Wednesday's victory was the first since 1991 for the MHS band, Lovett said. It was also the 15th sweepstakes in the history of the MHS band that the school has received.

"The students played very well and I am extremely proud of them. They showed everyone what I have been telling them all along. Martha and I are very proud of them," Lovett said.

Competing in the 3A and 4A Regional Band Contest, the Mighty "M" Band, received rave reviews from the judges.

Another judge, wrote, "Good attention to details. Very musical. Excellent percussion work, all parts covered. Very musical legato section. Very attentive."

No one was at the home at the time the fire started. It took about eight firefighters 30 minutes to put out the fire. No one was injured in the incident.

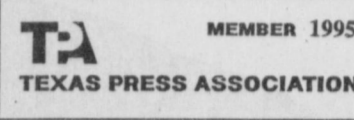

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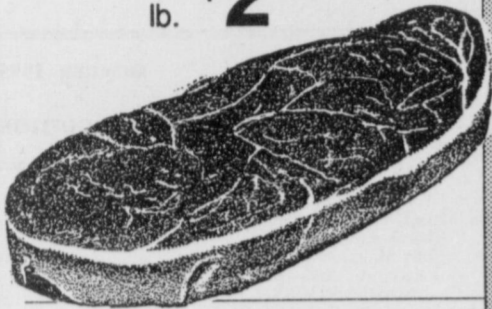
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Comments on Bald Eagle are welcome

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is reopening a 30-day public comment period on its proposal to reclassify the bald eagle from an "endangered" to "threatened" status throughout most of the lower 48 States.

Bald eagles in the Southwestern United States were not recommended for the improved threatened status in the original July 1994 proposal; rather, they were proposed to remain as endangered. Additional information on bald eagle populations in that area has since been received which could affect the Service's decision and could result in the southwestern population's inclusion under threatened status.

A final determination on the bald eagle's nationwide status under the Endangered Species Act is scheduled for July 1995.

The Service originally proposed retention of endangered status for southwestern bald eagles because it believed those eagles might be reproductively isolated. This new information will be used in the final determination of whether to finalize the original proposal or to reclassify the southwestern eagles as threatened.

A public comment period is being reopened to ensure that residents of (principally)

Arizona, New Mexico, and west Texas are aware that a reclassification to threatened status is being considered, and that the new information prompting that reconsideration is available for their review. As in all reclassification proposals, the July 1994 initial proposal stated the possibility that new information obtained during public comment periods could result in a final determination that varies from the original proposal.

Bald eagles in Alaska are not protected under the Endangered Species Act, and the July 1994 proposal has no effect on eagles in that State.

