# ANOTHER BIG PRAIRIE FIRE.

## LUBBOCK, LYNN AND GARZER COUNTIES ALL GET BADLY SINGED BY THE PRAIRIE FIRE.

**One Twelfth of Lubbock County, One Fifth of Lynn County and One Fourth of Garza County, all goes up in Smoke, January 17 and 18, 1906.**

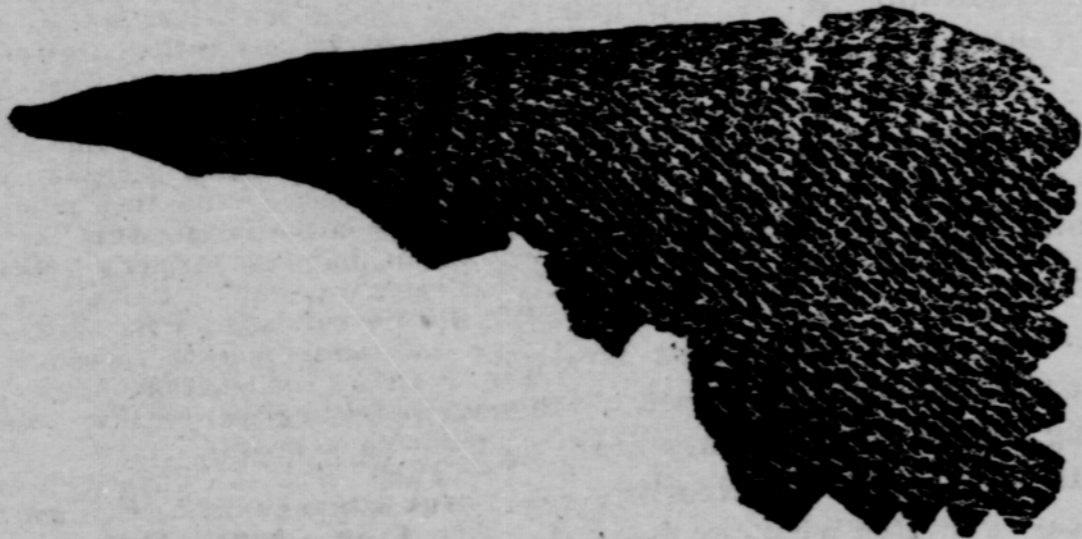
The big prairie fire which started about noon of Wednesday the 17th and burned until Thursday morning after sun up, originated it is said at Sam Slover's place in the south west corner of Lubbock county five or six miles from the west line and one or two miles from the line, by a boy attempting to burn the grass from around a mesquite grub so that he could see to dig it up.

The wind was blowing very strong from the west and the fire raced east at a rapid rate, spreading to the north and south as it went. It is reported that the north line of the fire ranged north of east in Lubbock county and extended 35 or 40 miles, into Crosby county unless the wind changed too soon. The wind was so strong, the grass so thick and high that the head fire was so fierce nothing could be done with it and the men had to content themselves with fighting the side lines and back burning around their houses and feed yards many having hard work to save them.

for when the men had made long breaks in the fire line a change in the wind would send the fire sweeping in behind them undoing every thing they had accomplished.

Again and again, the men who had seen their hard work amount to nothing, would attack the merciless enemy on a new line. If a man had just seen every blade of his grass go up in smoke, did he stop? No! There was his neighbors grass for him to try and save. Many men started for the fire right after dinner and fought on without anything to eat and but little to drink until long after midnight.

Conservative estimates place the damage at 600 sections, or an unequal triangle 40 miles long and 30 miles wide at the east end. Over this vast area there are only a few small patches of grass left unburned. However, in all the state of Texas there is probably no territory that could stand so great a loss with as little hardship, except a few individual cases, as the territory surrounding this great burn. There are several reasons why this

Just before sun down the wind changed to the north west, sending countless tongues of head fires to the south east sweeping over most of the territory that had been saved from the south line of fire. About nine or ten o'clock the wind came from the north changing the course of the fire and burning in behind the fire fighters caused the formation of a new front. The wind continued on around until two o'clock when it settled in the east. After passing the north, the wind calmed down considerably.

The changeableness of the wind was what caused so much damage,

is so at this time. In the first place all the Plains raised an immense crop of feed this year: Also a great crop of grass and what is of the greatest importance this territory is all under stocked and plenty of grass will be easily obtained within a short distance, and it should be at reasonable prices, for if it had not been for the efforts of the men who were burned out, very much more damage would have been done.

Mr. Ketner, one of our county commissioners, who lost most of his grass, was in Lubbock when he first saw the fire, and he made rec-

**The Automobile in War.**  
The first automobile to be used under actual service conditions will shortly be sent by the Russian military authorities to Manchuria, where it will be used to transport war materials and provisions. It consists of a 36-horsepower French car, upon which a large dynamo has been placed, which furnishes the power to the electric motors of five trailers. Each of these can carry a load of 1,760 pounds, and the train can be driven at a rate of speed averaging 30 miles per hour.
