Tahoka and Lynn County Will Be Advertised in Eastern, and Northern States

That Tahoka and Lynn county will receive publicity in the best manner along with other South Texas counties this summer, through the West Texas Chamber of Commerce educational advertising campaign, was stated beyond a doubt last Saturday morning, when a crowd of interested citizens met in the lobby of the First National Bank and Dr. O. H. Lloyd, of Vega, Texas, outlined the details of the campaign.

Within a very few minutes a sum of several hundred dollars was raised to secure for the county advertising space in an agricultural exhibit and a place on the screen of pictures composed of actual photographs of our staple crops and various types of residence and public buildings, etc.

Dr. Lloyd spoke for over an hour giving the details of the campaign, which is to start in June and last until about October 1. The project, which will entail an expenditure of approximately \$40,000.00, will be made up by town and county subscriptions.

The plan contemplates the installation of sixteen states with airplanes and a two-ton truck exhibition bearing products of West Texas and the Panhandle—a territory reaching from El Paso and the Rio Grande to the Gulf of Mexico.

Tons of literature depicting the beauties of the West will be carried on the planes and dropped over small towns and communities, large cities and distributed in cities at which the planes will stop.

This is a long step toward bringing Lynn county and the West Plains in the proper light before the eyes of the people in the north and east, who live under the impression that this vast expanse of country is next to the nothing off place, and will arouse interest in the West to be stimulated and a volume of new migration will set in.

All Lynn county citizens who are interested in seeing the county grow and settled up with better farmers and better farmers could help out financially in the matter. Subscriptions to this matter will be received at either of the banks. All will be more or less benefitted, and it is right and fair that all have a part in the affair. Help boost Lynn county by doing your part in this campaign. Neighboring towns and communities are requested to take a hand and assist financially in advertising the county.

Hon. R. A. Baldwin Assaulted In Lubbock

According to local officers the story last November when "Fuzzy" Carraway and H. J. Gentry, white men, and Dan Adams, Elmer Staden, and James Raymond, colored, were arrested by W. B. Jones, special officer for the Santa Fe, and a charge of shooting craps filed against them in the city court. The three negroes plead guilty and payed their fines. The white men appealed their cases to the county court.

Their cases came up in Lubbock last Mon. At the special request of the county Attorney McGee Mr. Baldwin took charge of the prosecution there. Carraway was put trial before a jury and the maximum fine of \$50 was imposed on him. Gentry offered to plead guilty and was fined \$35.

From reports given by county officials at Lubbock it was learned that Carraway became offended, waited in the court house lobby, and as Mr. Baldwin came down, loaded with four large books on one arm and holding a grip in the other hand, he was attacked by Carraway without any warning, breaking Mr. Baldwin's glasses as he struck him in the face, otherwise injuring him.—Slaton Slatonite.

FERTILE VALLEYS ONCE SPAS GIVING NATURE FAIR CHANCE

Naturalists of Opinion They Were Laid Bare by Great Convulsions of Nature.

Many of the most fertile valleys and plains in the world appear to be the bottoms of ancient lakes laid dry, an exit having been opened by some convulsion of nature, in some instances by mere gradual operations, for the waters that were previously enclosed by impenetrable barriers.

Most of the great rivers were formerly successions of lakes, like the St. Lawrence river in North America. The level spaces between the Allegheny mountains and other parallel chains appear to have been inland lakes, until the rivers which descended from these heights formed for themselves exits.

The Euxine and Caspian seas, as well as Lake Aral and several others, are the remains of an extensive sea, which covered the great part of the north of Asia, according to the belief of Peter Simon Pallas. It has been conjectured that the opening of the Bosphorus was the occasion of the draining of this ocean to the midst of Europe and Asia, the memory of this disruption of the two continents being preserved in the traditions of Greece.

