Mr. Tudor had lived in Fort Worth about 40 years. He was manager and co-owner of the Rodeway Inn Barber Shop. He was a Mason and Shriner. He was born December 10, 1908 at Munday, Texas, and came to Matador as a youth, with his parents.

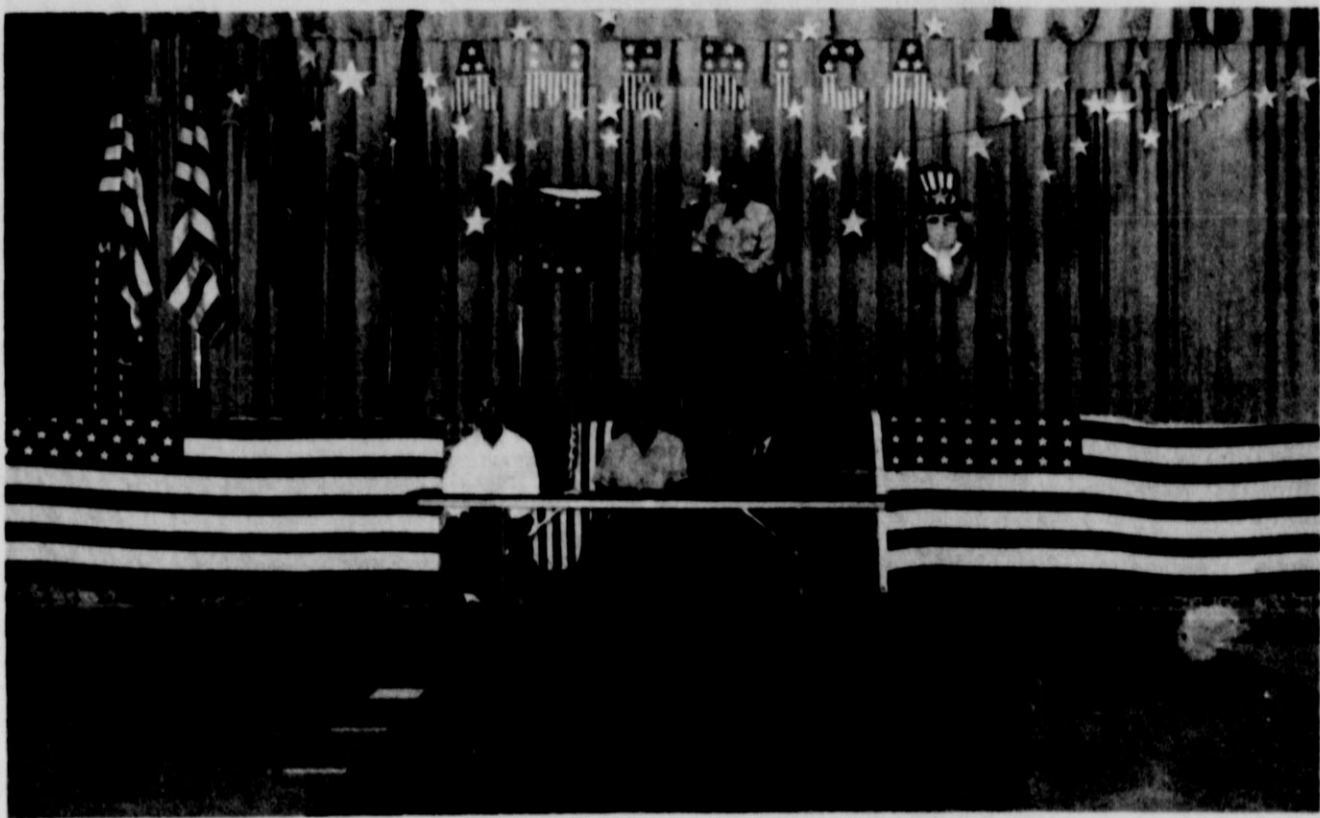

Be Proud Of Flag Students Are Told

"Have pride in our country and the flag of the United States," Motley school students were told in a Veteran's Day address, Nov. 11. "Don't be ashamed to show your love for the flag," Speaker was Luther Green, Quartermaster of the Motley County Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Past Commander of the organization. He has served as Commander of this post seven times.

