The supreme hour of our nation is at hand. facing a food shortage and the National Government is asking each lady of the household who handles foods for the family to co-operate with the National Government in conserving foods. and thereby secure a reduction in price of the staple foods. Each patriotic woman who handles the food for the home is asked by the National Government to sign the following card:

PLEDGE CARD FOR UNITED STATES FOOD ADMINISTRATION IF YOU HAVE ALREADY SIGNED, PASS THIS ON TO A FRIEND

I am glad to join you in the service of food conservation for our Nation, and I hereby accept membership in the United States Food Administration, pledging myself to carry out the directions and advice of the Food Administrator in my home, insofar as my circumstances permit.

There are no fees or dues to be paid. The Food Administration wishes to e as members all of those actually handling food in the home. Anyone may have the Home Card of Instruction, but only those signing pledges are entitled to Membership Window Card, which will be delivered upon receipt of the signed pledge.

Cut this card out after you have signed it with your full name and post office address and send it to me at once at Tahoka, Texas. The government is not asking you to reduce the standard of living but to use such foods as they suggest as near as your circumstances will permit. If you will co-operate with the government in signing these cards and following its suggestions as near as you can I am confident that in a short time we will see a reduction of the price of staple "We have rounded the foods. As Mr. Hoover has just said: corner of higher prices and I feel that we will soon see a reduction in prices of food products." We are in the grip of an awful war and if you love the government, if you wish to hold up the hands of your sons that have been called to the front to fight your battles, if you do not wish famine to stalk thro the land like a grim wolf, if you wish to show the boys who have been called to the colors that you are willing to help the government so that the boys at the front may be properly fed sign the above card and mail or send it to me at once. You should be willing to do this little service. If we do not co-operate with the national government in the card campaign, you may look to be put on a meal ticket basis in a short while. and I pray God that hour may not come to America. Let each housewife sign this card. Write her full name and post office and get it to me at once.

Judge Maddox brought the food at the outbreak of the war as an H. C. CRIE, Executive Committee.

## HIGHEST PEAKS NOT SCALED

Mountain Climbers Discuss Possibility of Daring Rare Atmosphere Above 24,000 Feet

At a meeting of the Royal Geographical society, Dr. A. M. Kellas presented an elaborate discussion of the question whether it is possible for well-trained mountaineers to ascend to the summits of the loftier peaks of the Himalaya mountains, more than 25,000 feet in altitude, none of which has so far been climbed.

The present altitude record in mountaineering is 24,000 feet, by the duke of the Abruzzi's expedition to the Karakorum, 1909. The altitude of the highest mountain in the Himalayas and in the world-Everest-is 29,141 feet. At that height the barometric pressure and the oxygen supply is only about one-third as great as at sea level, says the Scientific American.

The experiences of balloonists is not conclusive as to the physiological difficulties of such an ascent, because the rapid rise of a balloon does not give the aeronaut time to become acclimatized to great altitudes. On the basis of a large amount of data Doctor Kellas (himself an experienced mountaineer) expresses the opinion that a man in first-rate training, acclimatized to maximum possible altitude, could make the ascent to Mount Everest, provided the physical difficulties are not insu-

Progress of Lamp-Making.

Progress in the design of indoor lamps, which up to later years of the eighteenth century had been of shallow vessels, into which a short length of loose, pulpy wick dropped, began in France with Keger's flat wick, while in the following year, 1784, Aime Argand invented the round cylindrical burner which to this day, by whomsoever made, bears his name. Then in succession through the early nineteenth century came the numerous developments of the oil burner, beginning with the Vest lamp, produced in 1834; the flat-wick paraffin lamps, designed by Stobwasser of Berlin in 1850, and since 1854 commonly used in every city tenement dwelling room or humbler country homestead of England and America; the Duplex lamp, invented by Hinks of Birmingham, England, 1865; the Doty Triplex lamp, 1874; the Defries lamp, 1885, and the Wanzer down-flame shadowless lamp of 1895.

