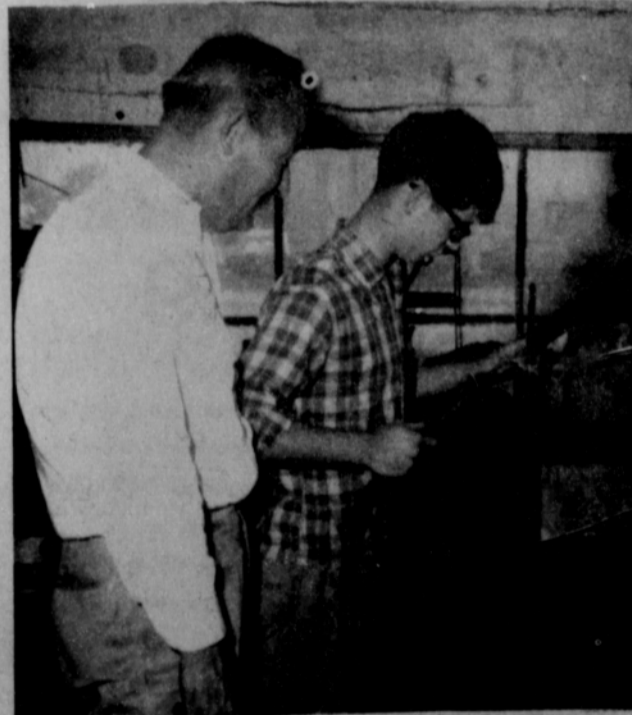

Students, Employers Like ICT Program

"It's a good way to go to school," was the way one student in Spearman High School's Industrial Cooperative Training (ICT) program expressed himself about the study and work program started this year at the school.

The program is designed to give students vocational training in a trade while they are completing their final two years of high school.

Since the school is not big enough to put in vocational training programs for the many different trades, the students learn through on-the-job training in businesses all over town.

There are 12 boys in the program this first semester and only one of these did not receive high marks from his employer at the end of the first six weeks of the program.

In the program the student attends ICT class one hour a day and studies textbooks and training manuals concerning his trade. He is graded on his classroom work and also by his employer and instructor on his work on the job.

After a half-day in school, the student reports to his job. Besides ICT, the students take regular basic subjects in high school required for graduation. ICT takes the place of some elective subjects.

Supt. Bill Reeves said participation in the ICT program does not prevent a student from attending college. The students will have all the subjects required for entrance into state schools.

Some of the students plan to use their ICT training in their college work. Gail Beck who works at the Spearman Reporter wants to study art and advertising. He thinks the year in a printing plant will be useful.

Anthony Wilkerson who has worked for this paper for three years and is in ICT plans to study printing management, journalism and photography in college.

Wilkerson also plans to pay his college expenses by working as a printer.

Sammy Pingleton who came back to high school this year after dropping out last Spring is the student who thinks it is a good way to go to school.

He works at McBride's Radiator shop and likes the chance to go to school and earn spending money and credits toward graduation.

McBride is well pleased with the program and says his trainee is a good employee. "He is learning fast and does good work. It also allows me to work on radiator repairs while he paints, and does other minor work," McBride said. He said the boy would soon begin training to repair holes in radiators. He will train on old radiators that cannot be fixed.

Terry Pattison is working at Thompson Flying Service learning to work on airframes, engines, fabrics and painting.

Carroll Thompson said he would take another trainee after this one if he is as good as Pattison. Thompson thinks ICT is a program that can be helpful to many students.

Robert Eaton, a junior, who works at Beedy's Furniture learning furniture repair, is

following a family tradition in woodworking. He thinks ICT makes one a better student. A student has to pass all of his classes and maintain an 80 average in ICT to stay in the program.

W.W. Smith is the ICT instructor. He conducts the classes and helps the students with their textbook training and stays abreast of the student's on-the-job progress through conferences with employers.

He expects the program to grow as more firms are interested in the program and more students become interested.

Smith said the classroom instruction also includes work in public and community relations. We try to give the students training in meetings, so that and customer relations business will be an asset to a business while training and after they finish school.

There are a wide range of trades represented this year. There are the two in printing, one at the radiator shop, Mike Day is at Burton's TV, Pattison at Thompson Flying Service, Virgil Reynolds works at Permian, Ronnie Sell at Spearman Auto Service, Eaton at Beedy's, Charles Gilliam at North Plains Truck and Imp., Dallas Haner at Excel Chevrolet-Olds, Rick Hendricks at R.L. McClellan and Sons, and Kurt Shedeck at Ayes Brake and Alignment. All work under supervision of adults.