A veteran of World War II, and member of both the V. F. W. and American Legion, Green's address was concerning Flag Etiquette, with a demonstration of the proper procedure in folding the National standard, by Curtis King Post Commander of the V. F. W. and Mal Simpson. Also with the group was another V. F. W. member, Buck Hughes.

Mr. Green opened the program with a reading, "Hello, Remember Me? Some people call me Old Glory, others call me the Star Spangled Banner, but whatever they call me, I am your Flag, the Flag of the United States of America . . ."

The reading contrasts the attitude of the public when men used to remove their hats and people stood at attention when the flag passed, and in more recent years when "you just stand there with your hands in your pockets."

The proper placing of the flag was also described - the field of blue to the North, when draped, and to the East when on a stand. When the flag is on a platform, or higher than the audience, the flag is at the right of the speaker, Mr. Green explained. When not at a higher level, the flag is to the right of the audience.

Death Claims Mrs. Sonier

Funeral services for a former Matador resident, Mrs. J. C. (Jo) Sonier, 49, of Nederland, Texas, were held Friday, Nov. 14, at Nederland. Burial was in a Nederland Cemetery.

Mrs. Sonier passed away at a hospital there, Wednesday, Nov. 12, following a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Sonier lived in Matador from 1955 to 1957, where her husband operated a service station. She had lived in the Nederland area since moving from Matador.

Survivors include her husband; two daughters, Mrs. Ronnie Shifflett of Del Rio and Mrs. Mike Parker of Austin; three sons, Larry Sonier of Nederland and Jerry and Terry, both of the home; her mother, Mrs. Vardie Hightower of San Jose, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Bill Seale and Mrs. E. T. Patterson, both of Snyder, and Mrs. Dub Winslett of San Jose, Calif., also a brother, J. W. Hightower of San Jose; and six grandchildren.

There are 18 occasions designated for the American Flag to be displayed, Mr. Green said. These include New Year's Day, Presidential Inauguration (Jan. 20 every four years), Lincoln's Birthday (Feb. 12), Washington's Birthday, (Feb. 22), Easter Sunday (Date changes), Jefferson's Birthday, (April 13), Mother's Day, (2nd Sunday in May), Armed Forces Day (3rd Saturday in May), National Maritime Day (May 22), Memorial Day (May 30, with Flag at half staff until noon, then at full staff), Flag Day, (June 14), Independence Day, (July 4), Labor Day (1st Monday in Sept.), Constitution Day and Citizenship Day (Sept. 17), Columbus Day (Oct. 12), Veteran's Day (Nov. 11), Thanksgiving Day (4th Thursday in Nov.), and Christmas Day (Dec. 25).

Mr. Green explained that the Veterans of Foreign Wars was organized in 1899 by Spanish-American War Veterans and is the oldest serviceman's organization. After the Armistice was signed ending World War I on November 11, 1918, that date was designated as Armistice Day by the American Legion, which was organized in France in 1919. Following World War II, the observance became Veteran's Day, to honor veterans of all wars.

"Your future and the future of the Flag are closely associated," Green told the students, and quoted, "I (the flag) am your belief in yourself, your dream of what a people may become."

Charles Johnson, Superintendent of Schools and American Legion Post Commander presented Mr. Green to the student body, during the assembly in the school gymnasium at 11 a.m.

The stage had been decorated in preparation for the Bicentennial Program given Thursday night, and was an appropriate background for the Veteran's Day observance.

In this capacity she provides home economics training for the local county Extension program in these counties.

Miss Sowell is a native of Cleburne, Texas and is a graduate of Texas Christian University.

She was introduced to residents of Motley County at the recent 4-H Awards Banquet.

As County Extension Agent-at-Large, she will work with

leaders in the three-county area providing training for 4-H projects. She will also provide leadership for awards programs that correlate with these projects. Where there are Home Demonstration Club organizations and Home Economics Study Groups, she will provide training for their leaders.

In addition to these programs, she will provide leadership for educational programs on food buying, especially adapted to people receiving food stamps.

