# GOODNIGHT RANCH AND THE BUFFALO.

Goodnighe, Texas, July, 16,
Editor Daily Panhardigle:
Dear Sir,-Under the feading of the "Passing of the Buffalo" an article has been going the rounds. effect that the last of the buffalo have been shipped out of Texas -that Cóte Chisfes Goodnight has recently sold the last of a small(?) heed that he has for several years Kept on the famous Goodnight ranch-to the Britiah government and they have been shipperd to the purchasers. Both on the authority of Col. Goodnight and from my own tifowlecge. 4 am abie to state that the article in question is $x$ hol Iy Iffectotaliy at variance wish the facts and will not attempt a reriewal in detail of a common error of opinion which largely obtains as to the passing of the Buffalo.
The aricle in question says that the Goodnight Buffalo herd has been sold to the British government and; shipped ta Canada and that the efforts to perpetwate them has been a failture. On the contra. rymo proposition has ever beem rade to Col. Goodwight by any azent of the British governmient or otherwise to purchase bis Bulfalo. and never before lbave they been in finer condition or more prolific than during the present-season. Aready twenty calves have been born in the pure bred herd bringing the vumber of pure Buffalo up to eighty head.
This same allezed news item tefers adversely to Mr Goodnizbt's efforts to cross breed the bruffalo with domestic catlle, promouncieg his effortsa failture. This statement is in the sanve category with the rest of this tumwarranted libibel. A fixed type of quarter-Biaffalo and three-quarters domestic bloods has aiready beetm established here so that it can be perpetwaterd by proven fertility on both sides. While there if jousg stock coming on that arits no doubt emable this breeder to fix a type of half bloods with fertivility on both sides. there is also $a$ certainty that the quarterblood sires successaf willy mate witho three-quarter seven-eighths and full-blood Beffalo cowes with whom they have beem. reared and it is simply a question of thetir matwaity to demonstrate their further fertility. Jbeen known ot the froniler that the male Buffatigraied with do mestic citilaiz, wpith! siccessfully crae with aichocattle in the "pita Buction of female offopring but
that when the resultant calf was a male that enther the micther cow or calf would die bint that by breeding the pure Buffalo to the halfblood the birth of a three guarter buffalo blood male çould be produced and that swch animal would be non-fertile.

- While the female litue could be bred on indefenitely suntil the domestic blood retained would almost be eliminated, however, to contiflue this chafacter of breedivigthe lioodo of iliz purebred. Buffalo in his native purrity dey draw on. Many of the practieat breeders have been of the opinion that it were possibite to produce a half-phood male that there was a probability that stuch an animal might prove fertile atd by so doing that the blood of the Buffala might be carried on for ages in the blood of domentic cattle so that the original type of the Buffalo coutd be proticerd at the wifl of the breeder. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating the Office of Commizsioner of Agriculture.
Joint Resolution proposing an amend-
ment to Article four (4) of the Coustitution of the State of Texas, by adding theretos section to be known as Siec tion 27, providing for a Depatanent of Agriculture, with a hurean of jabor. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.
Sacrion 1. That Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 27, when a majority of the qualified electors of the Legisiature of Texas at an election for that purpose shall-vote in favor of the smendment, shall read as follows:
Section 27. The Legislature shall provide for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture, who shal! be either elected by the quailified voters of the State, or appointed by the Giovernor -ith the sdivice and cor sent of two-thirdsof the Senate as the Legisiature may provide; whose term of office, duties and salary shall be prescribed by law; in which department there shall be catablished by the Legislature a bu reau of labor, when required by the publie finterest.

Szc. 2. The Governor of this State is aereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the snomission of tuis resolation to the qualitied vuters for mambers of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Censtutution of Texas, to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 19v7. All porsons favoring said smendment shali have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor" And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows "Against the amendment to the Censtitution, providing for a Department of Agrieulture and a Bureau of Labor." And the sum of ( $\$ 9000$ ) two thousand

The Deed of Trust calls for all lines now in operation and to be constructed. That there will be sonething done in the way of railroad soon, there can be no doubt.
