city council in regular session, Tuesday night, in the public interest, was the employment of a police chief and appointment of a fire chief-fire marshal.

D.J. Alberts, a native of Kingston, New York and member of the Spearman Police Department since February, 1981, was named chief of the department at a salary of \$20,000 per year.

He succeeds Ronald Robinson who resigned some weeks ago after a tenure of two years with the local department. Alberts had been advanced to the rank of sargeant and was directing the department pending employment of a chief.

Members of the council interviewed Alberts and another applicant in executive session. When a concensus was reached, the council returned to open session and voted to employ Alberts.

Prior to the executive session, the panel had accepted the resignation of Fire Chief-Fire Marshal Ronnie Bullard and appointed Steven Slater to fill the post. Slater has served in

this position before. Parallel to this action, council members voted to end participation by the city and its volunteer fire department in the Texas Firefighter Releif and Retirement Fund. It had been participating since November, 1979 but it had developed that the man-hours and paper work attendant on such participation cost much more than benefits derived thus far.

In another personnel matter, the council appointed Dr. David McClellan city health officer. The death of Dr. Kleeburger left the post vacant and Dr. McClellan told city leaders he would serve.

In separate actions, the panel agreed upon a fire contract with Hutchinson and Ochiltree counties and one with Hansford County. Terms of the contracts vary because Hansford County does furnish a large water-source truck to the Spearman department.

If their contracts are ratified, Hutchinson and Ochiltree will each pay \$275 for fire calls and \$275 for rescue calls. Such

A fraudulent roofer is believed to be soliciting work in Spearman

With a large number of roofing jobs underway over the city, left over from the damaging hail storm in June, "con artists have been expected and from time to time, we have warned our readers to be on the alert.

This week, the Spearman Police Department received a report on the statewide teletype from Friona regarding the subject believed to be in the Hansford County area somewhere.

His stock-in-trade is to use tar and kerosene mixed to "roof" a house or building. He usually tries to get an advance payment but his prices are so cheap compared to legitimate work, he does not insist on this advance payment.

The suspect is believed to use a number of names. According to police department records, he is a white male 5 feet, 6 inches tall, weighing about 130 pounds. He has brown hair and brown eyes. He is driving a blue pickup truck with a spray tank in the back. This vehicle possibly bears an Oklahoma license tag for the suspect holds a valid Oklahoma drivers license bearing a Guthrie, Okla. address.

No charges were filed against him at Friona but according to the teletype alert from that city. he is wanted by authorities in Nebraska for fraud.

If a person answering this description and using this method of soliciting roofing work comes to your door, you should call the Spearman Police Department to check it out.

Any persons soliciting roofing jobs or other work should either represent an established insurance company or have a permit to solicit work from the Spearman Police Department. Pros-pective customers should check. Police Chief D.J. Alberts

The burning season is Feb. 1-March 15th for warm season grasses. To burn a pasture it must have enough fuel to carry the fire across in a continuous sweep. To have this amount of fuel, the pasture must be defered from grazing a full season before the burn and 90 days after the burn.



On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools. outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence


