Wilson Marine Silences Enemy Rocket Launcher

AN HOA, Vietnam, Nov. 19 - It was a sad day for enemy soldiers who started a firefight with a squad of Leathernecks.

As elements of "M" Co., 3rd Bn., Fifth Marine Regiment, 1st Division, swept toward a treeline, an estimated platoon of North Vietnamese (NVA) soldiers took them under fire.

As B-40 rockets whirred toward the Leathernecks, Lance Cpl. Rudy Nava, 18, of Wilson, Texas and his assistant, moved their machine gun into position. Nava silenced the enemy rocket launcher with a burst of automatic fire as the fired rockets exploded harmlessly in front of the Marines.

Shortly thereafter, the Leathernecks opened up with mortars and the enemy began breaking contact.

"It was ridiculous" recalled Nava. "It was almost as if they didn't even expect we'd return fire. Once we did they didn't want any more part in the battle."

Four more NVA were killed retreating. There were no Marine casualties.

Address cards and gifts clearly, completely, and correctly, including the ZIP Code number. The ZIP Codes may be obtained from the two ZIP Code Directories placed in the post office lobby for your convenience. Please do not call us on the phone for ZIP Codes during Christmas Season, because we simply will not have the time to look them up for you. Your cooperation in this matter will be sincerely appreciated.

Use the new 6c Christmas Stamps on your cards. Six cents postage is required on all greeting cards this year, whether sealed, unsealed, local or out of town, so please seal them, because they are so much easier to run through our cancelling machine when they are sealed. Put your return address on all cards, and they will be returned to you in the event they cannot be delivered or forwarded at the office of address. An additional bit of information is included, however, for those patrons mailing cards which weigh over one ounce. The third-class (unsealed) rate of postage is 6c for the first two ounces, and those cards weighing over one ounce but less than

Dystrophy is a chronic disease which progressively destroys muscle tissue, disabling its victims and untimely rendering them completely helpless. The disease, no respecter of persons, can strike anyone, regardless of age, sex or race, though a great majority of the victims are children.

At present, dystrophy is incurable as neither the cause nor an effective treatment has yet been discovered. Indirectly, the disease is fatal, weakening its victims to the point where even a simple ailment, like a cold, may lead to death.

Funds collected through local drives are used in research projects, and financing essential and direct services to both patients and their families.

Local firemen have been assigned work areas and will be asking YOUR help in fighting Muscular Dystrophy. Your donation, large or small will further the research un-

Lynn County SCS Report

The Agricultural Conservation Program assists producers throughout the Lynn County Soil and Water District. With the help of ACP several projects are under construction or soon will be.

Among those operators installing parallel terraces under the program include E. R. Blakney of the New Home area, J. C. Gandy and Anton Mueller of the New Lynn area and J. B. Greer of the Grassland area.

Clint Sikes, L. H. Martin, and Grover Stewart are installing diversion terraces. Diversion terraces are designed to control outside water coming onto a field and to safely divert it or store it so land and terraces below will not be damaged.

With the decline of irrigation water it is necessary to conserve all that is possible. With the assistance of ACP several producers are reorganizing their irrigation systems and installing underground irrigation pipelines. Among those planning to install pipe includes Oswald Dube and O. E. Heinrich of the Wilson area; J. A. and G. A. White of New Home; and D. W. Hancock of Lakeview. Several other cooperators in the district plan to install pipe, but their plans are not complete.

two ounces should not be sealed, because the first-class rate (6c per ounce) would apply and 12c postage would be required on each one of them. If you are in doubt as to the weight of the heavier cards, bring one in and the window clerk will be glad to weigh it for you.



MAILING DAYS 'TIL CHRISTMAS

Be sure your gifts are suitable for mailing by placing them in strong boxes wrapped securely in heavy paper, reinforced with heavy twine, addressed plainly and correctly, including the ZIP Code. The ZIP Code is a must on packages, because parcel post delivery zones are now determined by the first three numbers in the ZIP Code. If the ZIP Code is not in the address, the window clerk must look it up, which obviously slows movement in the parcel post line.

Separate your greeting cards into local and out-of-town bundles. Special labels for this purpose have been delivered to all our patrons, but more are available at the post office, if needed. Mail for patrons on the Tahoka rural routes should be included in the "local delivery" bundle.

Moving Day

What to take with you when you move out of a rented apartment, is not only a question of space in the moving van, but also a question of law. Things belong to you, which are landlord's?

Obviously, equipment applied when you moved in, shown on an inventory list, is yours. But what about things you yourself added during your stay like curtains and bookshelves?

As a general rule, you are deemed entitled to take out what you put in. The basis for this is "probable intention." The landlord feels that a tenant's intention is making improvements in the building.

to make his own occupancy enjoyable, not to better the landlord's real estate.

But the opposite intention is possible too. Take this case: A woman tenant, moving out of a rented bungalow, wanted to take up the shrubs she had planted in the back yard. But a court had no right to do so because of her usual intention in planting was to let them stay.

"They are dependent on the soil in which they are planted, and their very existence," said the court, "and are of course a part of the realty."

Besides intention, the law also weighs a second factor: method by which the items are attached to the premises. The strength of the attachment, the tenant's right of removal.

