Residents in Ochiltree county and the rest of the Texas Panhandle will soon have a large lake available for a number of different uses, including boating, fishing and sking as well as hiking, camping and possibly hunting. Optima Lake, when it is lilled, is expected to cover an area of 5,340 acres of water and control the runoff of an area encompassing 2,340 square miles.

Completion of the dam itself is expected to be in May of 1971 by the Guy H. James Construction Company, operating out of Hardesty. The dam site is located three miles north of the Oklahoma city and the lake it will form is expected to stretch back five full miles from the dam site.

Called one of the oldest unconstructed projects of the federal government which has been authorized by Congress, work on the dam started in 1988.


last proceeding on schedule because the money problems that have plaugued the dam have been solved.

Congress authorized the Arkansas River Basin Flood Control Act in 1936, but money for the project was not appropriated until much later because of the intervening years where the priorities of the Second World War, the Korean War and domestic money problems meant there were not enough federal funds to go around.

"The only major problem we have had with this dam has been money," Mahaffey says. He notes that after work was started in 1966 it had to be stopped from 1968 to 1970 when funds from Congress stopped coming, but the work was started again in 1970 and has been going "full speed shead" ever since.

Tom Sherrill, an engineer with the construction company working on the dam, says the company is now working two ten-hour shifts each day. "We expect to start diverting the

cost of a pipeline to the dam site and a purification treat-ment plant would be far above the cost of pumping water from the ground near the city. He


