NO PRIMARY TO BE HELD IN CROSBY COUNTY.

Following is the substance of a letter to our County Clerk, J. C. Woody who is also chairman of the Democratic executive committee, from the attorney general of Texas touching county primaries:

"It is mandatory upon all political parties to hold primary elections in each county, for the purpose of nominating candidates for all county, district and state offices.

"The failure to hold primaries will necessitate the securing, (printing?) upon the official ballot the names of all persons who desire to run for county offices as 'independant,' or 'non partison.'"

The foregoing letter is a correct exposition of the law and shows no necessity for primaries out here because there are no party lines drawn in county affairs in Crosby county, nor ever has been, and every man runs as a "non-partisan." The financial burden imposed by law is hard, even on the successful ones, but to the defeated it is indeed hard, and many would feel its effects for some time. Hence we most heartily endorse our chairman's decision to hold no primaries in Crosby, and we believe that our people, who love "fair play," will also endorse unanimously, Bro. Woody's decision.—Crosby County News.

It is now that we must make or brake Tahoka. Was it because you did not care? Do you want Tahoka to be a "hissing and by-word"? Do you want people to come through here and say "yes they have good land and good natural advantages, but the bumest set of citizens I ever saw"? That is what strangers will say if you go on letting Gail, Lamesa, Sparingburg and Brownfield secure all the enterprises and turn the business to the county away from here! Perhaps you live out in the edge of the county and think you have no interest in Tahoka, if you do you are mistaken. Every citizen in Lynn County is, or should be, interested in Tahoka. You go back to your old home and if the County Seat is a live progressive town you dare not say any thing against it to its most remote citizen for he is proud of his

county seat and when he asks you about your home. Do you want to say? We have a fine county and all the natural advantages anyone could ask but the sorryest town and citizenship ever. Don't you do it for if you do you will prove yourself the sorryest one in the bunch. Raise good stock, cultivate your farms, keep up your fences, help your county seat town all you can, and when you go back home to see the folks you wont have to tell so many lies about this country that it will take a three weeks protracted meeting to get you back to the "straight and narrow way."

Cotton Gin Meeting.

The gin meeting Monday night was but poorly attended however a good start was made, Judge Perryman was elected chairman and made us a good talk on the need of Tahoka for a cotton gin and the advantage of knowing the man that put it in for us. For several days after this my master and mistress seemed very uneasy and restless—they would be always searching the papers, bringing them out under the willow to read, and hardly noticing me.

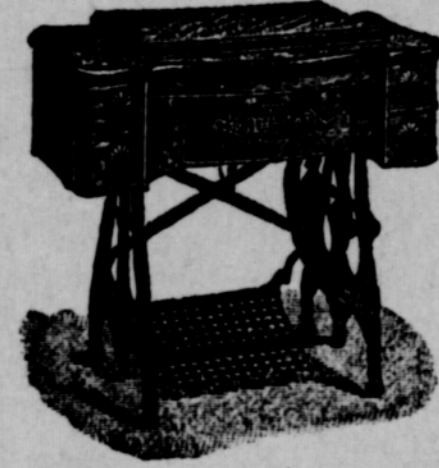

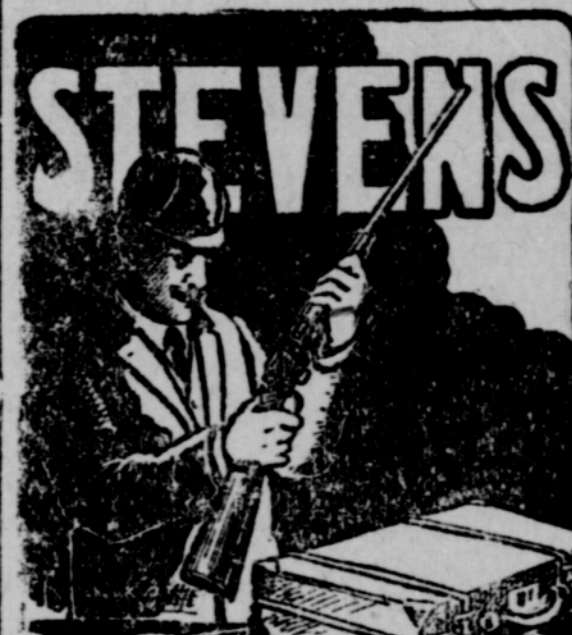