APPROVED WRAPS -- FOR SUMMER --



SUMMER time will see some of the most beautiful wraps that have ever been made under the inspiration of its sunny skies. Designers must be dreaming of it when they begin, in the heart of winter, to fashion cloaks and coats to be used months afterward, but destined to have their first airings at the fashionable winter resorts. The styles favored by women of trained judgment, are promoted, and they become the fashions of the summer season.

Among the taffeta wraps there are such masterpieces of superb designing as that which compels our homage in the garment shown in the picture. You must imagine it in peacock blue silk, with wide black satin ribbon having a line of gold along the edges, outlining the sleeves and simulating a deep yoke that reaches to the waistline in front. The skirt of the coat is cut in long pointed panels that overlap, and there is a large and very becoming collar with silk cord and tassel in the color of the cloak that ties about it. Huge, embroidered roses, set in leaves cut from black satin and outlined with gold thread, make a decoration that measures up to the excellence of the design. They are placed at each side on a panel and at the waistline on one side.

Another wrap of taffeta has a deep yoke with a full cape gathered to it under a band of embroidery. Black taffeta was chosen for this cape with embroidery in sapphire blue and blue satin lining. It was shorter than the wrap pictured.

THE outstanding excellence of children's clothes for spring lies mostly in their simplicity and their neatness, and neatness in children's apparel is another name for smartness. Leaving furbelows to party frocks, designers have taken blue serge, plaid woolens and many substantial cotton goods and turned them into enchanting things for little girls to spend their days in.

For the younger girls serge dresses with bloomers to match or with bloomers of plaid material leave nothing to be desired. Dresses for everyday wear: Detachable white collars and cuffs of linen or heavy cottons or flannel, start the little maid off in the morning properly freshened up for school. When the weather is warm a pretty chambray or gingham dress replaces serge for daily wear. The care and the success with which they have been designed is convincingly shown in the box-plated school dress of chambray pictured above at the right.

It is a one-piece dress with plain body, elbow sleeves and box-plated skirt. It is fitted with a deep vestee and white collar and cuffs, these edged with a very narrow braid or lace that look like tatting. The plain belt, with flat pockets set over it at the sides, is made of the chambray.

SINALOA TOWNS TAKEN BY SONORA FORCES

REBELS ON THE AGGRESSIVE AND CARRANZA TROOPS REPORTED JOINING RANKS.

Agua Prieta, Sonora.—Military forces of the new "republic of Sonora" have crossed the state line of Sinaloa, captured two towns and are continuing toward Culiacan, capital of the neighboring state, thus taking the aggressive in the state's fight against the Carranza government of Mexico.

El Fuerte, one of the most important mining camps in Sinaloa, about 15 miles from the Sinaloa-Sonora boundary, and San Blas, railroad junction point, have fallen to the Sonora forces, according to official information received here. Reports that six other states had joined forces with the Sonora movement against Carranza remains unconfirmed. It was known that agents and sympathizers with the Sonora movement are active throughout the republic seeking aid.

Sonora officials declare that Carranza troops in Sinaloa in large numbers are joining the Sonora forces. It also is reported that the commanders and crews of the two Mexican gunboats Guerrero and Chippas deserted to the Sonora movement and placed both vessels at the disposal of General P. Elias Calles, commander in chief.

This action now gives complete control of the Pacific seaboard to the De la Huerta government, as these were the only two war vessels of the Carranza government in Pacific waters. The seized German steamer Vorwarts, which now is being remodeled as a light cruiser and army transport, will be ready for service the middle of the coming week, thus giving the Sonora republic a war fleet of three ships.

PLAN TO GIVE EX-SOLDIERS BONUS OF \$1.00 PER DAY

Would Call for Raising Near \$1,000,000,000 by Placing Tax on All Sales.

Washington.—A cash bonus of \$1 for each day's service would be given to approximately 2,900,000 of the 4,800,000 men in the army, navy and marine corps during the war under a plan that has been approved by the bonus subcommittee of the house way and means committee.