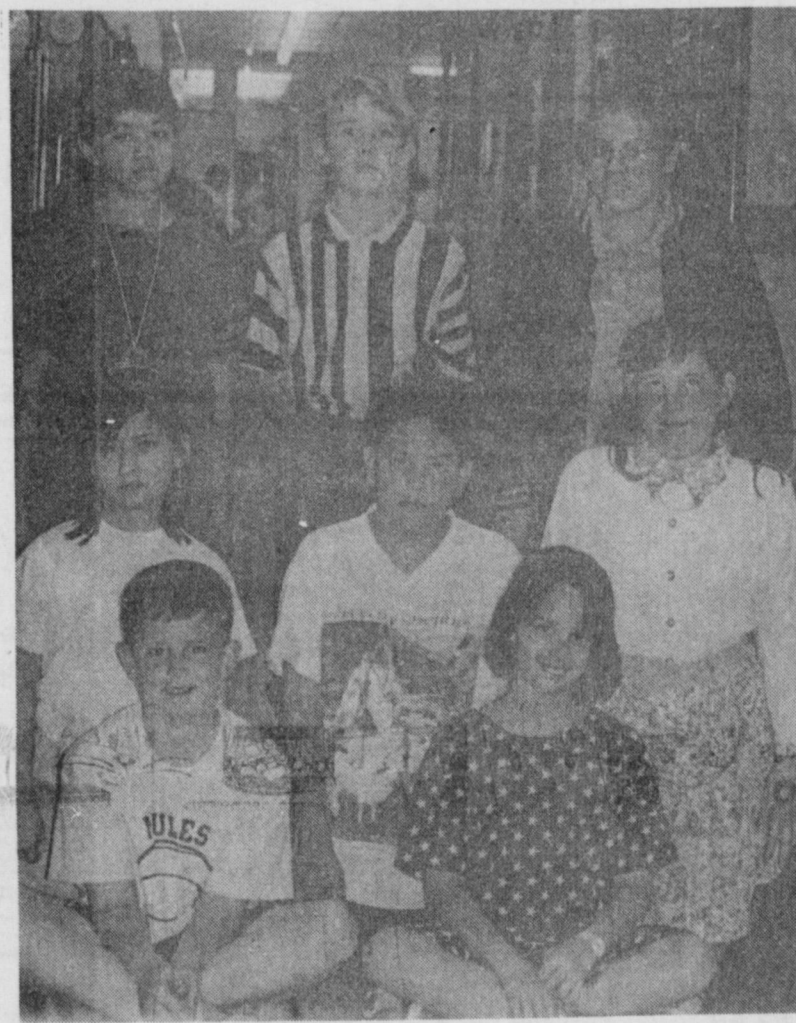

Comments on the reclassification proposal and on the new information should be submitted to the Fort Snelling office at the address given above.

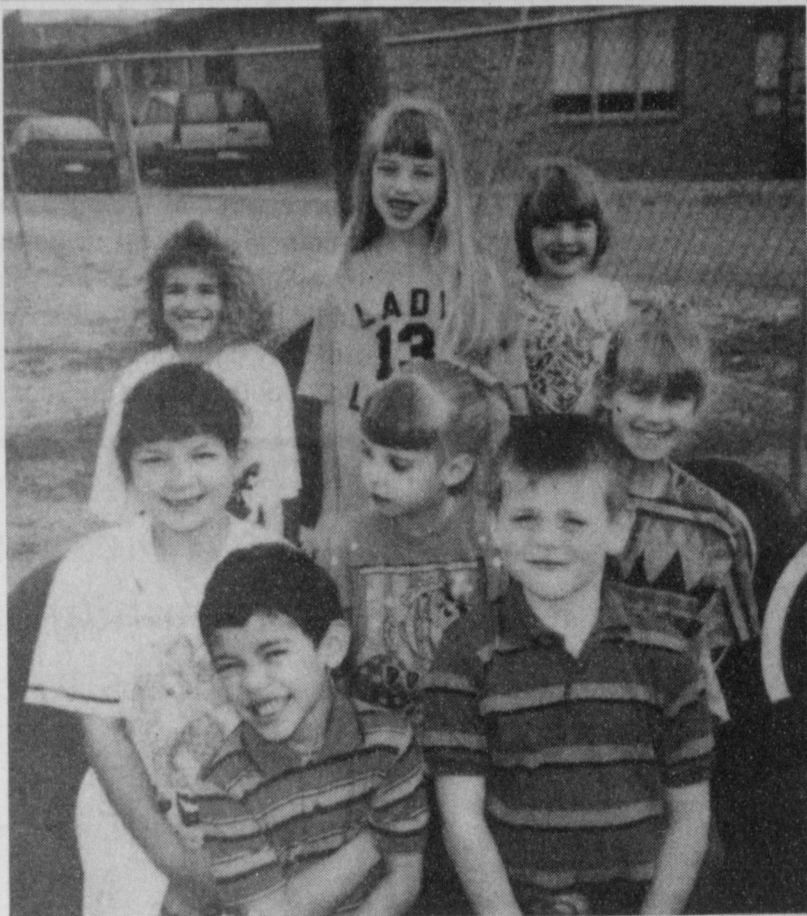

I love the words of the Apostle Peter as he assures us that by the mercy of the living God all who through the blood of Christ have entered into a covenant relationship with Him

And then at the fateful last supper, Jesus had looked at him and said, "Peter, before the rooster crows, you will deny me three times."

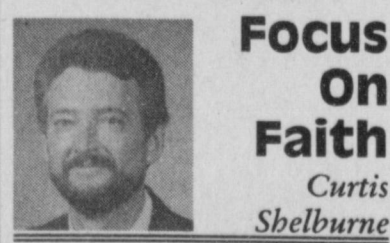
Peter was aghast. He screamed inside and then aloud, "Lord, I would go to prison for you! I would die for you!"


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Remembering a white April and year 3,000 lbs. of grain stolen


