The Western Light of Snyder, Smith & Jackson editors and publishers, has been enlarged to a six column quarto, all home print. This is the second enlargement in 12 months.

Messrs. Cecil Whipp and Geo. Foley, of the telephone crew are in town this week doing some work on the line here. They will return to Brownfield and finish the line there as soon as the rest of the material arrives.

Different Propositions.

Yes, the Panhandle Short Line is an essentially different proposition from the fake railroads that have proposed crossing the Plains: This is easily discernable by the manner of procedure. The fake road generally begins operations by getting a charter, which while it is essential, does not cost much and its no guarantee that the road will ever be built. On the other hand the Panhandle, began work by putting a corps of surveyors in the field, which as every one knows takes considerable money. The next move of the fake road is to send a representative over the proposed route, who holds a jumped up mass meeting at the principle points, making considerable fuss and noise, but costing the promoters little or no money, and as a general thing this is the last ever heard of them.

The Panhandle after spending good money making the preliminary surveys, decide on the most practicable route, keep right on spending money, going back and fourth, securing right-of-way, bonus and such things. After doing all these things, gaining the confidence of the people all along the line, making arrangements for the actual construction work to begin, even to putting the final survey party in the field. Then, and then only do they file the charter, which they did at Austin, March 26, 1907.