The program, which will be submitted to the full committee for approval, calls for an expenditure of slightly less than \$1,000,000,000, which is to be raised by a tax of one-half of 1 per cent on all sales. It is considered very likely that this plan will be the one which will be submitted to the house in the near future.

LOWDEN CARRIES ILLINOIS IN PREFERENTIAL PRIMARY

Chicago, Ill.—Governor F. O. Lowden has carried his home state on the face of incomplete unofficial returns in the republican preferential primary, with Major Leonard Wood second and Senator Hiram Johnson third, his name being written in by the voters.

With 1,145 out of 5,690 precincts in the state missing Governor Lowden leads by 69,282 votes over General Wood. Senator Johnson polled 37,860 votes in 1,776 Cook county precincts. Figures from 4,544 precincts, including 1,776 in Cook county, gave Lowden 210,553 and Wood 141,271.

60c Per Pound For Staple

Montgomery, Ala.—Organization of a strong financial institution in each cotton-producing state in the south with co-ordination of these into an export cotton corporation to handle sales of the staple in the interest of the producers directly with foreign buyers, was unanimously endorsed at a session of the convention here of the American Cotton association. This action followed an address by Governor Dorsey of Georgia, in which he discussed the plan for forming such an institution developed in his state. The chief action taken was the unanimous approval of a committee report recommending 60c a pound as a minimum price for middling grade cotton.

May Cancel Basket Contracts

Athens, Texas.—In the Ash orchard at Ash switch, an examination of all most the entire orchard failed to show a single peach that had escaped the freeze. Not only the seed had turned black, but the whole peach has shriveled up. Many growers have made efforts to cancel their basket contracts.

Presbytery Session At Waxahachie

Waxahachie, Texas.—The Dallas presbytery opened its eighty-first annual session here. John S. Kerr of Sherman is the moderator.

St. Louis Population 773,000

Washington.—St. Louis, fourth largest city in the United States in 1910 now has a population of 773,000, the census bureau announces.

Alcohol Substitute For Gasoline

St. Louis, Mo.—Discovery of a new alcohol, made from wood and usable as grain alcohol, and in a mixture for gasoline substitute was described at the convention of the American Chemical Society in session here.

TENSE PRESSURE ON HER

LESSON FOR APRIL 25
RUTH'S WISE CHOICE.

Lesson Text—Ruth 1.
GOLDEN TEXT—Thy people shall be my people and thy God my God.—Ruth 1:16.

ADDITIONAL MATERIAL—Ruth 2:14.

PRIMARY TOPIC—The Story of Ruth.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Ruth and Naomi.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Life's Decisions.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Power of Personal Influence.

I. The Occasion of Ruth's Choice.
(1:1-15).
On account of the famine in Bethlehem-Juda, Naomi with her husband and two sons sojourned in the land of Moab. After the death of her husband, her two sons married Moabitish women. After a time her sons died also. Upon the death of her sons she resolved to return to her homeland, having heard that the Lord had visited his people in giving them bread. Her family went to Moab to escape trouble, but they only got into more trouble. It was not till Naomi was thus chastised that she resolved to return. She had the good sense to recognize that the hand of the Lord was upon her for good. Ruth and Orpah accompanied her. This she permitted, but determined to place before them frankly the difficulties which would necessarily confront them. It was this frank presentation of the difficulties and her repeated urging them to go back that furnished the occasion for Ruth's wise choice.

II. The Trials of Ruth's Choice (vv. 16-18).
Much as Naomi loved her daughters-in-law, she would not have them go into this matter blindly. She wished them to know the cost of their undertaking. She told them the worst that could come upon them, then if hardships came they could only blame themselves.

Note the difficulties which confronted Ruth:
1. No chance to get married again. Naomi told her that she had no more sons for which she could wait. In that day to be unmarried was the greatest disgrace. Furthermore, it was against God's law for the Jews to marry outside of their own people.

