

GERMANY-AUSTRIA AT WAR WITH ENGLAND FRANCE, RUSSIA, SERBIA

England Declares War On Germany Before Time Limit
Expire--Reason: Germany Refusal to Regard
Belgium's Integrity

NAVAL BATTLE EAPECTED SOON

Austria and Germany on the one hand and Serbia, Russia, France and England on the other are now engaged in a war which bid fair to being the bloodiest most devastating war in the history of the world.

Italy, Belgium, Holland and Switzerland have mobilized their fighting men.

Not a nation in the world will escape the effects of the war and few will escape the ravages or actual conflict within their borders.

August 5 a German fleet pursued a British mine boat and torpedo boat. The mine laying vessel was sunk and the destroyer, Pathfinder, escaped.

Military experts predict the first decisive encounter to take place between the allied fleets in the English Channel.

Skirmishes occur daily between various outposts with victory flitting from side to side and no one prophesies as to how it will end, but it looks as though Germany has bit off, well a mouthfull any way.

Georgia Passes the Child Labor Law.

By a vote of 99 to 44 the Georgia House passed a new child labor bill on July 24th that is a great improvement on the present law in that state.

The new law provides a 14-year limit for mills, factories, laundries, manufacturing establishments and places of amusement. At present Georgia has a 12-year limit, except for children of dependent parents, for whom the age limit is 10 years.

A 16-year limit for night work is also provided by the new bill, instead of the existing 14-year limit, and it requires children under 16 to secure employment certificates or work permits before they may be employed. Such permits are not issued unless evidence is produced that the child is of the required age, and unless the child can read and write.

It is hoped that if this bill becomes a law, Georgia's large per cent of illiteracy will begin to decrease, as a high per cent of illiteracy is always found where poor child labor laws exist.

A most unusual feature of this campaign was the support which it received from organized labor. In previous years, mill operatives have not been organized, and hence have not dared to oppose the mill owners on the question of child labor. This year 800 operatives of a cotton mill went out on strike just before the child labor campaign began, and among their demands was the elimination of children under 14 from the mills. 300 of these operatives appeared at the hearing on the new bill to show that they were in sympathy with its provisions. Before this the only operatives who have ever appeared at a hearing have been brought there by mill owners to testify that they did not want a better child labor law. When the operatives became well enough organized to stand for what they wanted, they soon showed that they did not want their children working in the mills.

WIFE OF PRESIDENT DIED YESTERDAY

Washington, D. C., August 6
--(by the Western Telephone Co.)
Mrs. Woodrow Wilson died at the
White House at 5:15 o'clock.
Death result of recent illness.

Mrs. Wilson has been sick for some time and the president has been at his wife's bedside for weeks, and yet he has not allowed family sorrows to interfere with his public duties. Mrs. Wilson's death coming just at this time makes it seem doubly sorrowful for the president.

Mrs. Wilson is the second wife of a president to die in the White House: The first being Mrs. Willard Filmore, who died in

April 1853; Mrs. Andrew Jackson died at the Hermitage in December after her husband had been elected but before he was inaugurated. Two weddings and a death make the occupancy of the White House by the Wilson family a notable one.

Tahoka, Lynn county, Texas, the South, the entire Nation, will join with President Wilson in his mourning for the great loss he has sustained.

THE distance from Newfoundland to Ireland is less than two thousand miles. This means that if you go at one hundred miles an hour you will cross the Atlantic in twenty hours—less than a day. We have flying machines that go at a greater speed than that. We already have machines that could cross the ocean if their engines can keep going for twenty hours. Of course these are exceptional machines, but even the ordinary machines of today make fifty miles an hour.

NOW, A FLYING MACHINE FLIES FASTER AS YOU GO HIGHER UP. BECAUSE THE RARER AIR OFFERS LESS RESISTANCE TO THE MOTION, WHILE THE PROPELLER GIVES THE SAME PUSH WITH THE SAME POWER WHATEVER THE ELEVATION. AS YOU GET INTO THE RARER AIR THE PROPELLER SPINS AROUND FASTER. A FIFTY MILE AN HOUR MACHINE FLYING TWO MILES HIGH IN THE AIR—AND WE HAVE MACHINES THAT HAVE GONE TWICE AS HIGH AS THAT—WILL FLY MUCH FASTER THAN FIFTY MILES AN HOUR. A CROWD OF WOMEN WATCHING A FIGHT IN THE ARENA IS NOT A NEW SPECTACLE. IT SOUNDS LIKE A PAGE FROM ANCIENT HISTORY AND DOES NOT POINT TO THE DETERIORATION OF IDEALS HELD BY WOMEN, AS SOME WOULD HAVE US INFER. IT IS MERELY THAT SOME ENGLISHMEN HAVE GROWN TIRED OF THE FORM OF SOCIAL INTERCOURSE WHICH IS OF A FORMAL KIND AND HAVE SUBSTITUTED A NEW EXCITEMENT. WOMEN WHOSE INTERESTS ARE PURELY SOCIAL HAVE FOLLOWED THEM THOUGHTLESSLY ENOUGH. IT IS NOT THAT THEY ARE CRUEL OR HEARTLESS, BUT SIMPLY THOUGHTLESS AND UNOCCUPIED.