Mechanics have been the most popular this year, but Smith hopes to place more students in a larger variety of trades in the years to come.

McBride summed up the need for craftsmen in today's society. "Someone has to learn these trades, not everyone can sit at a desk."

One Killed One Injured In Wreck

A Spearman man was killed and another was critically injured in a one-car accident at the intersection of the Spearman and Gruver highways 10 miles north of Stinson about 1 a.m. Wednesday.

Killed in the accident was Leroy Mace who had been employed here in the oil fields.

Injured in the accident was William Hicks of Spearman, the father of John Hisey of Spearman. Hicks was employed on a farm here since coming to Spearman from Nebraska in July.

He was treated in a Berger hospital, then transferred Wednesday to Amarillo.

Mr. Mace's body was taken to a Berger funeral home. No relatives are known in this area.

It is believed the car failed to make the curve on the highway and hit the divider in the intersection. It turned over and came to rest in a field.

High School Students May Take Correspondence

AUSTIN--Students in Texas high schools may take courses for graduation credit or to meet special college entrance requirements by enrolling for University of Texas correspondence study.

During the year just ended, 1,800 persons earned credit in 62 different high school correspondence courses through the University's Extension Teaching and Field Service Bureau.

A total of 1,530 students (or about 85 per cent of those enrolled) were from 800 of the smaller consolidated and independent school districts throughout the state. That figure represents more than half of the 1,500 public and private secondary schools in Texas.

The University also cooperates with the Texas Education Agency's Small Schools Project, which assists smaller schools in developing and enriching their programs, even though they may be operating on limited budgets. Teachers

and administrators from small schools attend a summer workshop held in Austin each year under joint auspices of TEA and UT. Almost 700 attended the 1966 summer workshop.

Many schools involved in the Small Schools Project also take advantage of the University's correspondence study program. A physics course has been set up which requires only an adult supervisor, rather than a certified teacher. Students do all their own work, and the high school furnishes certain basic laboratory equipment.

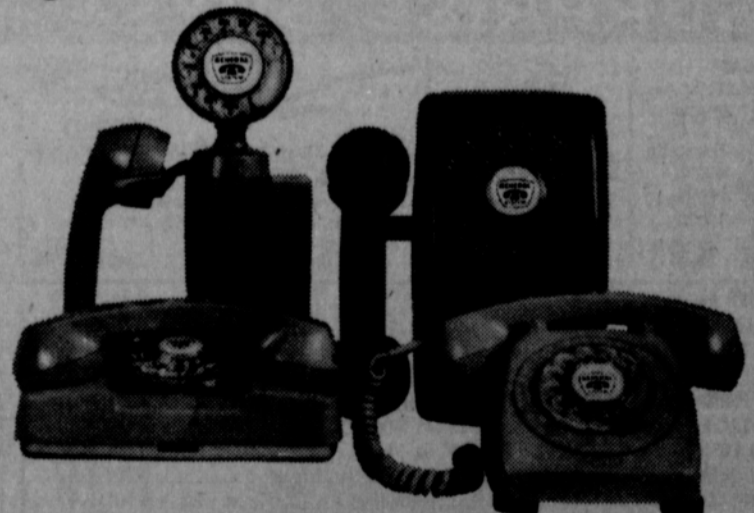

facturing firm was in town inspecting the town and discussing the possibility of placing a large plant in Lewisville.

After the delegation had met with the civic leaders of the town, been shown the site, given reams of information about why they should locate in Lewisville, the men thanked the leaders and told them company officials would be back later for more inspections.

There was just one little catch. The delegation said they would not see the civic leaders again. The next group who came to town would be talking to the citizens. People would not know who they were, they were coming to see how people felt about newcomers, how they felt about working, they were coming to see what kind of town Lewisville was when they looked at it without the benefit of guides.

Don't you know the civic leaders of Lewisville will be on pins and needles until they learn the outcome of the second survey?

How good a salesman would you be if someone came into Spearman just looking around. Would you attract newcomers to Spearman or send them scurrying to some other location.

The second illustration was in the Perryton newspaper. This fall a Perryton family went to Lubbock for a football game. Many people do that and because of distance spend the week-end. This has become a nice trade boost from the "cotton town."

Since the flow of fans will not dry up, the motels and cafes probably or not too worried about how they treat football fans.