2. She must renounce her gods. Her idolatrous worship could not be carried on in the land where God's people dwell. This was delicately touched upon when Orpah went back (v. 15). Orpah went back when it was plain that there was no chance to get a husband. Now Naomi puts an additional test upon Ruth, that of giving up her religion. Naomi's very frankness in dealing with her caused Ruth to be more and more determined to cast her lot with her. No doubt she learned to love the true God through the life of this true woman. She was determined to share Naomi's journey, her home, her lodging, her lot in life and her grave in death, whatever that would be. To crown it all she would renounce her heathen gods and embrace Jehovah. When Naomi saw that Ruth's mind was fully made up she quit urging her.

III. The Glorious Issue of Ruth's Choice.
Ruth was never sorry for her choice, for:
1. She found the true God (v. 16).
2. She found human friends (v. 2). As she went to glean in the fields she was led to the field of Boaz—a man of wealth and grace. The servants of Boaz treated her with consideration; even Boaz gave instruction for special consideration to be given her.

3. A good husband and a happy home (chaps. 3 and 4). She not only secured a husband, but a man of God, who had abundance of this world's goods.

4. An honored place in the Israelite nation (4:13-17). Though she had to forsake her own people, she became one of a nobler people.

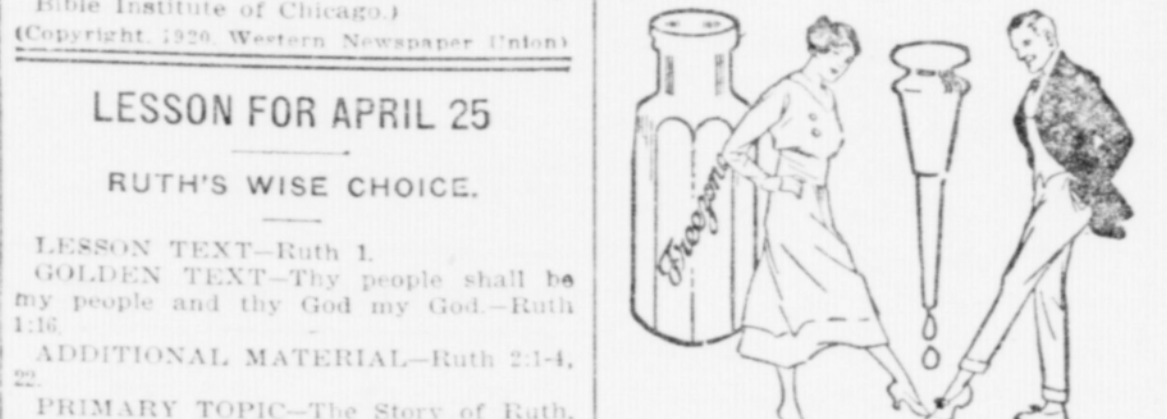
5. She became a link in the chain of Christ's ancestry (4:18-22; cf. Matt. 1:5). The one who fully decides for Christ and gives up all for him shall get a hundredfold in this life and in the world to come, eternal life.

This story is a fine exhibition of dispensational truth:
(1) The famine in the land indicates the testing of the Jews; (2) the going into Moab, the sojourn of the Israelites among the nations; (3) sickness and death in Moab, the chastisement of the Jews in their present age; (4) the return to the land, the gathering of Israel to their own land; (5) Ruth following, the gathering of the Gentiles through the influence of the Jews; (6) the marriage between Boaz and Ruth, the union of the church with Christ.

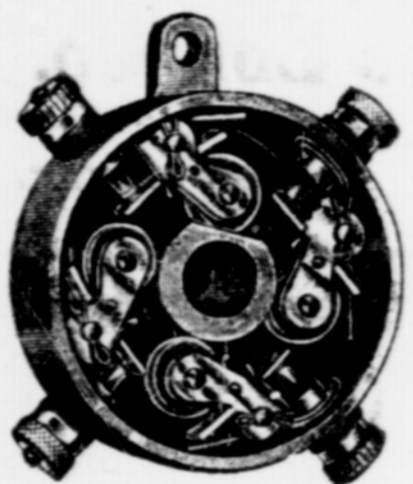

Governor W. P. Hobby will call a special session of the Legislature about the middle of May to deal with the pink boll worm situation.