I believe that one of the strongest arguments for suffrage is that of its educational value. Here in America we stand IN NO DANGER OF HAVING OUR INTELLIGENT WOMEN GO MAD OVER BOXING MATCHES because they have their time and their minds too much occupied with other things, and suffrage is one of the things. We can claim no superiority to the Englishwoman.

WHATEVER YOUR WORK, YOU WILL FIND YOURSELVES AMONG OTHERS WHO ARE EQUALLY ABLE AND ACTIVE. THERE WILL BE PURSUING YOU A GROUP OF STRENUOUS YOUTHS, STARTING LATER THAN YOURSELVES, WITH BETTER EQUIPMENT, WITH GREATER ENERGY, AND THE TIME WILL COME WHEN ONE OF THESE YOUTHS WILL PRESS YOU CLOSE AND FINALLY THRUST YOU ASIDE.

I urge upon each of you that a PART OF EVERY DAY BE RESERVED FOR THINGS OTHER THAN YOUR VOCATION; that at the same time you perform efficient service in the world you live the life of one whose head rises above the incidents of the day.

I AM WELL AWARE THAT TO TALK OF THE ZENITH AND NADIR OF LIFE TO THOSE WHO ARE JUST ENTERING INTO ITS FULL LIGHT WILL PROBABLY BE WITHOUT AVAIL, FOR IT IS CERTAIN THAT INEXPERIENCE SELDOM LISTENS TO THE VOICE OF EXPERIENCE. Give us plays, not tracts.

nation is used to acquire the land the proceedings to be as under the Statutes for condemnation for railroads, provided that the condemnation shall vest title in fee in the county, and county may issue bonds or other evidence of district indebtedness for acquiring the property, building the sea wall, reclamation developments and all incident thereto as expenses of sea-wall and reclamation district, with lien on land and such terms and conditions as county, through its commissioners' court may deem best, and the county commissioners' court shall appoint two persons who are owners of land within the district, and who desire to sell for reclamation and buy back from the county when reclaimed, who with the county judge as chairman, shall continue a sea-wall reclamation district commission, whose compensation shall be fixed by the court, and this commission has power to make all rules and regulations for acquiring the land of district sea-wall building, reclaiming and plating land of district, issuing bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for same, subject, however, to all such rules, regulations and acts of the commission being authorized and approved and ratified by county commissioners' court. The district must bear all expenses of sea-wall and purchase of the land and expenses of filing (filling) same and other expenses, and the same shall not in any way involve the credit of the county or be a basis for a tax by the county on general lands of the county unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the property taxpayers of the county voting at a special election therefor. It is further provided that any owner of land in a proposed district may subscribe and pay for the district commission, when organized, as the pro rata of his land of the expense of the wall, reclamation, plating as town lots on a basis as such area of land is to be the whole land of the reclamation district and sea-wall, and at any time before the completion of the district may surrender the bonds and receive from the county a bond for title for his land in town lots, less streets and alleys deducted therefrom, for which on surrender deed may be demanded from the county after the district is walled, filled and platted into streets, alleys and lots, and bonds so bought shall so provide. It is further provided that no district shall be formally designated by the county commissioners' court until owners of at least one-half of the proposed disposed area of district petition therefor, and subscribe out for bonds for repurchase from the county as herein provided. This amendment may be acted on without delay of legislation in aid thereof or legislative action may be had in furtherance thereof if desired by the county, acting through its commissioners' court.

Be it further resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Texas for their ratification and adoption at an election to be held throughout the state on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and at such election those favoring the ratification and adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment of Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls," and those opposing the adoption and ratification of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." Proclamation of such election shall be made by the Governor, as required by the Constitution and the law, and there is appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expense of advertising and holding such election.

(Note.—S. J. R. 22 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 24, nays 1, and senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 57, nays 0; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 114, nays 0.)

Injustice to Fail to Have Women Represented In Constitutional Convention

By Former President ROOSEVELT

THERE are at present at least fifty women serving on the boards of New York state asylums, hospitals, industrial schools and special schools for the blind and crippled. There are two women on the state commission for the blind and two on the widowed mothers' pension commission. In our private charitable work women stand ahead of men in the importance of the functions they perform. There are EIGHT HUNDRED THOUSAND WOMEN WAGE EARNERS IN NEW YORK CITY ALONE, and this fact is recognized by the bureau of factory inspection, UNDER WHICH SYSTEM WOMEN ARE INSPECTORS. The majority of teachers in our public schools are women. Surely there can be no more important work than this of educating the next generation. WOMEN ARE VERY HEAVY INVESTORS. It has recently been shown that in two hundred and fifty-two railways and industrial corporations which were invested in there were THREE HUNDRED AND TEN THOUSAND WOMEN SHAREHOLDERS.

