## Concrete Watering Tanks on Main St.

Mr. A. D. Shook, the Tahoka real estate dealer is again busy with a force of men improving Main Street. He put in two nice substantial concrete watering troughs, or rather tubs, as they are round. Each tub has the edge protected by cast iron strips set in the ground and a belt 2x6 around the top of the posts with the tub rim. The trees in the middle of the street have been covered with heavy cedar posts and two belts of 2x6 making good protection for the trees and excellent hitching racks. The trees between the first two blocks north from the public square are enclosed in a substantial manner with the concrete watering tubs at the north end and a hydrant at the south end of each block thus furnishing good pure, clean water from the fire hydrant for man and beast.

## War Exists Between U. S. and Mexico

While war has not been declared yet by either the United States or Mexico, it is expected that Huerta will declare war at once. O'Shaughnessy, American Charge has been handed his passports and left Mexico for Vera Cruz Thursday accompanied by Huerta's chief of staff. He is expected to arrive safely tomorrow.

Algara de Terreros, Mexican Charge, was handed his passports and left Washington Thursday for Toronto, Canada, accompanied by the chief of the secret service.

Americans are in complete possession of Vera Cruz, the marines have advanced three miles beyond the city. Twelve Americans have been killed and 50 wounded so far and the Mexican killed reaches into the hundreds.

Mexican Federals and the populace were reported to be attacking Americans at Ensenada, 90 miles south of San Diego, at 5:30 p. m. Thursday. The Monitor and Cheyenne left for the scene of trouble during the night.

General Villa arrived in Juarez from Torreon Thursday afternoon. He says he will not be dragged into war with the United States by anyone.

Governor Colquitt has taken steps to guard the 800 miles of Texaa border with home guards officered by Rangers and armed by the state. The Texas National Guard will be held ready to respond to the first call of the federal government.

The Mexicans working on the section gang here, all went up to Staton on the local Thursday, and the rumor spread over town that they going home to Mexico, but they came back on the down train in the afternoon.

Later: It is reported on good authority that the hembres will certainly leave Saturday morning.

**Location of American Banks Abroad Would Help Our Trade In Foreign Countries**



By Secretary of Commerce WILLIAM C. REDFIELD

A VERY weak spot in our foreign trade is our unwillingness to give the credit which the foreign buyer expects and which our competitors offer. True, there are foreign houses having their own offices in American cities who may prefer to buy cash against documents because they can buy more closely in that way and American houses who have become experienced in foreign trade do extend reasonable credits. But, as a rule, our American concerns and especially those who are new to the foreign field SEEM TO HAVE A FEAR THAT THE FOREIGNER IS GOING TO PLAY SOME SORT OF TRICK UPON THEM and insist that their goods shall not go out of the country until they have the money in hand.

It is no doubt true that there are places and persons with whom this is necessary. One cannot abandon caution in the foreign field any more than he can do without it at home. On the other hand, it is also true that in every important foreign city there are business houses a debt from whom is as good an asset as one might want. The concerns with which it has been my privilege to be associated in the past years have sold certain carefully selected concerns on open account precisely as they did in America and without loss.

IN DISCUSSING THIS, HOWEVER, IT MUST NOT BE FORGOTTEN THAT OUR FOREIGN COMPETITORS HAVE AN ADVANTAGE OVER US—SOON, WE HOPE, TO PASS AWAY—IN THE PRESENCE OF GREAT BANKS ALL OVER THE WORLD TO ASSIST THEM IN THEIR COLLECTIONS AND WHOSE SERVICES CANNOT BE GIVEN TO US WITH THE SAME ENTHUSIASM AS TO THEIR OWN NATIONALS. WE HOPE UNDER THE NEW CURRENCY LAW—AND, INDEED, IT IS DISTINCTLY PROPHESED BY WELL KNOWN FINANCIAL MEN—THAT IN TWO YEARS OR SO WE SHALL HAVE AMERICAN BANKS ABROAD PREFERING TO AID AMERICAN MERCHANTS AND MANUFACTURERS IN THE EXTENSION OF THEIR FOREIGN TRADE.

## Settle With Colombia; South America Condemns Us

By GEORGE H. BLAKESLEE, Professor of History, Clark University

SOME SETTLEMENT WITH COLOMBIA FOR THE ALLEGED WRONG INFLICTED BY THE SEIZURE OF PANAMA IS ESSENTIAL IN ORDER TO WIN THE UNQUALIFIED RESPECT OF THE PEOPLES OF SOUTH AMERICA. WE NEED NOT CONDEMN THE PAST ACTION OF OUR OWN GOVERNMENT TO REALIZE THE NECESSITY FOR THIS STEP, FOR SINCE IT IS THE GENERAL BELIEF IN EVERY ONE OF THE SOUTHERN REPUBLICS THAT THE UNITED STATES TOOK PANAMA UNJUSTLY, IT IS CLEAR THAT COLOMBIA'S CLAIMS MUST EITHER BE ADJUSTED BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT OR ELSE THE ISSUE MUST BE FRANKLY SUBMITTED TO ARBITRATION. IT IS GRATIFYING TO KNOW THAT THE STATE DEPARTMENT SOME LITTLE TIME AGO BEGAN NEGOTIATIONS WITH COLOMBIA WITH THE HOPE OF MAKING SOME ARRANGEMENT SATISFACTORY TO BOTH COUNTRIES.

