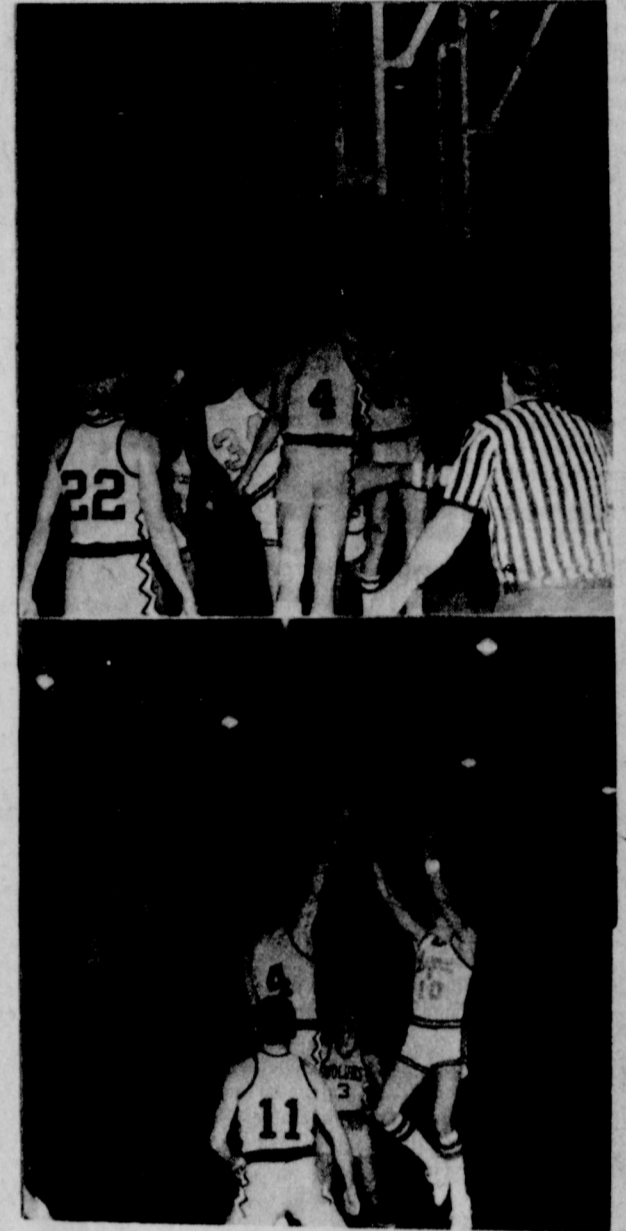

\$29,000.00 Outlay By Hospital

Among Largest Purchases Yet!

After several months of intensive study by the Medical Staff and the Hansford Hospital District Trustees, a decision was reached Thursday night on what is believed to be one of the largest single purchases made by the current Board.

The Trustees voted unanimously to spend just over \$29,000.00 for the purchase of new Medical monitoring equipment to replace outmoded equipment currently in use.

Jerry Taylor, Hospital Administrator explained that the Medical Staff, including three physicians, Drs. Mario Manese, David McClellan and R. L. Kleeberger, had jointly strongly recommended the purchase of the new equipment, and had offered advice as to its design.

The new equipment will enhance the Hospital's ability to provide more adequate and accurate monitoring facilities for area patients.

Foul Play Ruled Out In Shooting

An intensive investigation conducted jointly by Spearman Police and the Hansford County Sheriff's office has determined that the death, Friday, Feb. 2nd of Daryl Lynn Keith was the result of a self inflicted gun shot wound.

Keith had been in ill health and had just been released from the Hansford Hospital where he had been a patient.

Keith's body was found Friday around 5:45 p.m. at 419 S. Brandt, in Spearman. He had died as a result of a 20 gauge shot gun bullet in the abdomen.

A note, reportedly left by the victim was analysed by State Hand writing experts in Lubbock.

There were apparently no witnesses to the shooting. A coroner's inquest conducted by Justice of the Peace Johnny Vernon, along with evidence presented by the two law enforcement agencies resulted in the verdict.

Volunteers Working On History Book Mailing

A mailing list of several thousand names is being compiled by volunteer workers for the Hansford County History Book. Names on the book project mailing list will receive a letter in a few weeks explaining the book and how to submit the family story. Addresses include all present and former residents of the county known to the group from several list sources. The mailing list is currently open to public inspection at the Stationmaster's House Museum. All interested are invited (and urged) to check the file to see if the group has missed anyone who should be included in the county's history.

Names may also be mailed to the Stationmaster's House Museum, 30 S. Townsend St., Spearman, TX, and volunteers will check to make sure those names are included and addresses are correct.

Because the Historical Society believes the history of Hansford County is to a great extent the history of the people who have lived and worked here, a primary section of the book will include family histories. Each family unit is entitled to a space of 500 words to tell their stories without any charge.

Whether you have lived in the county for a month or 60 years, your family story is wanted and needed. Just write it as if you were telling the story to a friend or relative.

Each family unit may submit up to three black and white photographs with the story. Every effort will be made to use at least one photo per family,

and more will be used if space allows.

The society expects there will be some confusion as to the "family unit" which qualifies for the free 500 words of history. Mom, dad and all the kids are a family unit. However, if one of the kids has gone off and started a family on their own, that is another family unit.

Generally speaking it would be safe to assume that members of the same immediate family who do not reside under the same roof are each a "family unit." The deadline has not been set for the receiving of the letters but it is expected to be with-in six weeks after the mailing has gone out.

Arrival of a letter is not necessary for submission of stories. They should be typed and double spaced if possible.

Hansford Hospital District Trustees will face a change of meeting date as a result of action taken at Thursday's meeting. Acting on a motion by Jimmy Vernon of the Finance Committee, the Board voted to meet in the future on the First Thursday after the Second Monday. Vernon explained that it would facilitate the work of the office staff in preparing necessary financial reports for the Board. The next meeting regularly scheduled will now be March 15th.

Plaintiff Awarded \$32,409.00

Joel Lee Lackey, Plaintiff in a negligence damage suit that had named Palo Duro Feeders Inc., of Gruver as a defendant, was awarded \$32,409.00 in damages late Thursday night by an 84th District Court jury of five women and six men.

Lackey, the 1977 Conser-vationist farmer of the year had claimed damages resulting from a fire he claimed was caused by a negligent welder at Palo Duro Feeders in March of 1976. The trial lasted two days.

The fire, according to Lackey, had allegedly destroyed over 1100 trees amongst other losses incurred on his ranch.

Warren Procter, Director of Soil Conservation in Hansford County was a key witness in the trial.

Lackey was represented by Attorney Ron Nickum, while Palo Duro Feeders was represented by Richard Stokes.

The Hon. Judge Richard Countiss presided.

Nursing Home Still Pondered

Hansford Hospital District Board members are still apparently studying the pros and cons of various nursing home facilities in Hansford County.

A verbal report was presented to the Trustees Thursday night with reference to a visit by several members to a Dumas facility.

There have been other reports that have been presented from other nursing care facilities. The Board has suggested that further study be made of other facilities before any decision or recommendations are made.

There was discussion as to the benefits of a Skilled Nursing home program as compared to a "Class III" program. The Skilled Nursing Home program would require a licensed Nursing Staff. The Class III would have provisions for a "Medication Aid."
