Portascope Donated To Hospital

Hansford Hospital, in connection with treatment of patients admitted for heart or related problems, is using a portable electrocardiogram and peripheral pulse monitor donated by Mrs. Paul Gurney of Gravel in memory of her late husband who was a victim of fatal heart attack.

The portascope is a complete, portable battery or line powered monitor and features a 5-inch, non-fade display of the ECG or peripheral pulse waveform. The display screen also shows heart rate and the heart rate alarm limit settings in the patient's room as well as in the nurse's station for constant monitoring.

A built-in, rechargeable battery supplies power for up to six hours of continuous operation and the alternating current line power will also power the unit and recharge the battery simultaneously.

Additional technical information about the machine includes the fact that the unit's non-fade display has speeds of 25 and 50 millimeters per second for five seconds or 2.5 seconds of continuously visible waveform. A hold mode stops the waveform on the screen for study and an expand mode holds and enlarges the left third of the display waveform to full screen size.

Additionally, the input connector on the front of the Portascope accepts the patient's ECG signal from a standard patient cable. Rear inputs accept the cable plug of a peripheral pulse transducer and an amplified, single-ended ECG signal from another source. Outputs at the rear of the unit supply the amplified ECG or peripheral pulse signal, the heart rate signal and the audio-visual alarm signal for connection to the central console of a monitoring system. A synchronizing signal is also provided at the rear of the unit for performing synchronized conversion with a defibrillator.

Additional technical information about the machine includes the fact that the unit's non-fade display has speeds of 25 and 50 millimeters per second for five seconds or 2.5 seconds of continuously visible waveform. A hold mode stops the waveform on the screen for study and an expand mode holds and enlarges the left third of the display waveform to full screen size.

Judge resets hearing in suit over farm taxes

District Judge Richard Coutiss has granted a continuance in the civil suit filed by 80 Hutchinson County farmers against the Hutchinson County Commissioners Court and the county tax assessor-collector.

The pre-trial hearing, which had been scheduled yesterday, was reset for March 6 in 84th District Court.

In October, Coutiss issued a restraining order as a result of the civil suit. The order prevents the county from sending out any tax notices to the plaintiffs named in the suit.

The petition alleges that at the time the county commission court convened to fail and refused to establish an agricultural use schedule for taxation of rural property, but instead established a schedule determined by the market value of the property.

Felony Charge Bond Set

A former area resident, Ronald Swank, 39, was in Hansford County jail Friday in lieu of \$2,500 bond after appearing, with counsel, earlier in the day before Justice of the Peace J.P. Vernon of Spearman on a charge of theft by check charge in connection with the purchase of merchandise Nov. 9 in a Spearman store.

Swank was returned to Spearman Thursday from Denton where he had been taken into custody after a return from the National Crime Information Center revealed Swank was wanted in Hansford County on the felony charge. The warrant by Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarland was issued out of Vernon's Office and Deputies John Mull and Dennis Quimby returned Swank to Spearman.

Swank, a former resident of Frytown, was remanded to the custody of the sheriff in lieu of bond pending future court proceedings.

Jury Finds For Landowners

A unanimous verdict by a jury of six, four women and two men, was returned in 84th Judicial District Court in Spearman Thursday, Dec. 8, finding for the respondents in the case of Southwestern Public Service versus Everett E. Vanderburg et al., Louise Collins Vanderburg, and involving the taking by the utility of approximately one mile of the property of the Vanderburgs for transmission line use.

The suit was filed Jan. 18, 1971. The 115,000 volt electric transmission line southwest of Spearman was erected.

In the verdict the jury had to answer questions pertaining to five special issues in the case.

Special Issue No. 1: What do you find from a preponderance of the evidence was the reasonable market value of the surface of the 4.855 acre strip of land covered by the right-of-way or easement involvement involved herein, immediately prior to the taking of said easement on Jan. 18, 1971?

The jury answer was \$1,700.

Special Issue No. 2: What do you find from a preponderance of the evidence was the reasonable market value of the surface of the 4.855 acre strip of land covered by the right-of-way or easement involvement herein immediately after the taking of said easement on Jan. 18, 1971?

