#### GOVERNMENT WINS INCOME TAX SUITS

The David M. Goodrich Case Is Decided by Supreme Court.

Washington.-The government won A string of victories Monday in income tax decisions handed down by the supreme court.

Solicitor General Frieson declared the government's position had been upheld completely. The effect of the rulings, he added, was that any gain derived from corporate bond or capital asset investments was taxable as income, the amount of income subject to such taxation to be estimated from March 1, 1913.

The court's decision was given in the appeal of David M. Goodrich, from a ruling of the internal revenue bureau assessing him upon the increased value of stocks purchased prior to 1913. Action of the revenue officials was affirmed by the supreme court in the transaction showing a gain.

Hoover To Aid Cotton Men.

Washington.-Immediate efforts are to be made by Secretary of Commerce Hoover, in co-operation with the war finance corporation, to solve the question of relief for southern cotton growers. NOT ALLOWED TO BE PESTS

City of Boston Has Strict Regulations Governing Construction and Maintenance of Billboards.

The following regulations are in effect in the city of Boston, governing the use of billboards:

No outdoor advertising shall be permitted on any location within 500 feet of town or city parks, playgrounds, metropolitan parks, parkways, state reservations or public buildings.

No outdoor advertising sign shall exceed an area of ten square feet if within 500 feet of any public highway. No outdoor advertising sign, wherever located, shall exceed an area of 100 square feet and all such signs shall be rectangular in form.

No outdoor advertising shall be permitted upon any rock, tree or natural object of beauty.

All fields and backgrounds of outdoor advertising shall be of neutral colors, and the fields, tackgrounds and letters thereon shall not be discordant with surroundings, and nothing shall be placed thereon except letters of the alphabet and numerals.

No outdoor advertising shall be allowed within the area between intersecting streets and within a radius of 350 feet from the point where the cen-

ter lines of the streets intersect. The structure and the materials of all outdoor advertising signs shall meet the approval of the department of public safety of the state as regards all

questions of fire hazard. No waste or other rubbish resulting from any billboard or outdoor advertising sign shall be allowed to accumulate on or in the vicinity of the premises

where the same is located. Bottoms of all signs shall be at least

three feet from the ground. No outdoor advertising shall be permitted or allowed to be maintained without an annual state license.






