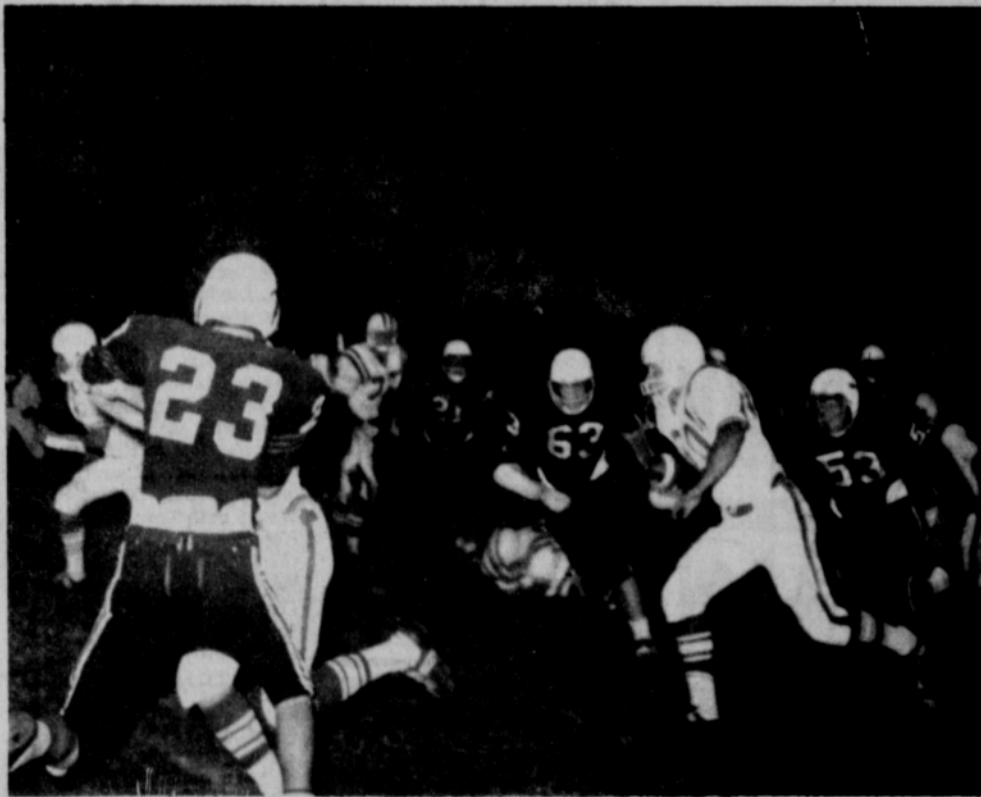
3-Day Rain Soaks Area With 1.75

The rain came again this Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A total of 1.75 was measured for the three days.

Mrs. Pat Cates, official weather observer, measured .60 Thursday, .20 Friday and .95 at 9:30 Saturday morning. Some heavier amounts were reported southeast of town Thursday and Friday and it appeared they got another heavy rain Saturday morning.

Between 1.5 and 2 inches were reported to have fallen Thursday and Friday about 10 to 15 miles southeast of town. In the Gruver area the rain was lighter and also in the Perryton area.

Farmers are happy about the moisture, but it caught wheat seeding in all stages from the crop being up, to some still putting down fertilizer.

Matador Bootmaker Opens Cowboy Boot Shop Here

A new business opened in Spearman Friday in the Main Street building next door to Wilmeth Cattle Co.

D.L. Damron of Matador opened the Cowboy Boot Shop Friday after getting his equipment and merchandise in the building during the past two weeks.

Damron and his wife, Maye, moved here this week from Matador.

He said they will make boots, do boot and shoe repair, handle some western wear and have saddle supplies.

The bootmaker has been in

the trade for 26 years. He started in business in 1940 when he bought his first shop from Fred Fulfer of Matador for \$100.

He has operated the business in Matador since that time, except for 18 months when he was in the Army in World War II.

Damron said he would retain the name Cowboy Boot Shop here. It is the name the firm operated under in Matador.

Mr. and Mrs. Damron have three daughters, all married and living on the South Plains.

Gruver Wins 12-6 In Wild 4 Minutes

Three Spearman passes accounted for all of the scoring here Friday night as the Gruver Greyhounds beat Spearman 12-6.

Only alert play by the Gruver secondary in the closing minutes of the game kept the Lynx from avenging the 38-16 rout suffered last year in Gruver.

A strong defense Friday night was a big change from a year ago when the Hounds scored the first time they touched the ball, then ran up a 32-0 edge before Spearman was able to get on the scoreboard.

After both teams had threatened earlier in the game, Gruver got on the scoreboard in a hurry. With 4:20 left in the game and Spearman at midfield, quarterback Charles Shieldknight went to the air.

