The Santa 'e has its grade, completed to Tahoka and will be rumning trains in sixty Days It will afford us connection with Amarillo on he north and San Angelo on the south. We have offered the Texas Central $\$ 30,000$ and right-ofway to build to Tahoka fom Rotan and their surveyors are running the preliminary surveys through our county now. The Rock lsland has bought material and will build to Roswell via Tahoka.