History of the Dahlia. By a curious horticultural irony the dahlia, which has become the popular idol of our early autumn flower shows, possesses a sadly prosaic history, the London Chronicle remarks. It has been developed from the Mexican tubers introduced about one hundred and thirty years ago by the Swedish botanist, Doctor Dahl, for the purely commercial purpose of supplanting or supplementing the potato. They did not "catch on," and the dahlia dish soon disappeared from British dinner tables, but our gardeners at once saw the latent possibilities of the flower, from which they have evolved the double dahlia and other delightful floral fantasies. Thus the dahlia has exactly reversed the fate of the red clover, which came to us in the guise of a garden flower but was found to make fine forage. The tubers of the dahlia, too acrid for our taste, are still eaten in some parts of France.

#### Days to Come.

As vacation time brings one out to some quiet countryside of the United States there comes a painful sense of the contrast between what we see here and the scenes of desolation pictured in all our magazines. The vineyards about Lake Erie are full of September's promise, but those of Champagne are crisscrossed by innumerable trench systems and tormented by ceaseless shell fire. The orchards of California and Virginia are ripening their burden in drowsy peace, but what of those fought through by armies of czar and kaiser? You can hear a woodpecker half a mile away in the pines of Cheyenne canyon, but there's a different story to tell of the blasted and bloodstained woods of Ardennes. And ye this fever of war will pass. The guns will have had their day, however long and terrible, and in the end nature and the patient folk who serve her will come to their own again .- Collier's.

### Mechanical Horse in War.

Recently a "mechanical horse" was driven through the streets of Chicago to attract "fighting men" to the army recruiting stations. The powerful tractor, to which a field gun and caisson were hitched, was controlled entirely by two reins in the hands of a driver. It was taken through the congested "loop district" thoroughfares with per fect ease. The plan was employed daily for a fortnight and apparently netted good results, for during the pe riod large numbers of volunteers filed into the recruiting places. Although still little known, the machine is not a new type. Primarily it is intended for agricultural purposes. It is sufficlently striking in appearance and operation, however, to prick the curiosity of the street crowds, and in this capacity it performed valuable work for the army .- Popular Mechanics Magazine.

### Short of Flag Material.

According to a manufacturer of flags the demand for "Old Glory" never was so great as at present. If this continues-and there is every reason to believe it will-manufacturers are wondering what will happen.

"Of course the war is responsible for the increased business in flags," said he. "If it keeps on we are wondering where we are going to get the bunting that is used in making flags. With but two places in the country where it is possible to get material, and the shortage in dyes, we are surely up against it. Everything about the business has gone up in price. Poles are dearer-they say because of lumber shortage-and castiron brackets likewise have gone skyward. The men who made the brackets quit and went in for munitions-which explains that increase."-New York Globe and Commercial Advertiser.

### CONDENSED MILK FOR FRENCH

Most of the People of Country Are Making Acquaintance of Product for First Time.

Scarcity of milk has introduced the French people-most of them for the first time-to condensed milk, and, as this has taken an important place in their dietary, has given rise to several careful studies of its value as a food. Doctors Loir and Legagneux of Le Havre report that for adults there is no fault to be found with it.

On its use as a food for babies, Professor Marfan makes a report to the Academy of Medicine. He condemns it as a steady diet, but says that, skimmed and sweetened, condensed milk is better than fresh for a dyspeptic baby, and, in hot weather, especially in cities, much safer, as there is little opportunity for its spoiling. Except under these circumstances, or when fresh milk cannot be had, condensed milk should not be given to

Adults should use unskimmed condensed milk, but Professor Marfan insists that the only form for babies is that made from skimmed and sweetened milk. And it is suggested that every maker be obliged to label his brand either "Skimmed and Sweetened" or "Unskimmed."

Hunter With a 24-Pound Gun.

An American sportsman tells of an incident he witnessed at the wellknown Shaba, or lower barrier, of Nadoo creek, in North China. A native shooter had his gingal with hima most uncanny-looking weapon. That there might be no question as to its length, it was placed upright alongside the American. It exceeded his height by two feet two inches, making the piece of ordnance over eight

feet in length. Sportsmen in this country sometimes complain of the weight of their guns-six and a half to seven and a half pounds. So it is astonishing to behold a Chinese hunter carrying a 24-pound gun all day long.


