## Remember Farmers' Institute Meeting Monday, April 21st, Interestin Program Arranged

### COLORADO SPRINGS TO SAN ANTONIO ROAD FOR TAHOKA

PROPOSED AUTOMOBILE ROUTE FORM COLORADO SPRINGS TO SAN ANTONIO WILL PASS THROUGH TAHOKA, ROUTE TO BE INSPECTED NEXT MONTH BY BEXAR COUNTY HIGHWAY LEAGUE

D. E. Colp, secretary of the Bexar County Highway League of the Chamber of Commerce, has been asked by the Chamber of Commerce, of Colorado Springs, to furnish data to that organization regarding the best Texas roadways and roads in areas most susceptible to treatment for permanent roadways. The data, which Mr. Colp is now collecting, is to be used in the plan for a Pike's Peak to Gulf highway through Colorado Texas.

Yesterday Mr. Colp received a letter from A. W. Henderson, secretary of the Colorado Springs organization, stating that the chamber there plans to our the proposed route of way by automobile in May.

Mr. Henderson suggests that meeting might be held along the way and some sort of a permanent association formed as the tourist journey toward the Gulf. The automobile trip is planned in the campaign to stimulate interest in a Colorado-Texas highway.—San Antonio Express.

We have a proposition for an

international automobile highway running east and west, from Washington, D. C. to San Francisco, California. This road will not only be extensively traveled this and next year, but during the Panama Exposition in 1915, thousands of autos will use this route going and coming.

Now we have, as you will see from the above clipping and letter, a still better automobile road proposition, at least for the immediate future, for this road will be put right in use this year, of a north and south auto road through Tahoka from Colorado Springs, Colorado, to San Antonio, Texas.

Do you see where these two propositions place Tahoka? Right at the crossing of the two most important automobile routes in the entire State of Texas. Thousands of auto tourists go from the mountains of Colorado to the Gulf of Mexico every year, and as soon as a regular route is mapped out and the roads fixed up right through the several counties, the number now traveling this way will be at least doubled. And added thousands will travel from the low land of South Texas to the mountains of Colorado.

The one item that has made the State of Maine one of the richest in the United States is the summer tourists. Everybody practically speaking takes boarders in Maine or if they do not themselves take boarders they work for or sell things to those who do, so that during the summer months everybody lives off of the boarders and tourists.

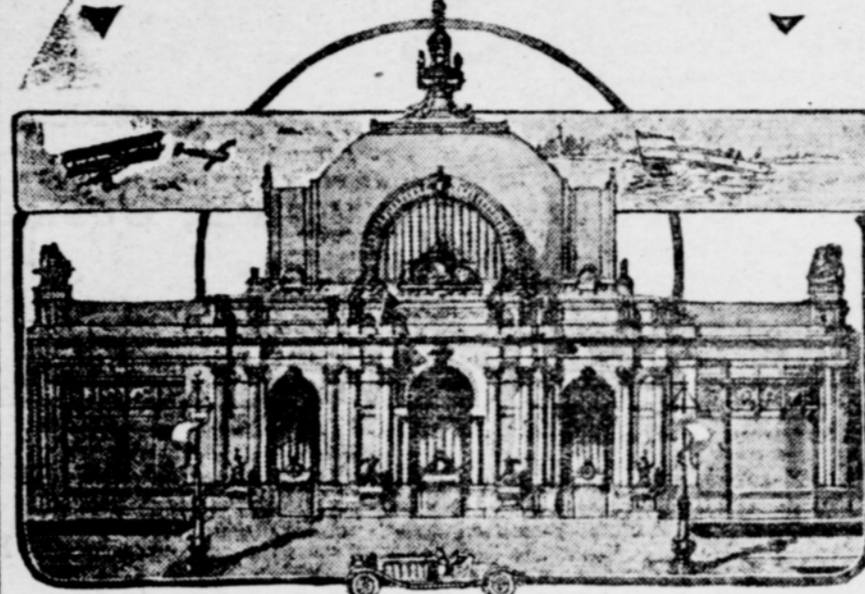
The town that has a good summer tourist trade is always in good shape. It better than railroads, manufactories, colleges or any other way to promote the growth and prosperity of a town, for the tourists come from a distance where things are prosperous and they bring a full measure of prosperity with them; neither drouths nor crop failures hurt the summer tourist town.

We cannot, however, depend on the natural advantages or logical point business, entirely, now days to get what you want. As witness the New Orleans "Logical Point" campaign for the Panama Exposition, San Francisco business men just around them and took the cake.

So, if Tahoka wants the two auto roads, we citizens will have to work for them and just as hard too as though some other town had the logical point.

However, sistamatic, co-operate work added to the natural advantages will make the securing of these to roads a certainty for Tahoka, for we have men in our town who never yet let an opportunity like this pass them by. Let every county official, auto owner, hotel man, professional man and merchant join the Tahoka Commercial Club at the meeting Monday afternoon, April 21st, at the court house, and work together for the successful landing of this auto road.

PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION, SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

DESIGN of the Motor Building at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. This structure will be one of the largest of the exposition palaces, approximately 275 feet front by 800 feet deep, covering about 210,000 square feet, or more than five acres. The dome, which surmounts the center of the front portion of the building, is 130 feet high and surmounted with a turret composed of the prows of modern motor boats, each carrying a searchlight. This point will be used by Mr. Ryan, the chief of illumination of the exposition, for the purpose of lighting up the grounds and adjacent buildings. Other groups at the base of the building will convey, allegorically, the uses of electricity, gas and other mechanical devices which compose the motor. Its modernity is in harmony with the nature of the exhibits which it will house, and its triumphal character is emblematic of that triumph of modern transportation, the automobile. The groups of statuary surmounting the attic will be allegorically carried out to typify the triumph of the motor over the elements. The main group in front will be a sort of quadriga of automobiles typifying the conquest over the land. On the sides will be allegories of the motor boat and the aeroplane, respectively, typifying the victory over the sea and air. On either side of the entire length of the building there will be a frieze 10 feet high in bas relief, giving the history of transportation from the early log cart up to the most modern development of the automobile.

## NO MORE MAILING OF LETTERS ON THE TRAIN

On Friday of last week the word went forth that no more letters would be received on the trains on the Tahoka branch of the Pecos & North Texas railroad. It seems the railway clerk is an employee of the railroad instead of the government and it is a \$200.00 fine for him to accept any mail matter that is not enclosed in a mail pouch. A government inspector has just lately been down the line and told the mail clerk he would have to discontinue the practice of receiving mail on the train or pay the fine of \$200.00 and as he has no money to blow in that way, he now refuses to receive any open mail matter whatever. So if you want your letters to go off on a certain mail, you must mail them in the postoffice before 8:55 of a morning or 3:55 of an evening. This is a good thing for Tahoka as it has become the custom of many people to delay mailing their letters in time and sending them to the train to by some friend, the buss driver or the mail carrier, or even go down to the depot and mail them personally. All of which was bad for the post office here as it did not get the credit for much mail that really belonged to this office. Remember every piece of mail leaving this town with the Tahoka Postmark on it is just so much publicity for our town, and we need every bit of publicity we can have. Boost Tahoka in every way and every time you can if you want to assist in its growth and prosperity.

## THE THIRTY THIRD LEGISLATURE RAISES SCHOOL AGE

The Thirty-third Legislature enacted a law amending Article 2893, Chapter 18, Title 48, of the revised Civil Statutes of 1911, so as to permit all children over seven years of age and not over twenty-one years of age on the first day of the schoolastic year to attend, free of charge, the public schools. The schoolastic census will be taken on the basis of from seven to seventeen years, as heretofore, no change having been made in the law with regard to taking the schoolastic census of the State.

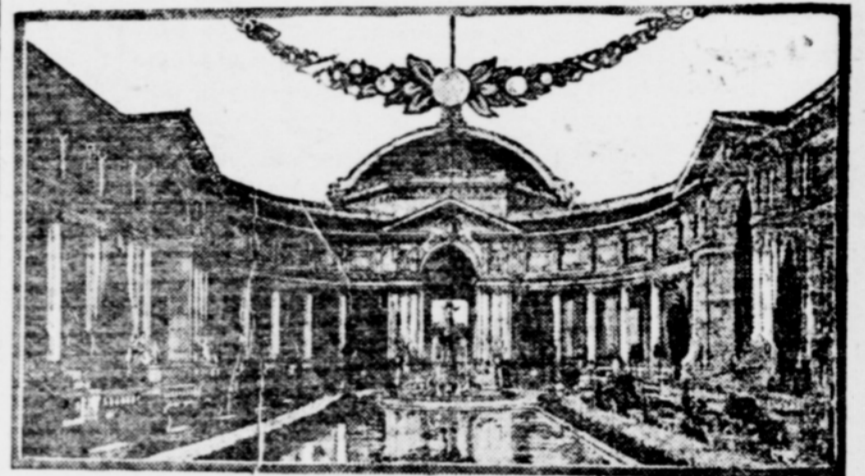

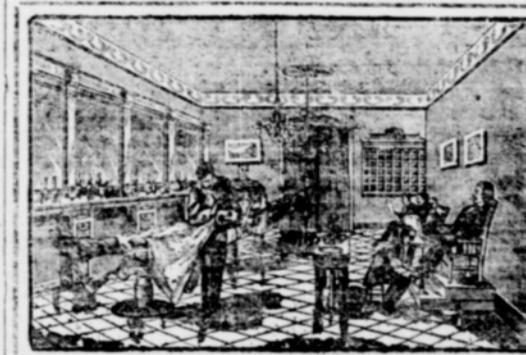

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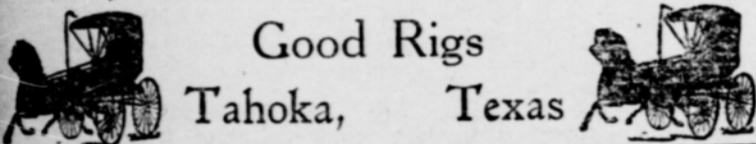
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
