Although the facts of this, complicated work are as I have crudely presented them above, it was not Mr. Goodnight's desire that anything authoritative concerning his efforts should be given out as scientific fact until his present generation of "Castalo" arriv ed at maturity and put the question of their successful perpetuation beyond the possibility of a sceptics. There is now about 150 head of variously graded and bred "Cattalo" on the Goodnight ranch and there is no doubt about the perpetuation of the full bred herd in its purity nor is there in my mind any doubt but that the "Catfalo" in the near future will furnish cross bred sires from which his exact form in in a few genera-

### SURVEYORS IN TAHOKA.

PANHANDLE SHORT LINE SURVEYING CREW ARE NOW AT WORK IN AND AROUND TAHOKA.

Mr. Hans Helland the chief engipeer of the Panhandle Short Line crew came in last Friday and straightway made themselves at home in Rahoka.

When anyone belonging to a railroad comes to Tahoka we take them right in just like they were our own kinfolks. Section I. That Section 9 of Article . of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section Sa, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of Texas. to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 1907. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor " And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And the sum of (\$2000) two thousand dellars or so much thereof as many be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publications, proclamation and election.