Thus, a tenant who installs a gas stove was allowed to take it because it could be disconnected simply by loosening a single nut with no harm to all to the premises. But another tenant was not allowed to take out linoleum, even though it was attached to the floor, because it would have ruined the floor.

Of course, the same items can be attached in different ways. An old-fashioned bathtub is free on its own legs, was removable by the tenant when he moved in. But not the modern tub, solidly built into place.

If a tenant has doubts about right of removal, he ought to get an understanding with his landlord before the improvement is made. At that time, the change is friendly agreement, and a lot better than they will be on moving day.

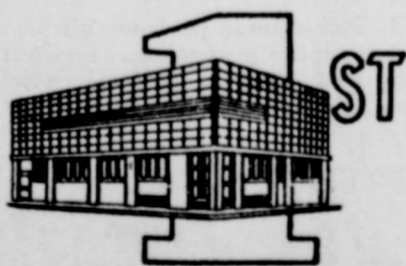

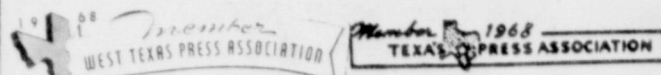

SCS Report**

The Agricultural Conservation Program assists producers throughout the Lynn County Soil and Water District. With the help of ACP several projects are under construction or soon will be.

Among those operators installing parallel terraces under the program include E. R. Blakney of the New Home area, J. C. Gandy and Anton Mueller of the New Lynn area and J. B. Greer of the Grassland area.

Clint Sikes, L. H. Martin, and Grover Stewart are installing diversion terraces. Diversion terraces are designed to control outside water coming onto a field and to safely divert it or store it so land and terraces below will not be damaged.

With the decline of irrigation water it is necessary to conserve all that is possible. With the assistance of ACP several producers are reorganizing their irrigation systems and installing underground irrigation pipelines. Among those planning to install pipe includes Oswald Dube and O. E. Heinrich of the Wilson area; J. A. and G. A. White of New Home; and D. W. Hancock of Lakeview. Several other cooperators in the district plan to install pipe, but their plans are not complete.

two ounces should not be sealed, because the first-class rate (6c per ounce) would apply and 12c postage would be required on each one of them. If you are in doubt as to the weight of the heavier cards, bring one in and the window clerk will be glad to weigh it for you.



MAILING DAYS 'TIL CHRISTMAS

Be sure your gifts are suitable for mailing by placing them in strong boxes wrapped securely in heavy paper, reinforced with heavy twine, addressed plainly and correctly, including the ZIP Code. The ZIP Code is a must on packages, because parcel post delivery zones are now determined by the first three numbers in the ZIP Code. If the ZIP Code is not in the address, the window clerk must look it up, which obviously slows movement in the parcel post line.

Separate your greeting cards into local and out-of-town bundles. Special labels for this purpose have been delivered to all our patrons, but more are available at the post office, if needed. Mail for patrons on the Tahoka rural routes should be included in the "local delivery" bundle.

Moving Day

What to take with you when you move out of a rented apartment, is not only a question of space in the moving van, but also a question of law. What things belong to you, what to the landlord?

Obviously, equipment applied when you moved in, shown on an inventory list, is yours. But what about things yourself added during your stay like curtains and bookshelves?

As a general rule, a tenant is deemed entitled to take out of the apartment what he has put in. The basis for this is "probable intention." The tenant feels that a tenant's intention in making improvements is to



to make his own occupancy enjoyable, not to better the landlord's real estate.

But the opposite is also possible too. Take this case: A woman tenant, moving out of a rented bungalow, wanted to take up the shrubs she had planted in the back yard. But a court had no right to do so, because usual intention in planting is to let them stay.

They are dependent upon you when they are placed in their respective boxes, and are of course a part of reality.

Besides intention, the law also weighs a second factor, method by which the letter is attached to the premises. The attachment, the strongest tenant's right of removal.

Can you pass the breakfast test? Many people fail.

A three-point test of a good breakfast is: 1. It gives you protein, vitamins and minerals needed to build and repair the body and to keep you healthy. 2. It provides energy fuel for the body. 3. It tastes good.

A breakfast of coffee and a sweet roll fails the test on the first step. Such a breakfast leaves too many nutrients for other meals to pick up, says Linda.

Juice and coffee go part-way in step one but fail number two.

A fourth of the day's food value should be gained through a good breakfast. To get it, include a good source of protein (eggs, meat), a cereal product (enriched hot and cold cereals, breads), a fruit (juice, fresh, cooked) and milk. These foods contribute to the over-all good health of the older American, says Linda.

Lack of adequate supplies of calcium, found in milk products, causes the senior citizen's bones to become porous and, therefore, break more easily, adds Linda.

Vitamins A and C from fresh and cooked fruits and vegetables contribute to healthy gums and skin, reminds Linda. When oldsters fail to eat fruits and vegetables, the gums become red and inflamed and bleed easily, and dentures often are uncomfortable.

Lack of Vitamin C found in citrus fruits causes a weakening of the walls of the blood vessels. Thus, a person bruises more easily. In addition, Vitamin C builds resistance to infections such as colds and viruses, she adds.

A breakfast without protein causes slower healing after surgery, a cut or flesh wound. With protein in the diet body sores will heal faster because body tissues are more rapidly replaced and repaired.

In older persons additional weight gain can be attributed to poor selection of foods, rather than over-eating, adds Linda.