The Perryton family got the treatment. They had to change motel rooms. The first one stunk. Late at night they had to demand that the roll-away bed for their children's room be brought. They ordered it that morning. They had poor service in the cafes. In general, a week-end of fun was sour because of the treatment received.

Sure they were just football fans and if they do not go back, more will. However, the head of the family was also the publisher of the Perryton newspaper. Editorial comment was made in the paper and the paper goes into more than 3,000 homes over the area and state.

It will not stop people, or that same Perryton family, from going to football games, but, it was bad publicity for the town of Lubbock and undid some of the promotion work the town had done.

Everyone, well most everyone, would like a better town to live and do business in. Building such a town requires everyone's help and you can never tell when you may be helping or hindering, so why not try to be helping all the time.

Guest Editorial

Texans next year could vote on a constitutional amendment that could revolutionize government in at least 24 Texas counties, the ones with the largest population.

This amendment is not on the list of 16 that will be voted upon in November, but has already been put forward for consideration by the legislature at the next session.

This amendment, drafted by the Texas Research Bureau, would permit county commissioners to abolish nine elective offices, including sheriff, county clerk, district clerk and tax assessor-collector.

It would permit the hiring of a "county administrator" similar to a city manager. And it would permit the election of county commissioners "at large" instead of by precinct.

The proposed amendment is naturally expected to face strong opposition from courthouse political machines, even though it would apply to only 24 Texas counties, those with population in excess of 50,000.

This amendment would also permit the abolishing of the special funds--road and bridge, general, jury and permanent improvements--and the establishment of one huge general fund with a single general tax.

This provision alone will cause a revolution in the ranks of county officials because as it stands now each county commissioner is boss of his own precinct machinery and has his own funds.

This amendment would also do away with election of justice of peace, public weighers, county treasurer, hide inspector, and surveyor, with these jobs being filled by appointment by the county commissioner.

This amendment has shocked and jolted a lot of people and there is a good possibility that it will never get out of the legislature. But it raises a lot of questions that maybe ought to be raised about county government structure in Texas, admittedly a holdover from an earlier horse drawn generation.

And as cities become larger and political power becomes more concentrated in urban areas, we can look for a dilution of county political powers. This proposed amendment may be the opening wedge.

This amendment has some merit, and some drawbacks. It would divest present elected officials of their office, but it would put a lot more power in the hands of county commissioners, who would become virtual czars of the courthouse under the proposed changes.

It is an issue that will be spotlighted more and more in the months to come. County government in Texas as we know it is bound to have some changes made, even if not as sweeping as this proposal.