The jury answer, in dollars and cents, was \$218,000.

Special Issue No. 5: What do you find from a preponderance of the evidence was the reasonable market value of the surface of the remaining 623.965 acres of the easement involved herein Jan. 1, 1971?

The jury answer, in dollars and cents, was \$178,000.

The verdict was filed at 4:40 p.m. in Hansford County.

District Judge Richard Coutiss heard the case.

The award will be based on the monetary differences as established by the jury verdict.

Hospital Directors Meet

The board of directors of Hansford County Hospital met in regular session in the hospital library Thursday, Dec. 8, completed insurance coverage arrangements with representatives of the J. L. Brock Insurance Agency in Spearman, received reports on building repair status, unemployment compensation, physician recruitment and hospital purchases.

Painting has been completed and other repair work, totaling approximately \$12,500, has been accomplished with the only work to be completed being the installation of doors which are on order and have been paid for, according to Jerry Taylor, hospital administrator, in his report to the board.

The board also approved the new ambulance rates being established by the City of Spearman.

Based on information provided the local hospital district, the board approved the hospital becoming the unemployment insurer and placing the required monetary amount in escrow.

Discussion was carried out concerning physician recruitment problems with efforts to be continued at attracting doctors to Spearman and vicinity.

Negotiations are in progress to acquire a fetal heart tone monitor.

The annual audit has been completed and is to be presented in the near future.

Pending litigation involving the hospital was discussed with no formal action taken.

Fires Cause Property Damage

Spearman Volunteer Fire Department members Thursday night and early Friday morning in subfreezing temperatures made runs to two locations in Hansford County south of the city in which some substantial property damage was sustained.

At the first location, B & B Farm Industries, Inc., in Spearman and the Gruber Volunteer Fire Department was utilized, SVPD Chief Steve Slater reported.

Approximately 25 minutes to midnight Thursday, Dec. 8, the SVPD units headed to the Jimmy Shieldlight property six miles south of the city where a barn was on fire. The structure and contents were destroyed but some bulls and horses which had been in the structure were saved. Property damage was estimated around \$6,000 and cause of the blaze was placed on an electrical short, according to preliminary reports.

A smoldering dump pit which exploded into flames, causing some property damage at the 4-7ex elevator five miles south of the city on FM760 was the cause for the second run around 4 a.m. Friday.

According to preliminary investigation, some work had been completed on one of the legs which lifts the grain from the pit to the storage bins and contents of the pit had apparently been smoldering for some time before enough pressure built up to result in an explosion and fire. The top of one of the loading legs was blown off.

Extent of property damage had not been determined Friday morning.

Slater noted that the large tractor truck, holding several gallons of water, from B & B Farm Industries, Inc., was utilized during both fires.

He also brought out that the GVFD was notified and joined the Spearman department in dousing the fire at the 4-7ex elevator location.

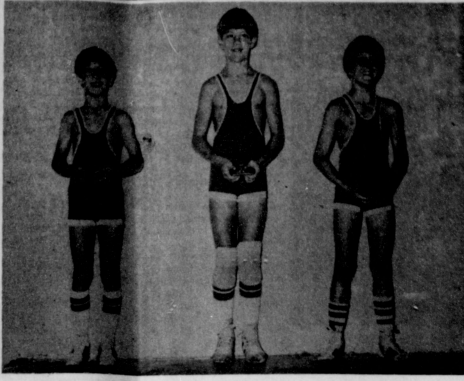

Grassed Waterways Are Productive

Waterways are channels shaped to a smooth surface and seeded to grass. There purpose is to carry surplus water across the farm without causing erosion or silt pollution in our streams and tributaries. Grassed waterways can be used for grazing or hay production. They make an outstanding Wildlife Habitat for doves, quail and pheasants.

If you have a waterway to be seeded tall fescue grass is an excellent grass to use and now is a good time to seed it.

The Don Harrington Discovery Center in Amarillo has scheduled its Christmas show "STAR OF BETHLEHEM" beginning Saturday, November 26th and running through January 1, 1978.