Joseph Weldon Bailey, candidate for Governor of Texas, will deliver an address in Lubbock sometime during the month of May. It is expected that his followers in Lynn county will take advantage of this opportunity to hear him speak.

President Carranza has been asked to resign from office by Sonora war council, and a terrific battle is now raging for the possession of the Tampico oil fields between rebel forces and the Federal troops.

James E. Ferguson, former governor of Texas, has announced his candidacy for the office of President of the United States on the platform. Mr. Ferguson has declared himself in favor of light wines and beer, and would grant full pardon to Eugene V. Debbs, who is under conviction for alleged conspiracy to obstruct the draft.

What Tahoka needs is more people who will boost the town and country, and fewer moss-backs that carry the little hammer and knock on every feasible plan that is brought up to place the community in line with other progressive towns all about us. A live commercial organization would overcome this serious obstacle in the path of progress.

Tomorrow, May 1st, is the day set for the Tahoka Overall and Kahki club to appear in public clad in one or the other of these garments, to be worn continuously during the next ninety days. We suggest that those who signed the pledged and have since scratched their names from the list, kick in with the \$5 fine as a penalty, and thereby enhance the grave digging fund.

We are informed by one of our county officials that the work of leveling up the Courthouse yard and placing sidewalks around the yard and building has been passed upon for several weeks, but

had been unable to secure anyone thus far to take the contract to do the work. The News was unaware of this fact in suggesting that the County Commissioners make this improvement to promote civic attractiveness in our little city. It is hoped that something will be done in the matter that actual work may begin at an early date.

RAISE IN SUBSCRIPTION PRICE

On and after the 1st of May, 1920, the subscription price of the Lynn County News will be \$2.00 per year. The rapid advance in the price of news print paper—from 3c to 13c pound, and hard to get even at this sum—necessitates the advance in the price of the subscription, and even then there is nothing made on the paper. Other papers are being forced to raise the price of their papers or go bankrupt, and the management of the News prefers to remain on the right side of the ledger as long as it is possible to do so. Remember that on and after May 1st 1920, the News is \$2.00 year; \$1.00 for six months.

There will be 1,409 members in the Democratic State convention which will be held in Dallas May 25. This represents an increase from 885 votes to 1,409 and it will be the largest State convention in the history of Texas and probably the largest that will be convened in a number of years to come. The largeness of the membership is due to the fact that representation is based on the number of votes polled in the last primary, in which women voted without the payment of poll taxes. The basis is one vote in the convention for each 500 votes in the last primary.—Fort Worth Star Telegram.

Lynn county is given as having a total of 1,114 voters, which will give the county two votes in the Democratic State Convention at Dallas. These delegates will be selected at the county convention held in Tahoka, Tues. May 4th.

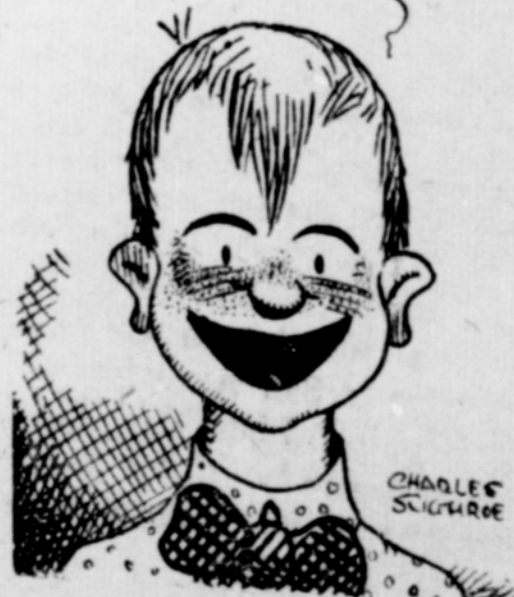
