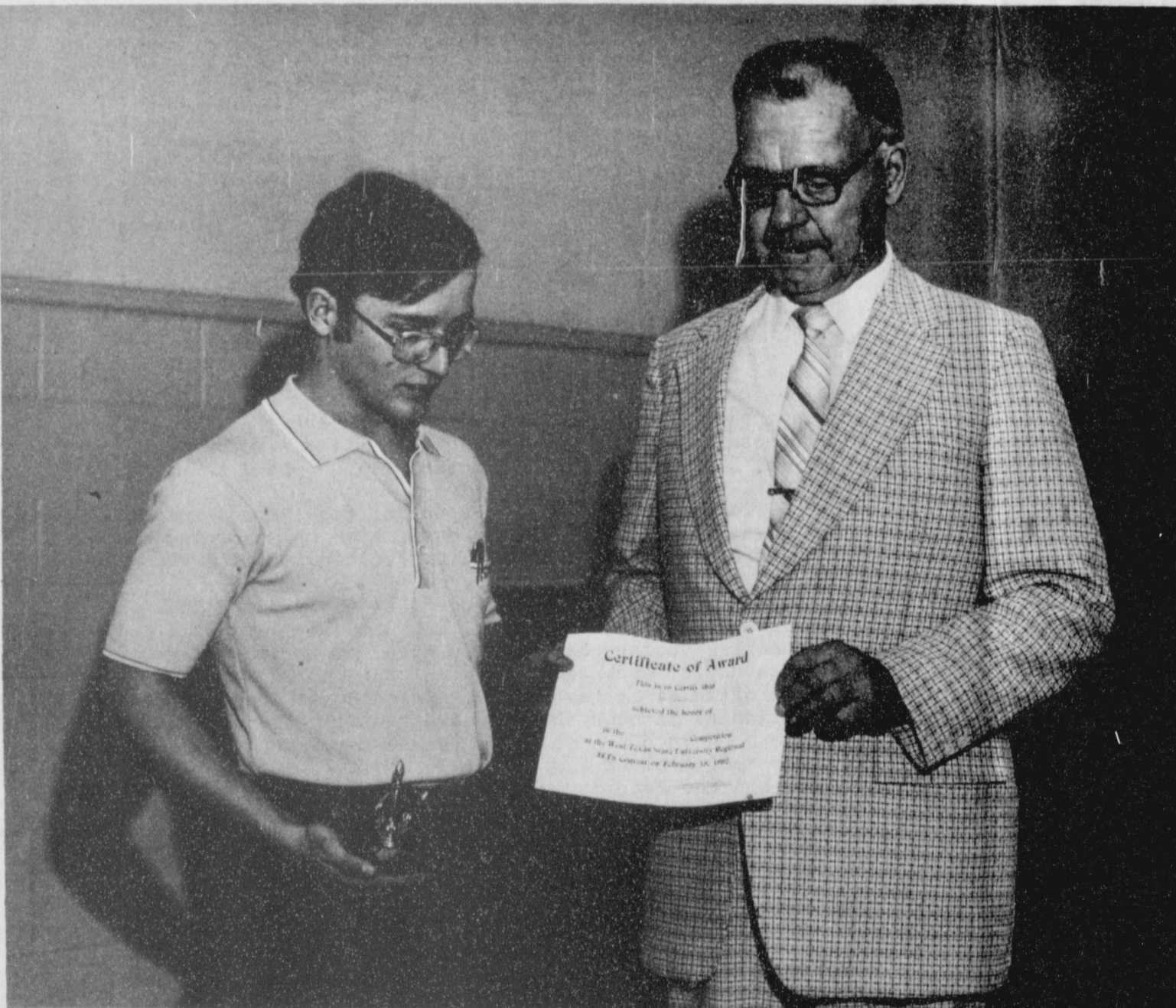

The Junior Engineering Technology Society contest was begun to replace the annual math contest which had been sponsored by the WTSU Department of Math and Physics, said Treasure Brasher, WTSU instructor in Physics, who coordinated the event.

Brasher, promotes technical careers. The WTSU competition is the first to be hosted outside the Texas A&M University campus at College Station. The organization awards scholarships and Brasher said the competition will become an annual event at WTSU.

