## TREATY INDORSED BY HOUSE DEMOCRATS

MINORITY REPORT OF FOREIGN RELATIONS COMMITTEE OP. POSES RESERVATIONS.

#### ITS OPPONENTS ARE SCORED

United States Will Lose Many Valuable Concessions if Treaty is Changed, It Is Delcared.

Washington.-With submission of the foreign relations committee minority report, the peace treaty, with its covenant for a league of nations, is made ready for the ratification battle in the senate.

Republicans claiming enough votes to prevent ratification without reservations, are urged by Chairman Lodge of the foreign relations committee to stay on the job until final disposition is made of the treaty, weeks hence, perhaps.

Senator Hitchcock, leader of the administration forces, submitted the minority report, signed by all demoeratic members of the committee except Senator Shields of Tennessee, who stood out for reservations to the league covenant.

Without attempting specifically to answer majority charges against certain provisions of the covenant, the minority urged speedy adoption without modification.

After the minority report had been presented Senator Harding of Ohio, republican member of the foreign relations committee, spoke at length against the treaty and its league covenant.

The report, mentioned twelve concessions the United States would lose by failure to ratify the treaty, these including industrial and economic advantages and agreements.

Reservations proposed by the majority, the report said, were "for the purpose of destroying the league," which has stood "the test of worldwide criticism and unlimited attack."

#### LEAGUE OPPONENTS LOUDLY RECEIVED BY CHICAGOANS

Johnson and Borah Find Hearty Response to Their Attacks on Treaty.

Chicago, Ill.-Chicago is interested In the senate opposition to the peace treaty-howlingly interested. Not since the days of 1912 when the big auditorium here saw the birth of the Bull Moose party has such a vast, excited, wildly cheering throng jammed that place and shouted encouragement to speakers and worked itself into dripping perspiration in greeting the speeches of Senators Johnson, Borah and McCormick.

Senator Johnson has left for Indianapolis while Borah and McCormick prepared to follow different routes, confident that if the enthusiasm met in Chicago is continued, the senate will have complete backing in making amendments and reservations to the treaty recommended by the foreign relations committee.

#### UNITED STATES MARINES ARE LANDED IN HONDURAS

Made After Conference of Diplomats.

Washington. - Marines from the cruiser Cleveland have landed at Porto Cortez, Honduras, to preserve order, following the abdication of President Bertrand, the state department

A British warship is expected at Poto Cortez at any time.

Marines landed following a conference of diplomats. There are general but not serious disorders throughout Honduras, it was stated, because of the revolution and the resulting overthrow of Bertrand.

#### INTERNAL REVENUE IN IN TEXAS \$62,215,083

Amount Collected for Fiscal Year 1919 Shows Heavy Increase.

Washington.-Internal revenue re ceipts from Texas for the fiscal year of 1919 amounted to \$62,215,083, an increase of \$22,200,749 compared with the collections for the fiscal year of 1918. Of this amount \$46,900,575 was from income and profits taxes and the remainder miscellaneous taxes. The income and profits taxes increased in 1919, compared with 1918, \$16,-

THE GENERAL IS WELCOMED BY THOUSANDS AS HE LANDS ON HIS NATIVE SOIL.

New York .- Pershing is home again. Standing on the bridge of the huge stars and stripes, came slowly up the bay Monday, world-famed and hailed ca's participation in the war. as a conquering hero should be.

"Black Jack," erect and very soldierly, stood on the bride. As the pandemonium broke out he waved his cap and then his handkerchief. A band on the pier played "The Star-Spangled Banner" and he came smartly to salute.

Other officers on the transport and ashore, both army and naval, also stood at attention while the huge crowds bared their heads. A sudden hush spread over the masses and continued until the national anthem was finished

When the strains died away over an intermittent roar of cheers and al left the battery, ceasing only when he and the welcoming officials exchanged greetings on the pier.

#### ARMS SMUGGLING ON BORDER IS CHARGED

Former Secret Service Man Says Villa Gets Supplies in This Way.

New York. - Between \$17,000,000 and \$20,000,000 worth of goods are smuggled annually across the Mexican border, more than one fourth of which are arms and ammunition, according to a statement issued by the national association for the protection of American rights in Mexico, quoting Dr. P. ## MINIMUM PRICE IS **FIXED ON COTTON**

CONVENTION AT NEW ORLEANS WOULD HAVE PRICES ON A SLIDING SCALE.

