





Legion and its auxiliaries. The bell, 71/2 feet high and weighing 81/2 tons was cast last January 17 at the N. V. Petit-Fritsen Bell Foundry Aarle-Rixtle, Holland. There was no firm in the U.S. that could handle the job. The Dutch firm, though, is an affiliate of the I. T. Verdin Co., Cincinnati, Ohio, the largest bell manufacturer in

Made of 80 per cent copper and 20 per cent tin, the bell is tuned to the musical note, "F," exactly one octave below the sound of the Liberty Bell which was rung for the last time in 1846.