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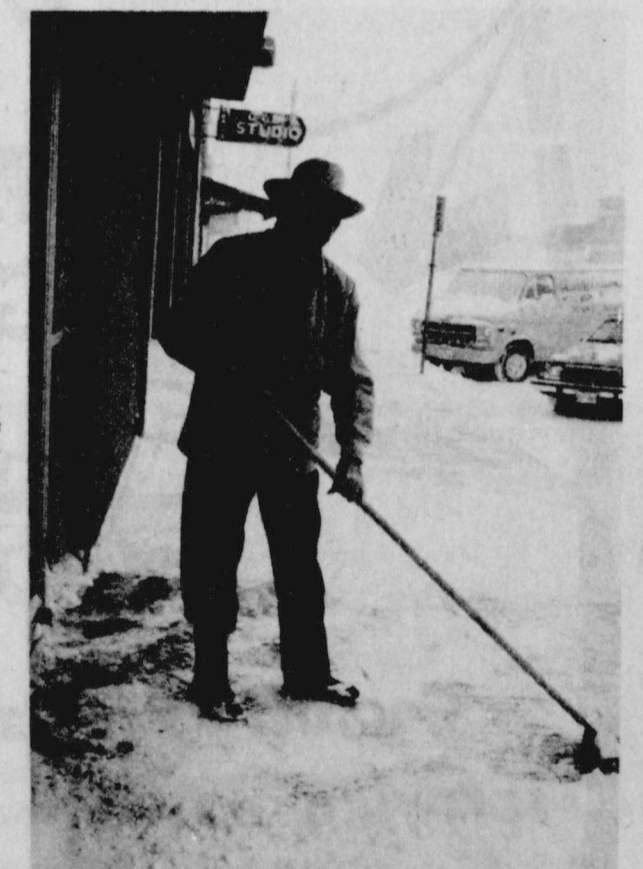
Former City Manager In Critical Condition.

Study of proposed lake near Spearman

SPEARMAN — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has completed a study of a proposed lake and dam on North Palo Duro Creek, 9 1/2 north of Spearman. It is now in the process of being written and edited.

Johnnie Lee of Spearman, manager of the Palo Duro Water Authority, said the report will go from the USACE district office at Tulsa to the regional office in Fort Worth for study expected to take about four months. "It will then go to the Secretary of the Army for his approval and then to Congress for funding."

Lee said, "So far it looks good." The timetable on the project that's been in the works since 1959 is still uncertain, but USACE has given the lake its top priority in Texas, he said.

The \$56 million project would supply water to Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, Spearman, Gruver, Stinnett and Perryton.

Lee said the project has had a few setbacks, but he has been to the Tulsa office at least once a month since becoming PDRA manager in 1978, after resigning as Hansford

the watershed is estimated at between 7 and 8 million gallons but is probably closer to 9 to 10 million gal-

lons, said Lee.

The lake would hold approximately 30 billion gallons of water.

County judge, and found the USACE "is always working on it."

The project could be completed with Texas financing, he said. "We could still drop the Corps of Engineers, even up to the last minute, and go the Texas route. It would be cheaper on us that way, although we've signed a contract with the Corps of Engineers to run the recreational area on a 50-50 basis."

Cost of the recreational area will be \$4.3 million with a 50-year payout at 7.58 percent interest.

Construction on the recreation area might be done this year "at a cheaper cost," said Lee.

The proposed lake, near the junction of North and South Palo Duro creeks and Horseshoe Creek in Hansford County, would have a two-mile-long dam 160 feet tall. The lake would be larger than Greenbelt near Clarendon or Optima near Beaver, Okla., at 114,000 acre feet.

The USACE studies indicate sufficient water flows from the Palo Duro watershed in Hansford, Moore and Hartley counties to fill and maintain a lake. Annual flow from

For four days following the destruction of the Fred Groves residence southeast of Spearman, Feb. 15, rumors ran rife until the city council was given a detailed, virtually step-by-step report of the fight to save the dwelling by Fire Chief Ronnie Bullard.

In this report Bullard emphasized that -- at no time -- no unit of fire fighting equipment was "bogged down" in the mud.

Nor were there any equipment problems that were not solved within minutes by firefighters operating the machinery.

The battle against the blaze did point up the need for higher capacity equipment but by the very nature of the fire, it is doubtful such equipment would have saved the Groves home.

Chief Bullard's account tells the story succinctly.

Spearman Volunteer Firefighter Don Maize happened to

be at the Groves home and turned in the alarm to the Spearman police dispatcher at 2:35, Monday, Feb. 15.

The first truck was rolling three minutes later -- at 2:38 p.m. It arrived at the Groves home site one and one-half miles west and three-fourths miles south of Highway 15 nine minutes later -- at 2:44 p.m.

Firefighter Maize, at the scene, was trying to contain the conflagration with a garden hose on the roof but flames had already burned through the roof and engulfed the west end of the structure.