New Orleans, La.-County market firms for the purchase of cotton and the fixing of a minimum price at which cotton shall be sold were decided upon by the American Cotton association at its session here, thereby concluding the two most important acts for which the cotton men of the south had assembled. Minimum prices of cotton per pound were fixed by months as follows: September 36c. October, 36½c. November 37c. December 371/2c. January 38c. February 381/2c, March 39c, April 39 1/2 c and May 40c.

J. J. Brown of Atlanta, Ga., was chairman of the committee which recommended this sliding scale of prices for the staple.

While the committee was closeted in a stormy discussion of a minimum price to be fixed on all cotton produced in the south, L. D. Jennings of South Carolina presented a resolution which was unanimously adopted and which provided for the formation of corporations of cotton producers in each county where cotton is produced throughout the United States.

The resolution further provides that these corporations are to be capitalized for enough money to buy cotton outright at one-fourth of a cent per pound more than any price offered which is below the minimum to be fixed later.

If this plan becomes effective and the various county corporations are formed, the method of operation will be this: In case a farmer has cotton for sale during a month when the minimum price is 37c per pound, and the only offer that comes to him from the outside is 35c per pound, the county corporation will offer him 3514c per pound. If the outsider raises to 351/2c the county corporation will offer 35%c, and so on, until the minimum of 37c has been reached, at which figure the outsider will be permitted to buy it.

#### ROUMANIA REFUSES TO SIGN PEACE TREATY

Jugo-Slav Delegation May Decline to Sign on Same Grounds as Roumania.

Paris.-The Roumanian delegation to the peace conference has announced that it would not sign the Austrian peace treaty.

Roumania refused to sign the treaty because of the council's flat refusal to grant her the privilege of making reservations in connection with the rights of minority in territories detached from the former Austrian empire, as provided for in the peace treaty.

It is also considered as improbable that the Jugo Slav delegation will sign the treaty.

-0-The Industrial Transportation Company of Washington, D. C., capital stock \$20,000,000 has been granted a permit to do business in Texas; the state headquarters to be at Houston. The corporation is organized for the purpose of making available feed supplies of all sorts at cost plus 10 per cent profit.

In response to a petition containing the names of more than six hundred taxpaying voters of Austin County, the commissioners court has just called an election throughout Austin County for the people to vote upon the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$1,500,000 for the construction of good roads through the county. The election is called for Oct. 7.

Bexar County leads in the number of motorcycles registered in Texas, according to figures in the state highway department. There are 505 registered from that county, while Dallas County is second. El Paso, with a complete road system, has 179 and Harris 177. There are 199 in Jefferson County; 96 are registered from Galveston County. McLennon County has 107, Tarrant, 162 and Travis 109.

Hereafter druggists will be required by law to affix a special label on all bottles of denatured alcohol offered for sale, setting forth the danger of drinking or applying this poison externally. In the past few months denatured alcohol has been sold to persons who, not realizing its danger, have used it for a beverage. In most cases the result has been complete paralysis, followed by death. -0-

Fifty-four banks have been added to the state banking system since Jan. 1, and more than 100 applications for charters handled by the state banking board, many of which, over and above the fifty-four that were granted, are still pending for completion of the investigation of each project which the barking board requires before taking final action upon it. 



# SUNDAYSCHOOL WITCO'S WITCO in the WODI

#### C. D. WALCOTT AND THE SMITHSONIAN



Charles D. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian institution in Washington, has issued an illustrated account of the field work of the last year by its staff and collaborators. The Smithsonian was established by federal statute in 1846 under the terms of the will of James Smithson (1765-1829), who bequeathed in 1826 the sum of \$540,000 to the United States "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." Smithson was the natural son of the duke of Northumberland and said that his bequest would make his name better known than his father's. The income of the Smithsonian is now about \$100,000 s

One of the most important activities of the Smithsonian institution is the exploration of little-known regions of the world. Among the regions visited by the 22 separate expeditions are many states in this country, Chile,

Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Africa, Borneo and Celebes. The explorations, all of which were in the interest of science, include work in geology, botany, zoology, anthropology, archeology, ethnology and astrophysics.