His opposing quarterback, John Cooksey raced in to take the flat pass and there was no one between him and the goal as he went 60 yards to score. He tried to pass for two points but the ball was batted away.

Spearman got the ball back to mid-field on the kick-off and again Shieldknight went to the air on the same play. This time George Odom got in the way for an interception and a 50-yard run made the score 12-0.

With many Spearman fans pouring out of the stands heading home, Shieldknight and the Lynx went back to work with less than two minutes to play.

With the line giving good protection, Shieldknight hit Bobby Smith with a flat pass that lost two, then little Steve Jordan took a reverse hand-off and went 18 yards. Gary Cates came back for seven more.

At the Gruver 36, Shield-

knight found halfback Hal Shufeldt at the 20 and drilled him with the ball. Big Shufeldt tore away from two defenders as he was catching the pass and raced in 20 yards to score.

Shieldknight tried to kick the extra point, but it was no good.

The Lynx then tried an on-side kick, but Gruver got the ball and managed to kill the clock.

Spearman threatened early in the first quarter after Gary Cates ran a Gruver punt back from the Hound 35. Fullback Jerry Holton rolled the ball down to the 21 on a 14 yard gallop. Then he lost three and Shieldknight picked up five. Holton was stopped, then on fourth and eight, Shieldknight hit Shufeldt with a pass and he was dropped one foot short of a first down on the 11 yard line.

Early in the second quarter Gruver drove from their own 43 to the Lynx 10 before fumbling the ball away.

Sammy Arnold and Odom were the work horses. Cooksey hit one seven yard pass in the drive.

At the Lynx 10, Arnold tried to go wide only to be nailed by Joe Vanderburg and Arnold fumbled as he went to the ground. Spearman recovered.

Late in the quarter Gruver threatened again after Arnold ran a punt back from the Gruver 35 to the Lynx 35. Only Monty Lusby, who slowed him, and Wesley Jarvis, who caught him from behind, saved a touchdown.

Arnold pushed the ball to the Spearman nine where on fourth down Cooksey hit Bennie Wilson, but Shufeldt wrapped him up short of the first down.

Neither team moved the ball in the third quarter as Randy Moore for Spearman and Lonnie Hiller exchanged punts several times. Gruver got one chance in midfield when Moore lacked one foot picking up a first down on a fake punt. Three plays later Jenkins killed the drive by intercepting a Cooksey pass.

As the fourth quarter began, Spearman mounted another threat. Holton picked up two successive first downs and Jenkins added eight to put the Lynx in business on the Gruver 20.

A face guard infraction against Gruver put Spearman to the Hound 10. Holton, Cates and Shufeldt were stopped cold, then Shieldknight went to the air. He hit Harley Reeves in the end zone but the ball squirted out of his hand.

Spearman was penalized back to the 14 and again Shieldknight went to the air. He hit Jordan on the goal line only to have the ball bounce away from the receiver.

That was the last threat until the frantic last four minutes.

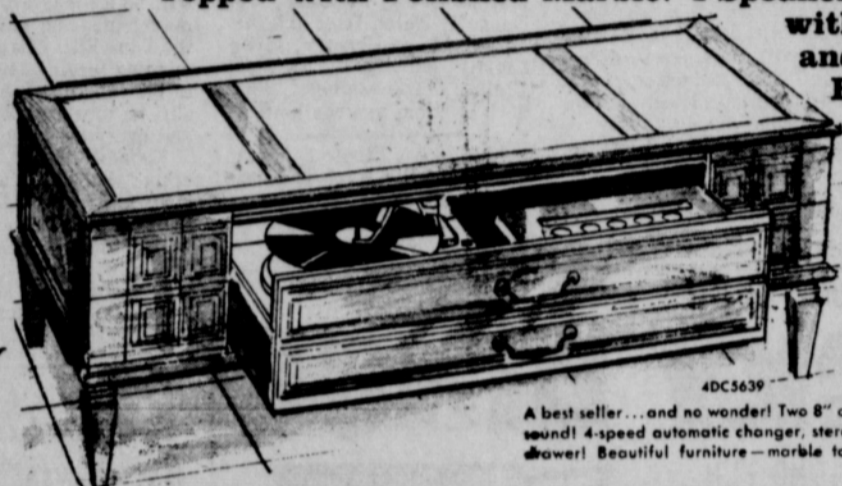

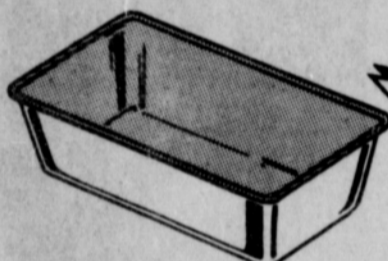

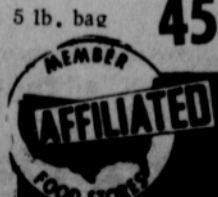