A MERE CONSIDERATION OF THE ABOVE FACTS IS ENOUGH TO SHOW THAT IN THE FIRST PLACE WOMEN ARE NOW SERVING AS PUBLIC OFFICIALS AND IN THE NEXT PLACE THAT THEY HAVE VITAL INTERESTS WHICH MUST BE CONSIDERED AS IN SOME DEGREE APART FROM THE INTERESTS OF MEN. IT IS TO MY MIND RANK INJUSTICE TO FAIL TO HAVE WOMEN REPRESENTED IN THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION. MOREOVER, MANY OF THE WOMEN CAN GIVE INFORMATION AND ASSISTANCE SUCH AS FEW MEN CAN GIVE IN MATTERS IN WHICH MEN ARE PRIMARILY INTERESTED.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Section 24, Article 3 of the Constitution Increasing Compensation of the Legislature and Extending Length of Regular Session.

[S. J. R. No. 26]

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section No. 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of State officers, or at a previous general election, in case a general election for the State shall be sooner ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, and extension of term of regular sessions, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

Section 24. The members of the Legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200.00) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the Legislature is held, payable in equal installments on the twentieth days of January, April, July and October of the year in which the regular session is held, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held in the year next succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, at the first general election to be held in this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution increasing compensation of the Legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the Legislature." Those opposing said amendment shall written or printed on their ballot the words: "Against amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution increasing compensation of the members of the Legislature, and extending the term of regular sessions of the Legislature."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

(Note.—S. J. R. No. 26 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 26, nays 0, and Senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 1; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 101, nays 22.) Approved April 3, 1913.

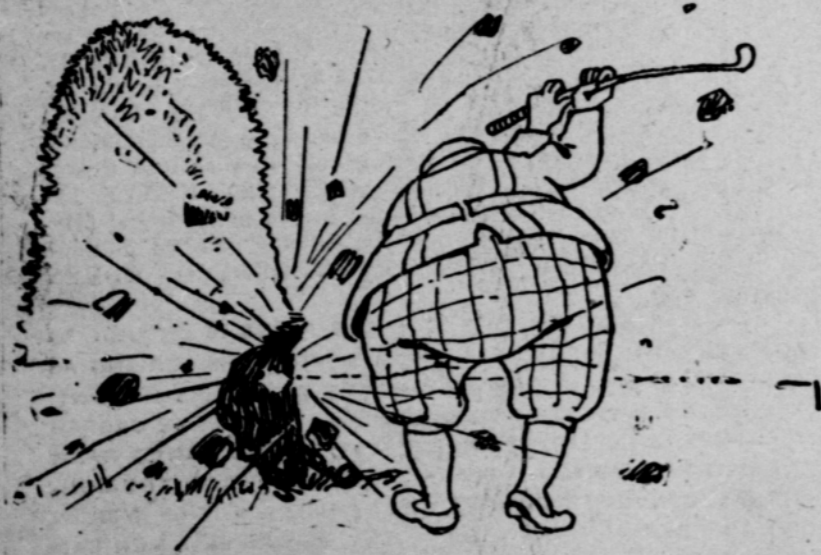

Pensions to Dependent Mothers Should Not Be Scrimped and Uncertain

COUNTRY wide agitation and the passage of laws by many states have shown the prevalent public interest in mothers' pensions. No one questions the great desirability of providing funds adequate to keep dependent mothers and children together who would otherwise be separated solely by poverty. Instead of placing children in institutions and finding a job for the mother every one now agrees that it is MUCH WISER TO PAY THE COST OF THE FAMILY SUPPORT so that a good mother may bring up her children. THE QUESTION WHICH THE PUBLIC HAS TO DECIDE IS WHETHER SUCH MOTHERS SHALL BE PENSIONED THROUGH PRIVATE RELIEF ORGANIZATIONS OR BY THE STATE OR CITY OR COUNTY. IN ANY EVENT, THE PROCESS SHOULD BE ONE OF FINDING OUT COMPLETELY HOW MUCH IS NEEDED FOR PROPER SHELTER, FOOD AND CLOTHING, AND THEN OF SEEING TO IT THAT THIS AMOUNT IS PROVIDED. ANY HAPHAZARD RAISING OF MONEY AND TRYING TO MAKE THE AMOUNT SECURED GO ROUND MEANS USUALLY BREAKING FAMILY STRUGGLES TO GET ALONG ON LESS THAN A DECENT STANDARD OF LIVING. IF PENSIONS ARE TO BE GIVEN TO DEPENDENT MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN THEY SHOULD NOT BE SCRIMPED AND UNCERTAIN, BUT ADEQUATE AND REGULAR.
