

50,000 BALES TO BE TAKEN

Proceeds to Come From Sale of Manufactured Goods and Will Net From 20 to 35 Cents.

Cotton growers have set out to help themselves through their organization, the Mississippi Delta Export and Trading company. STORM KILLS UPWARDS OF TWENTY-SIX PERSONS

Two White Children and 25 Negroes Perish in Lumber Town in Geor-

Oconee, Ga .- A tornado that struck the Gardner settlement, one mile from here, shortly after the noon hour Thursday, brought death to two white persons and nearly 30 negroes and seriously injured five white persons and more than a score of negroes.

A stretch of land extending from Oconee almost to Toomsboro in Washington county, nearly five miles long and about a half mile wide, is as barren as a prairie, not a building or a tree being left standing.

Among the dead is Benjamin Franklin Orr, 14-year-old youth, who was decapitated.

The only other white person who met death in the tornado is the 3year old daughter of E. L. Minor.

Eighty-two children and three teachers were in a school building on the edge of the Gardner settlement when the tornado struck. The building was literally twisted to pieces and the fragments scattered for miles around. Children were picked up by the wind and carried for some distance, but it is officially announced that only one child was seriously injured.

POSTERS ARE URGING "BUY IT NOW" PLAN

TEXAS SENATE PASSES | ANNUAL CONVENTION

BILL BY ROGERS PROPOSES A TUBERCULAR HOSPITAL FOR EX-SOLDIERS.

Austin, Texas.—By unanimous passment of a sanatorium for tubercular ex-soldiers at Kerrville, the state of Texas has taken the first step toward d'd in the war with Germany. Spon-

The bill carries an appropriation of \$1,500,000. This money is to be used in completing and equipping the sanahere by which, in the belief of its torium, construction of which was begun by the American Legion. It will accommodate 600 patients.

Construction is to be under the supervision of a board composed of the state health offi er, the chairman of the board of control and the superintendent of the state tuberculosis sanatorium at Carlsbad. Work is to be gin as soon as the site, buildings and equipment now owned by the American Legion has agreed to do.

The first step in carrying out the announced policy of Governor Neff re garding consolidation of departments in the interest of economy was taken in the senate when that body with only one dissenting vote finally passed the Bailey bill abolishing the office of food and drug commissioner and transferring the functions of that office to the state health officer.

Washington.-While complaining about a democratic secretary of war enlisting the army beyond its authorized strength, and asserting that the position of President-elect Harding was in favor of bringing the army to 150.000 men, republicans of the house Tuesday declined to agree to a proposal from Representative Jones of Texas to limit the army to that figure.

With the appropriation only sufficient for 150,000 men authorized, but without any limit as to the number of enlistments that could be made Representative Jones of Texas offered an amendment to definitely fix the minimum number of enlistments and to recommit the bill for that purpose. The motion was defeated 219 to 110.

Exploration in Tibet Have Revealed Existence of a More Massive Mountain Range.

Among the greatest results achieved by the Hedin explorations in Tibet was the discovery of a continuous mountain chain, 2,000 miles long, stretching east and west, and which, taken as a whole, is the most massive range on the crust of the earth. its average height above sea level is greater than that of the Himalayas, and although its peaks are from 4,000 to 5,000 feet lower than Mount Everest, its passes average 3,000 feet higher than those of the Himalayas.

The eastern and western parts of this range were known before, but the central and highest part, in Bougha, was unexplored previous to Doctor Hedin's visit. He crossed ten passes in the range.
