2. Length of His Reign (v. 3). He reigned fifty-two years. His mother's name was Jecoliah, which means "Jehovah is able," or "Made strong of Jehovah."

3. His Character (v. 4). He did that which was right in the sight of the Lord.

4. His Prosperity (v. 5). He definitely sought God while Zechariah lived, and because he sought him God made him to prosper as long as he continued to seek him. He, like Joash before him, turned aside when the influence of the man of God was re-

1. He Built Eloth (v. 2). This was sioner. a port on the Red sea which had been lort to Judah. No doubt it was the am of the father to get possession of this port, so the son makes its restoration his first duty. It was an important trading point and the commercial interests of the nation would be greatly increased by its possession.

2. He Had Military Success (vv. 6-8). (1) He conquered the Philistines (v. 6). After subduing them he dismantled their fortified cities and built new cities in their stead. (2) He defeated the Arabians (v. 7). (3) He made the Ammonites across the Jordan pay tribute (v. 8).

3. He Fortified Jerusalem (vv. 9-15). He took advantage of the peace which was now enjoyed because of the subjugation of his enemies to fortify Jerusalem. He placed in the towers great engines of war for hurling

While raging in his wrath and about to burn incense he was smitten with leprosy, a dreadful, incurable and unclean disease. This judgment came upon him as a consequence of his overweening pride and vanity. He was NEW LIFE SAVER FOR AUTOMOBILES thrust out of the sanctuary-excluded conscience smote him, and he hurriedly went out because he knew that the Lord had smitten him. He not only was excluded from the place of worship, but was dethroned. His son Jotham was made regent. His judgment was:





Apart From Improved Appearance, the Economy of Such Proceeding Should Be Apparent.

When the floor coverings and win dow hangings are removed in the spring there is no better medium of cleanliness than a fresh coat of paint, varnish or enamel-they stand in front ranks as the best sanitary agents

As a medium for saving the surface and conserving property-painting and varnishing has been demonstrated as an investment of the first order and its economy is recognized by all thoughtfui citizens. Every dollar invested in paint and varnish saves several dollars in depreciation. Paint and varnish prevents the expense of repairs which arise from lack of proper surface protection. If all property owners fully realized the loss which takes place when painting and varnishing is postponed, they would be inclined to paint and varnish more

#### Look to the Lawn Now.

If the lawn is shabby in places this is the time to renew it. Fork over the thin spots, working in some good fertilizer, such as pulverized sheep manure, and after leveling the ground sow a good grade of fine lawn grass seed. Rake in the seed, and finish with the roller. The remainder of the lawn should also have attention. Rake it first to pull out all dead growth, and top dress with a good fertilizer. Moss in the lawn is a sure indication of sour soil; this can be remedied by a dressing of lime after first having raked out as much of the moss as possible. Lime is, however, best applied in the late fall, following with a dressing of quick acting fertilizer in the early spring.