Chief Bullard stationed truck #53 -- the small county unit -- at the northwest corner of the house. A one-and-one-half inch line was brought into play to knock down the fire and suppress it.

Truck #54, the city's 500-gallon capacity pumping unit, was set up at the northeast end of the structure. Bearing a

one-and-one-half line, two firefighters in air packs moved along the south side of the house seeking the west-most entrance since the fire seemed concentrated in the west end of the building.

Upon entering a door, the men heard a woman's voice and thinking it was a person in the flaming structure, they withdrew for help. Actually, it was Mrs. Groves trying to enter the house at the north side. Sheriff R. L. McFarlin and a firefighter removed her to safety.

Determining no one was trapped inside, the two in air packs re-entered the house and contained the flames to the west end of the house.

At this point, Chief Bullard donned an air pack and entered the house to check the attic and assess the entire state of the structure.

The time was 3:17 p.m. and the fire seemed under control. The 6,000 gallon capacity

Optima Lake to open to boating

As of Monday, March 15, Optima Lake near Hardesty, Okla., will be open for boats for the first time, but there are a couple of flies in the ointment, however.

For one, not even the temporary boat ramp is underwater yet, much less the three permanent ones. Secondly, what boats that

make it onto the lake will be restricted to a five-mile-an-hour speed limit due to the low water level in the lake.

These revelations concerning the lake were handed down Tuesday night at a sparsely attended meeting held at the North Plains Electric Co-op by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, who are responsible for the maintenance of the lake.

Spokesman Ray Kunka said that their decision to open the lake to boating was based partially on the growing population of fish, and in the belief that boats could safely navigate the body of water if boaters kept their speed down.

"We are lifting the ban of everything that floats," he said. "We are prepared to open to boats of any size, if they can get them on the lake."

That may take some doing, for although the water level has risen ten feet since the flood gates were closed over three years ago, none of the boat ramps are touchings water yet. This means that boaters must launch their vessels from the shore, where

they run the risk of getting stuck in the soft, sandy soil.

And once those boats get on the lake, they must observe a no-wake speed limit because of hazards which are partially exposed by the low water level. Some of these hazards include numerous rocks, and a section of well casing on the lake bed.

"We're trying to slow down the speeds so that if they do hit an object, it will result in minor damage or no injuries," Kunka said.

The present elevation of the lake is 2,719 feet above sea level, but in order for the temporary boat ramp to be used the water level must come up to 2,728 feet. As for the three main boat ramps, a water elevation of 2,733 feet is necessary for the ramp at Hooker Point, and 2,745 feet for the ramps at both Prairie Dog Point and Hardesty Park.

Kunka said that the main problem with the water level in the lake has been the large amount of evaporation coupled with a lesser amount of inflow.

"It evaporates at a rate of five feet per year, and that's a lot for a body of water," said Kunka.

An opening time of 8 a.m. was decided on, he said, "so that boaters can get out there during daylight and see that they are getting into."

Kunka said that they foresee some problems cropping up when the lake opens, many of which might be caused by people who didn't come to public meetings to find out exactly how things will stand.

"Since there are no boat ramps, we expect a lot of people will get stuck," he said. "The Tulsa office has said that we are not supposed to try and pull anyone out, due to the liability involved (if damage should occur)."

Another problem they expect is "people not being courteous when launching boats and congesting the shore line." And of course, there will be problems with people who won't know what the rules are, he added.

The Oklahoma State Patrol will be enforcing boating regulations, he said, so Texas boaters will need to have identification on them to prove that they are from out-of-state.

decided upon and it requires no official action -- only a call from a rural resident.

Spearman City Manager Jim Murray explained:

"A member or members of the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department will go to any residence out in the county upon request and at no cost to the people living there, assess the needs there to make firefighting -- if ever necessary -- quicker and more effective.

"These are things such as the capacity of the pump or pumps on existing water supplies. It also includes an adapter connection point where firefighting equipment can be quickly connected.

"I would strongly emphasize this extra service offered by Chief Bullard and members of the department and count it as additional "insurance" in the event of fire."

Insurance proof grace period up April 1

Traffic deaths, injuries, damage up in county

Briefly summarizing the motor vehicle traffic situation in Hansford County, Texas Department of Public Safety Officer Max Gunn led off with a reminder regarding the new motor vehicle insurance law in Texas...

--The grace period regarding proof of insurance coverage as required by law granted at the point of contact with an officer and a motorist, ends April 1.

