"WE MUST ALL SPEAK, ACT AND SERVE TOGETHER," PRESIDENT SAYS IN APPEAL TO AMERICANS

TEXT OF PRESIDENT'S APPEAL

"My Fellow-Countrymen:
"The entrance of our beloved country into the grim and terrible war for democracy and human rights creates so many problems of national life and action which call for immediate consideration and settlement that I hope you will permit me to address to you a few words of earnest council and appeal regarding them.

"We are rapidly putting our navy upon an effective war footing and are about to create and equip a great army, but these are the simplest parts of the great task to which we have addressed ourselves. There is not a single selfish element, so far as I can see, in the cause we are fighting for. We are fighting for what we believe and wish to be the rights of mankind and for the future peace and security of the world. To do this great thing worthily and successfully, we must devote ourselves to the service without regard to profit or material advantage and with an energy and intelligence that will rise to the level of the enterprise itself. We must realize to the full how great the task is and how many things, how many

every day going to pieces, mules, horses, cattle for labor and military service; everything with which the people of England and France and Italy and Russia have usually supplied themselves, but cannot now afford the men, materials or the machinery to make.

"It is evident to every thinking man that our industries must be made more prolific and more efficient than ever and they must be more economically managed and better adapted to the particular requirements of our task than they have been; and what I want to say is that the women who devote their thought and their energy to these things will be serving the country and conducting the fight for peace and freedom just as truly and just as efficiently as the men on the battlefield or in the trenches. The industrial forces of the country, men and women alike, will be of a great national, international, service army - a notable and honored host engaged in the service of the nation and the world, the efficient friends and saviors of free people everywhere.

kinds and elements of capacity and service and self-sacrifice it involves.

"These then are the things we must do and do well, besides fighting, the things without which mere fighting would be fruitless.

"We must supply not only abundant for ourselves, our armies and our seamen, but also for a large part of the nations with whom we now have made common cause.

MUST SUPPLY SHIPS

"We must supply ships by the hundreds out of our shipyards to carry to the other side of the sea, submarines or no submarines, what will every day be needed there and abundant materials out of our fields and our mines and our factories with which, not only to clothe and equip our own forces on land and sea, but also to clothe and support our people for whom the gallant fellows under arms can no longer work, to help clothe and equip the armies with which we are co-operating in Europe, and to keep the looms and manufacturers in raw materials, coal to keep the fires going in ships at sea, and in the furnaces of hundreds of factories across the sea; steel out of which to make arms and ammunition both here and there; rails for worn-out railways back of the fighting forces; locomotives and rolling stock to take the place of those

farmers of the country and to all who work on the farms:

"The supreme need of our Nation and of the Nations with which we are co-operating is an abundance of supplies, and especially of foodstuffs. Without abundant food, alike for the armies and the peoples now at war, the whole great enterprise upon which we have embarked will break down and fail. The world's food reserves are low.

"Not only during the present emergency, but for some time after peace shall have come, both our own people and a large proportion of the people of Europe must rely upon the harvests in America. Upon the farmers of this country, therefore, in large measure, rests the fate of the war and the fate of the Nations.

"I particularly appeal to the farmers of the South to plant abundant foodstuffs as well as cotton. They can show their patriotism in no better or more convincing way than by resisting the great temptation of the present price of cotton and helping to feed the Nation and the peoples fighting for their liberty and our own. The variety of their crops will be the visible measure of their comprehension of their national duty.

"The Government of the United States and the Governments of the several States stand ready to co-operate. They will do everything possible to as-

sist farmers in securing an adequate supply of seed, an adequate force of laborers when they are most needed at harvest time, and the means of expediting shipments of fertilizers and farm machinery, as well as of the crops themselves when harvested. The course of trade shall be as unhampered as it is possible to make it and there will be no unwarranted monopolization of the Nation's food supply by those who handle it on its way to the consumer. This is our opportunity to demonstrate the efficiency of a great democracy and we shall not fall short of it.

TO THE MIDDLEMEN

"This, let me say to the middlemen of every sort, whether they are handling our foodstuffs or our raw materials for manufacture or the products of our mills and factories:

"The eyes of the country will be especially upon you. This is your opportunity for signal service. The country expects you to forego unusual profits, to organize and expedite shipments of supplies of every kind, but especially of food, with an eye to the service you are rendering and in the spirit of those who enlist in the ranks, for their people, not for themselves. I shall confidently expect you to deserve and win the confidence of the people of every sort and station.

"To the men who run the railways of the country, whether they be managers or operative

employees, let me say that the railways are the arteries of the nation's life and in them rears the immense problem of seeing that these arteries suffer no obstruction of any kind.

"To the merchant, let me suggest the motto: 'Small profits and quick sales;' and to the ship builder, the thought that the life of the war depends on him. The food and war supplies must be carried across the seas, no matter how many ships are sent to the bottom.

"To the miner, let me say he stands where the farmer does: The work of the world waits on him. If he slackens or fails, armies and statesmen are helpless. He also is enlisted in the great service army.

"The manufacturer does not need to be told, I hope, that the nation looks to him to speed and perfect everything he can, and I only want to tell them that their service is adequately indispensable and is counted on by every man who loves the country and its liberties.

TO THE HOUSEWIFE

"Let me suggest also that everyone who creates or cultivates a garden helps and helps greatly to solve the problem of feeding the nations, and that every housewife who practices strict economy puts herself in the ranks of those who serve the nation. This is the time for America to correct her unpar-

RECIPES FOR KILLING FLIES

The United States Government makes the following suggestion for killing house flies: Formaldehyde and sodium salicylate are the two best fly poisons. Both are superior to arsenic. They have their advantages for household use. They are not poison to children, they are convenient to handle, their dilutions are simple and they attract the flies.

A formaldehyde solution of approximately the correct strength may be made by adding 3 teaspoonfuls of the concentrated formaldehyde solution, commercially known as formalin, to a pint of water. Similarly; the proper concentration of sodium salicylate may be obtained by dissolving 3 teaspoonfuls of the pure chemical (a powder) to a pint of water.

H. C. of L. Attributable to Preventable Fire Losses

The high cost of living to a considerable extent is attributed to the preventable fire losses, according to State Fire Marshal S. W. English. The per capita loss by fire in America is greater than most any other nation, and in proportion to the amount of necessities of life destroyed by fire, the remainder must be advanced in price sufficiently to maintain the equilibrium of the law of supply and demand.

The clause, "Loss fully covered by insurance," in many fire reports has mislead the people along this line. The monetary loss may be covered, but a dollar's worth of insurance never replaced a grain of foodstuff or a thread of raiment and the shortage still remains, hence the price must be raised to regulate supply and demand.

It is undoubtedly true, that through carelessness and ignorance with respect to fire are contributing very materially to the high cost of living. The contributions can be checked and some relief given by the practice of intelligent fire protection.
