ROUMANIAN THIRD DEGREE.
The Sweating Procese by which Confessions Are Forced from suspects and Prifoners.
"The prisoners in our country are treated like kings and princes as compared with those of Roumania," said John T. Ekalls, of Portland, Me., according to the Louisville Herald.
"I chanced to be in Roumania about six months ago and saw a man arrested. Being curious, I de termined to watch and learn what they did with him. He was not tried and released the next day, as he would have been in this country but was subjected to mediaeval tortures. He was whipjed with the so-called sand sausace, a bag filled with wet sand. This instru ment of torture inflicts terrible pain. but leaves no marks what ever on the body of the culprit.
"This particular prisoner was tortured in order to wrest from him a confession whether or not the kissing of an actress had been the result of a preconce:tad conapiracy. Hedenied it and was then treated to the joys of the 'ash bag' -that is. his head was mit in a bag filled with asbes. The jailers beat with a stick upon the bag. causing the ashes to penetrate into the eyes, month, nostrils and ears of the prisoner.
"The process was then wound up by what is known as the 'truth finder,' a sort of wooden forceps by which the temples of the pris oner are compressed. This was ton nuch for the man. He confessed a ie.

A new thing in naval propulsion hae been in construction for more than a rear on the root of an architecturat ron works building in New York. The new boat has been lowered to the street and taken to the North river, where it will be tested scon. The inventor believes that he will be able to produce a speed hitherto unheard of on the water The scheme involves the princtple ised by the squid. Beneath the boat running two-thirds of its length, beween the keel and the bottom is a tube 15 Inches in diameter. The tube is open at both ends. Within it are four propelers on a shaft, running the length of the tube, and attached by gearing to an engine in the center. The revolution of these screws drives the water violently from the tube. This concentrates the -aergy of the propellers in one direcion, instead of dissipating in every direction, as in the case of the ordinary crew. The boat is 30 feet long, and has five-foot beam. A $\mathbf{1 4}$-horsepower en gine will be used.
The inventor is a graduate in naval rchitecture of Cornell university, and vorked for two years at the Union Iron woris in San Francisco. He has experimented on this idea for several ears, and has made successful expert ments with several models.

Any child lawfully enrolled in any district may be transterrod to the enrollment of any other district upon the writen application of the parent or guardian of such child, fled with the county superinten dent, not later than the first of August, provided, the person mak iug application for transfer shall tate in said application that it 1 he bona fide intention to send o child shall be taansfered more than once.

EXAMINATIONS
The county board of examiner of each county shall, if necessary rold an exammation on the firs Friday and the Saturday following of the months of May, July, Au: gust, September and December of each year.
No county examination will be held in July this year for the rea son that the law does not become effective until July It, 1905