United States field parties and special investigators looked into many interesting things. The botanical work consisted largely of investigation of grasses and timber in the Southwest, including timberline (11,000 feet) on Longs Peak in Rocky Mountain National park, Colorado, where the exhibit is unexcelled. The little-known region of the Ten Thousand Islands in Florida furnished new information concerning the Seminole Indians there,

#### WILL JUDGE LINDSEY GO TO JAIL?

Two hundred and fifty days in jail for a principle. That is the penalty that Judge Ben B. Lindsey, the famous "kids' judge" of Denver, expects to pay for holding inviolate the confidence of a small boy. The supreme court of the state has ruled that he must carry out the sentence. Judge Lindsey has taken ar appeal to the United States Supreme court, but lawyers say there is no federal question involved and they expect the Supreme court to deny jurisdiction.


The only alternative is the payment of a fine of \$500. Judge Lindsey has flatly refused to pay this fine and says that he will go to jail for life rather than do so. He maintains that in spite of his conviction he is not guilty of contempt of court. Friends have offered to pay the fine and costs

for him, and even the children have offered to raise the money.

The "kid" in the case is Neal Wright, who is now in the United States army in France. His father was murdered. His mother confessed to the murder. Then Neal confessed that he killed his father. What he told Judge Lindsey is the nub of the case. The state contended that the boy's confession to the judge would have convicted his mother.

While the trial of Mrs. Wright was in progress, Judge Lindsey was called to the witness stand. He refused to relate Neal Wright's confession.

## SENATOR KELLOGG'S LICENSING BILL



Senator Kellogg of Minnesota has introduced a bill that has stirred up much discussion. In presenting it Senator Kellogg said, among other things:

"The bill requires all corporations engaged in interstate commerce and having a capital or assets of \$10,000 -000 or over to take out a federal license. It further provides for a forfeiture of the license if the corporation shall enter into any contract, combination, or conspiracy in restraint of trade, or shall monopolize commerce, or attempt to monopolize it. This would give the federal trade commission a supervisory jurisdiction over such corporations, and their license would be subject to forfeiture if they engage in a combination to raise or fix prices, engage in unfair methods of competition for the sake of crushing out their competitors, or any of the other abuses which have been in the past commonly employed to monopo-

lize commerce. It is my opinion that prosecution under the present antitrust act is not a sufficient remedy. There should be a department of the government having power of supervision, not necessarily interfering with the business of the country, but possessing the power to investigate, publish the facts, and take immediate action to revoke a license if a corporation abuses its

#### ASTOR GIVES HIS SONS MILLIONS

Deeds of trust have been filed in the registrar's office in New York city on behalf of William Waldorf Astor, conveying all of his real estate in New York city, or elsewhere, to the Farmers' Loan and Trust company as trustee in trust for his two sons, Waldorf Astor and Capt. John Jacob Astor.

No statement could be obtained from Viscount Astor's lawyers as to the cause of this big transfer, but it is evidently in keeping with his policy to escape a heavy inheritance tax law, which is 5 per cent on bequests over \$1,000.000.

Under the transfer in trust are and and buildings valued at more than \$50,000,000, this would mean a saving to the estate of \$2,500,000 in inheritance taxation.

#### ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND SCHOOL TEACHERS SHORT

According to a report of the National Educational Association there will be at the opening of the schools of the country this September 100,000 teaching places without teachers and if these places are filled at all they will have to be filled with untrained and inexperienced teachers who are in the business only temporarily and are using it as a stepping who are in the business only temporarily and are using it as a stepping stone to something better. According to the same report, one-fourth of the teachers in the American public schools are under 19 years of age, mere boys and girls without the training and experience to do the work they are undertaking to do; one-fourth have had no more education than that afforded by the elementary schools or through the seventh grade; about one-half of them have not finished high school and only about one-twentieth of them have professional training.

It is estimated that in the Texas schools alone there will be 4,000 vacancies at the beginning of this school year. It is stated that during the past year 4,500 of the best women teachers and 1,200 of the best men in the Texas schools have left the profession. There are hundreds of teaching places in the Panhandle without teachers.