After that date, according to Officer Gunn, the law requiring proof will be enforced. The very nature of that law does not allow for any "gray" areas of enforcement. Minimum limits of insurance coverage have been fixed by action of the legislature -- which also fixed penalties.

The insurance coverage is required.

Proof of that coverage must be at hand at all times by the motoring public and presented upon request to any duly authorized officer of the law in the State of Texas.

Maximum penalty for failure is loss of drivers license.

The reason for action by the legislature in the matter of insurance coverage is partially told in Trooper Gunn's summary of traffic in Hansford County for the year 1981.

Fatal accidents increased.

--Although most states now have mandatory insurance coverage by motorists with considerable minimum limit requirements, no one has been able to agree on a dollars-and-cents recompense for a human life.

The number of traffic accidents has increased in Hansford County.

--With this increase has come an increase in injuries and property damage.

DPS Officer Max Gunn noted that the compulsory insurance coverage law for Texas motorists was designed to provide partial compensation for losses in this injury and property damage column. He emphasized it did not replace the Texas motorist's responsibility to the code of traffic laws that seeks to curb traffic accidents.

--So the bottom line is: traffic offenders will still be

cited and prosecuted by due process for their traffic offenses.

IN ADDITION: the mandatory insurance coverage law will be enforced. Enforcement will not come ONLY at the point of a major traffic accident. It can come at any time any duly authorized officer in Texas has valid occasion to stop a motorist. At that time the officer can require the motorist show proof of required coverage.

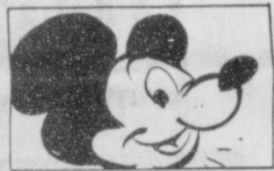
The answer to this is: 1) obtain the required coverage. 2) have the five-point written proof of such coverage as spelled out by the office of Col. Adams, director of the Department of Public Safety with you at all times you are operating a motor vehicle in Texas.

In summing up his report of traffic in Hansford County and state insurance requirements, Officer Max Gunn made one more important observation:

The mandatory insurance law for motorists went into effect Jan. 1, 1982. The grace period to April 1, applied only to ENFORCEMENT of the law -- not to validity of the law itself.

If you have been involved in an accident since Jan. 1 and you did not have the compulsory coverage at the time, in addition to any other penalties and assessments required of you, penalties for failure to comply with the insurance law will also be imposed upon you which climax in the loss of your drivers license.

Trooper Gunn made one more distinction: the law was not intended to provide grounds for increased citations. It has a two-fold purpose: to protect the motorist who complies with the law and practices safe driving measures and to educate those who have not -- thus far.

Regional History

Fair To Be April 17

Trade and Industry in History is the theme for the 1982 Regional History Fair to be held on April 17 at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, Canyon, in celebration of National History Day. This year's second annual Regional History Fair will represent 27 counties in the Panhandle region, according to Suzanne Hewitt, Director of Education at the Museum and regional chairman of the Fair. Assisting her is co-chairman Nan Arthur, education department volunteer.

Students in grades six through eight, the junior division, and grades nine through

twelve, the senior division, may enter. There are six contest categories, including individual projects; group projects with a limit of five students; and individual historical papers. Other categories consist of individual performance; group performance; and media presentations (group or individual).

More specifically, projects such as charts, displays, reliefs, or historical papers can be entered. Other projects that may be entered include fictional accounts and poetry, reconstructions, models, explanatory texts with photographic displays, and live presentations.

tations. Media entries may consist of slide-type, motion picture or video tape. Each student may enter in one category.

Out-of-town judges will evaluate projects on the basis of historical quality, quality of

presentation, and adherence to theme and rules. Trophies, ribbons and school plaques for winners are awards to be presented. Projects will be placed on display for public viewing April 18 through April 23 at the Museum.

Winners in the Regional Fair will compete in San Antonio in the State History Fair on May 1 against winners from twenty other Regional Fairs conducted state-wide. The state competition will be held at the Institute for Texas Cultures. Winners of the State Fair will go on to compete in the National finals at the University of Maryland-College Park in June.

Four hundred area students participated in the 1981 Regional History Fair, Hewitt said. It was one of the largest history fairs in the state. The competition is made possible through a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, which provides funds to purchase awards and certificates.

"Because of the success of last year's History Fair, the NEH increase the amount of grant money for this particular Regional Fair," Hewitt said. She expects about the same number of students to participate in this year's Fair as last year's.

There is no registration fee to enter. Registration forms, student and teacher guide manuals, and other information may be obtained by contacting Suzanne Hewitt at the Museum in Canyon.

The first automatic pop-up electric toaster was marketed in June 1926. It received one slice of toast at a time.
