Georgia Passes thei
Child Labor Law.
By a vote of 99 to 44 the Georg i House passed a new child labo bill on July 24th that is a grea that state.
The new law provides a 14 -yea imit for mills, factories, laundries,
manufacturing establishments and places of amusement: At presen Georgia has a 12 -year limit, except for children of dependen parents, for
io years.
A 16 -year limit for night work is also provided by the new bill instead of the existing under 16 to secure employme certificates or work permits before they may be employed. permits are not issued unless ev of the required age, and unless the child can read and write. It is hoped that if this bill be mes a law, Georgia's large per ent of illiteracy will begin to $d$ eracy is always found where eracy is always found
child labor laws exist.
A most unusual feature of thi campaign was the support whic it received from organized labor In previous years, mill operatives have not been organized, have not dared to oppose the mill owners on the que:tion of child labor. This year 800 opera tives of a cotton mill went out on strike just before the child labo campaign begav, and among the demands was the elimination of children under 14 from the mills 300 of these operatives appeare at the hearing on the new bill t show that they were in sympath with its provisions. Before thi the only operatives who have ever appeared at a hearing have been brought there by mill owners
estify that they did not want etter child labor law. When the operatives became well enough organized to stand for what the wanted, they soon showed that hey did not want their childre orking in the mills.