The Panama incident is looked upon as the MOST STRIKING EXAMPLE OF OUR DISREGARD OF THE RIGHTS OF LATIN AMERICAN STATES and is even pointed to by some as an indication that the United States plans in due season to conquer and annex all of the remaining countries to the south of us. A prominent Peruvian author recently wrote: "To save ourselves from Yankee imperialism the SOUTH AMERICAN REPUBLICS WOULD ALMOST ACCEPT A GERMAN ALLIANCE OR THE AID OF JAPANESE ARMS. Everywhere the Americans of the north are feared."

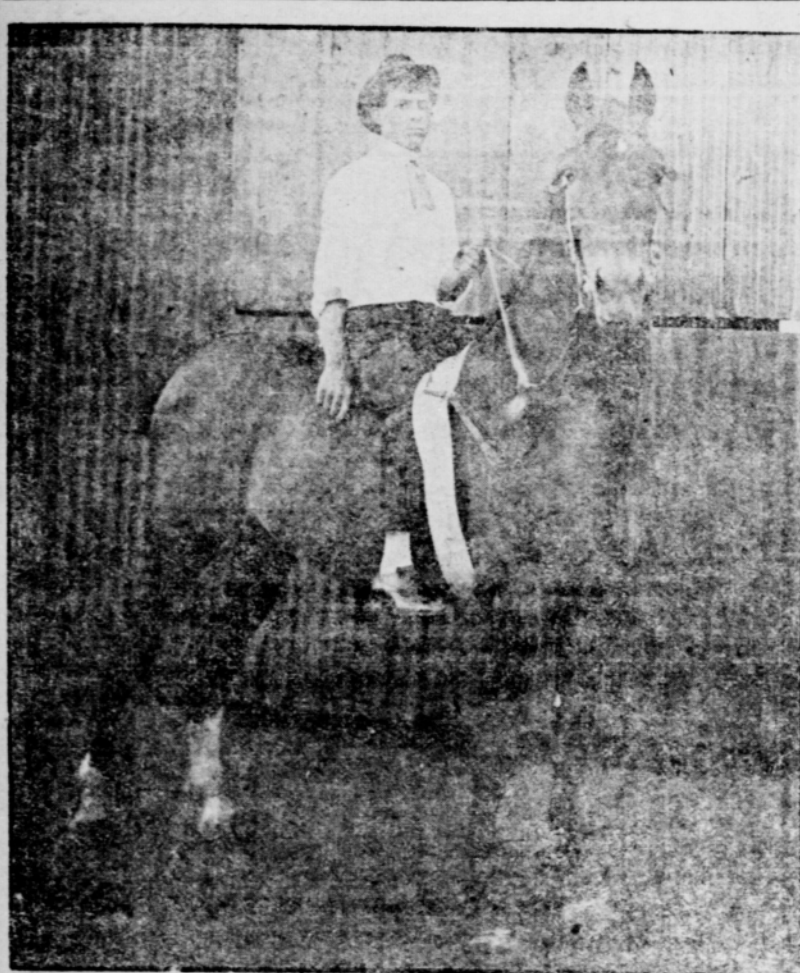

## TEXAS FACTS

### AGRICULTURE

Texas has more farms than any state in the Union—417,776 in number.

The Texas farms produce \$662,598,000 annually.

Eighteen new farms are opened up in Texas every day.

The value of all Texas farm property is \$2,218,645,000.

Texas ranks third with other states in value of farm property.

Fifty-three per cent of the farms of Texas or 219,575 are operated by tenants and 198,195 or 47 per cent are farmed by their owners and managers.

Texas has more farm home owners than any state in the Union.

Sixty-six per cent of the farm home owners of Texas have no mortgage on their property.

The average Texas farm contains 269 acres, 65 of which are cultivated.

Fifty per cent of the wealth of Texas is invested in agriculture.

Texas farm property increases in value at the rate of \$3,500,000 per day.

The value of the average Texas farm is \$5,311; of this amount \$3,909 is invested in land, \$503 in buildings, \$136 in implements and machinery, and \$73 in livestock.

The average value of Texas farm land (improved and unimproved) is \$14.53 per acre.

There are 318,988 native-white farmers, 28,864 foreign-born white and 69,918 negro farmers in Texas.

The average tenant farm of Texas contains 115 acres while the average size of those operated by owners is 353 acres.

About 33 per cent of the Texas farms are mortgaged. The mortgage indebtedness is approximately \$225,000,000.

The average mortgage debt of a Texas farm is \$1,548; the average equity \$4,619.

IN France every woman is a good cook. I mean it, literally, every woman. That is not true in this country. Now, I am a lawyer and a government inspector of labor, yet I assure you I can COOK ANYTHING AND EVERYTHING. Here you teach your girls to be doctors and lawyers and what not in the professions, but you do not teach them to be cooks. So there must be a great dearth of cooks in this country.

COOKING IS NOT A SCIENCE TO BE ACQUIRED FROM BOOKS. IT IS THE THING YOU SHOULD TEACH YOUR CHILDREN WHEN THEY ARE LITTLE AND NEAR THEIR MOTHERS AND NEAR THE STOVE.

I don't want to create the impression that I have not had ANYTHING FIT TO EAT in the United States. I have visited in homes here where the cooking has been very good; but, as a rule, you do consider too much that COOKING IS A SCIENCE, and you do not enough consider that it is really an art.

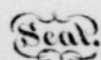
