Ad valorem tax rate set at 72-cents

zens, considerable in size and THE SPEARMAN REPORTER, ion concern, turned out Thursday night for the special meeting of the Spearman city council for a second and final hearing on a tax rate increase as required by

At the close of the session. ordinance 496 was passed without dissent, placing the ad valorem tax rate at 72-cents for the coming fiscal year.

This is an actual increase from 65-cents.

All the burden for this increase was created by the legal requirement that the city replace a 30-year old fire truck or suffer a raise in the key insurance rate for property

All the misunderstanding of the tax rate increase was created by legal ad -- dictated by law as to content and even type size -- which contained a spurious formula by which the city was required to say the tax rate was being raised from 39-plus cents to 72 cents . . . an

increase of some 85 percent. At the first publication of the required legal ad, the city did just what the school district did: published another ad of equal size and adjacent to the required legal ad, saying the legal ad had no actual basis in fact so far as city taxes and rates were concerned

-- Which was true! The rate was proposed as an increase from 65 cents to 72 cents -- not from 39-plus cents

to 72 cents. Now, this disclaimer ad was not run with the second and final required publication of the legal ad. This led to confusion among taxpayers which the city council thought might have been cleared up during the first

tax hearing. Discussed at length was the fire truck situation. Members of the council and City Manager Jim Murray explained in detail that, if the unit was not purchased the key insurance rate would go up and taxpayers would, in essence, be paying for the fire truck EVERY YEAR instead of a one-time purchase

this year. It was also noted that this insurance rate increase would be valid because the 1952 firefighting unit could not be made safe and dependable for a reasonable cost outlay. (The state will only certify a fire truck for 30 years.)

The council was asked about financing the purchase of the truck. It was pointed out this would reduce the city's credit potential if there was another crisis such as massive failure of the ancient sewer system.

The council was asked about raising utility rates to pay for the cost of the fire truck. It was explained that all income from utilities above operating expenses was committed to retire the revenue bonds that financed

After the term "hearing" was used considerably, it was challenged by the audience which maintained the newspaper said vote, not hearing. It was explained this referred

to the vote of the individual members of the council on the tax rate. How they vote must be published -- even to the concensus of the mayor who cannot vote except to break a

When it seemed the due process of discussion had run its gamut, a vote was taken on the 72-cent per hundred dollars of taxable valuation ad valorem tax rate. All councilmen voted "aye" and Mayor Ralph Blodgett stipulated he would have voted "aye" if his vote had been required.

All through the hearing. members of the audience pressed again and again for a committment from the council that, following purchase of the fire truck this year, taxes would go down again.

The council could not make this committment absolutely. There is always the potential expense of sewer repair or replacement; there is the fact that the purchase of a new police car and other needed equipment throughout city operation (which had been deleted from the forthcoming budget to lighten the burden of the fire truck purchase) and the everpresent specter of inflation.

The hearing did serve a worthwhile purpose. In informal discussions following adjournment, taxpayers present said they understood the role of the councilmen better and certainly did not envy them their jobs.

Members of the audience even admitted that they were trying to get an education in city -- some dating back several years -- all in one evening. They generally admitted what they should do was attend every council meeting, but . . . they also confessed this was not likely to happen.

Prior to the public hearing and subsequent action on a tax rate, the council had admitted, by oath, Jim Nicholson to its ranks. A former council member, Nicholson agreed to accept the appointment to fill out the unexpired term of Ray Ingle

who resigned. So, while the ad valorem tax RATE goes from 65 to 72 cents. the greater part of the increase to taxpayers within the city is due to revaluation which was mandated by state law. The city granted a 30 percent tax exemption to homeowners for a period also specified by law which should cushion the bur-

den of the increase gradually. -But it certainly is NOT a boon to the operation of the