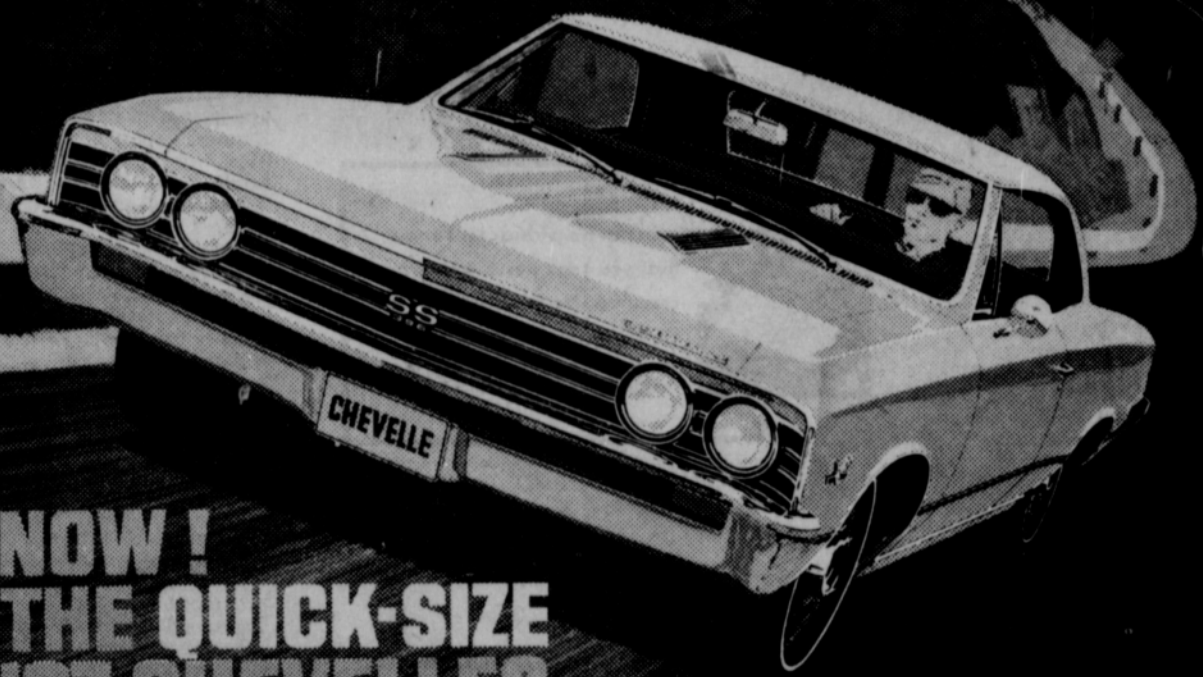

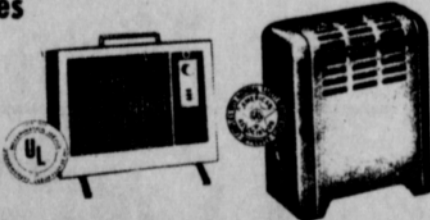

Mrs. A.R. Bort of Gruver, Unit Delegate, and R.L. Kleeberger, M.D., Director on the Board of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, have just returned from Houston where they attended the Twenty-first Annual Meeting of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, October 5-6.

The Annual Meeting marked the Twentieth Anniversary of the ACS in Texas--2 decades of volunteer activities in cancer control that have seen statewide expansion of the ACS Program; thousands of dozens of dressings are made annually for free use by cancer patients; over \$2 million was received in the last fiscal year in Texas ACS funds; millions of adults and students have viewed or read ACS educational messages through films, pamphlets, newspapers and broadcasts.

All these developments were discussed at the two-day meeting, which was attended by over 300 delegates and guests.

The morning of Oct. 6 was devoted to a Case Presentation Program by five Texas physicians. Discussing colon and rectum cancer in laymen's terms, the physicians emphasized the enormous number of lives that could be saved from this form of cancer if early diagnosis and prompt and proper treatment were routine among adults.

Delegates at the Luncheon were presented 500 Pennsylvania apples, their winnings in a campaign wager with the Pennsylvania Division. Volunteers in Texas collected a larger percentage of funds than their opponents, and were thus entitled to the prize apples.

In a more serious note, the National President of the American Cancer Society, Leonard W. Larson, M.D., addressed the delegates at the Annual Dinner. Representing the 2 million American volunteers who work in the ACS, Dr. Larson's message reflected his lifetime of work in world health problems, including service on a committee of the World Health Organization.

Representatives of Hansford County Unit of the ACS participated in afternoon committee meetings that emphasized accomplishments at the community level. Objectives for the coming year were discussed in Service, Public Education, and Campaign, and an informal "ask the experts" round-table completed each session.

Delegates to the Meeting were introduced to a large group of honored guests including several of the 42 young physicians supported by ACS Research grants in Texas; early Presidents of the Division; and Lifetime Award Winners.

Mayor Louie Welch of Houston welcomed the delegates, who also heard reports from the Division President, A.B. Goldston, M.D. of Amarillo, and the Executive Vice-President of the Division, Curt W. Reimann, of Austin.

Need An Address Zipped? Post Office Will Supply

Beginning soon, the local post office will distribute two cards to each resident address. Postmaster Jacobs reported.

Each card will have spaces for addresses the householder wishes ZIPPED. After placing their uncoded addresses on the cards, preferably printed legibly, they may be dropped into any letter box or returned to their letter carrier.

"No postage is needed," Mr. Jacobs said. The project is part of Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien's program to make ZIP Codes more accessible to the mailing public. In addition to the cards for addresses, a special notice advising each resident of his local ZIP Code number will be distributed. The cards will carry a message from Postmaster General O'Brien advising that ZIP Coded mail

helps provide better service.

In completing the cards, only the street address and city and state are required. Individual names should not be listed. Postmaster Jacobs emphasized the importance of including a return address on the front of the cards so they may be returned after addresses have been coded. Additional cards are available from the carriers or at the post office.

The local Postmaster urges everyone to check the addresses on all magazines and newspapers. To avoid missing an issue of any publication, it is necessary the mailing address be correct. Forms for notifying correspondents and publishers of your correct address are available free of charge at the post office.



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