El Progresso Club Has Guest Speaker

El Progresso Club met Thursday evening, Nov. 13 in the home of Mrs. J. E. Edwards for its regular meeting with "Religion" as the program theme, in observance of National Bible Week, November 23-30, and Mr. Bill Stanford of Plainview as guest speaker.

After presiding over a business session, Mrs. Harold Campbell, club president presented Mrs. W. N. Pipkin as leader for the evening. Mrs. Pipkin read Psalm 100 in her introduction for the program, then introduced Mr. Stanford who spoke on, "Two Hundred Years of American Worship Services."

Mr. Stanford presented an interesting talk on God's influence on the Universe from the time Columbus left on his voyage to the New

World under the Christian influence to the present day Space explorers.

"America was born of God," he declared. "Pioneers traveling from the Northeast, down the Mississippi and westward came to find land and riches, but foremost, behind it all, was a place in which to worship God as they chose."

"Different denominations sprang up in different areas. They not only worshipped, but established colleges and advanced the economy of the nation. Through it all, 100,000,000 people have immigrated to the United States to seek jobs, join families and for various other reasons."

He pointed out that after World War II, America became a land of "too much plenty - forgetting God." This, he said, brought about

modernism in churches.

"The Christian faith is more notable today than ever before, with great evangelists such as Billy Graham, Oral Roberts, Rex Humbard and many others . . . the Gospel is going forth in more homes than ever before through TV, church extension ministry and other means."

"Many noted people are 'standing tall' for Christianity," Mr. Stanford declared, citing those in the entertainment field and sports, such as Johnny Cash, Dale Evans, Jerry Lucas (basketball star), Tom Netherton (the handsome new singer on the Lawrence Welk show); and those in politics - Paul Hess, State Senator of Kansas, Mark Hatfield, Senator from Oregon; Jack Hightower, Representative from Texas and Arizona Legislator John Conlin.

The Evangelical Movement is on the move with campus organizations that have a great impact on other young people, Mr. Stanford stated. "Books on Christian Faith are being published in greater numbers than ever before, as are tapes and records, and new hymns are being written in great numbers with a new rhythm."

"Somewhere, everyday, every minute of the day, someone is praying in America . . . we want to live a life acceptable to Jesus everyday."

"Live every day as if it were the last - one more day for Jesus; one less day for me," is Bill Stanford's way of life.

Mr. Stanford, who was accompanied by his wife, Betty, is a native of the Panhandle area. He was born in Hereford and graduated from high school there. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University and spent five and one-half years in military service. He has been in the educational field since his graduation from college and at present is Director of Federal Programs for Plainview Schools. He also works with the Gideons in speaking and distributing Bibles. The Stanfords have three grown children and are members of Inter-Faith Church - Calvary Temple of Plainview.

Miss Mary Keith read "Secret of Happiness," by D. A. Markham as the Inspirational Thought. Thanksgiving prayer was by Mrs. Ben Keltz.

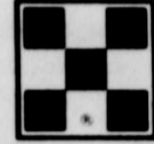

CONSUMER FOOD NEWS

COLLEGE STATION — With turkey, fryer chicken and eggs in adequate supply, consumers can look for specials on these items in Texas grocery stores for the next few weeks, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt says.

The consumer marketing information specialist is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

At beef counters, chuck and round cuts are less expensive than the more tender cuts,

with ground beef and liver the other economical choices, Mrs. Clyatt added. "Fresh and frozen fish is plentiful, and it offers low-cost with little or no waste.

"Pork prices remain high, but November supplies should be slightly larger than October's — so now's the time to take advantage of any specials. Look for Boston butts, end chops, quarterloins cut into chops, smoked ham butts and shanks, frankfurters and liver."

Apples lead the good-buy race at fruit counters with this year's record-large crop, the specialist said.

"Other good fruit choices, qualitywise, are bananas, grapefruit, oranges, grapes, pears, tangerines and tangelos."

At vegetable counters, the more economical items are carrots, green cabbage, broccoli, rutabagas and hard shell squash.

Also mustard greens, collards, turnip and greens, pumpkin and sweet potatoes.

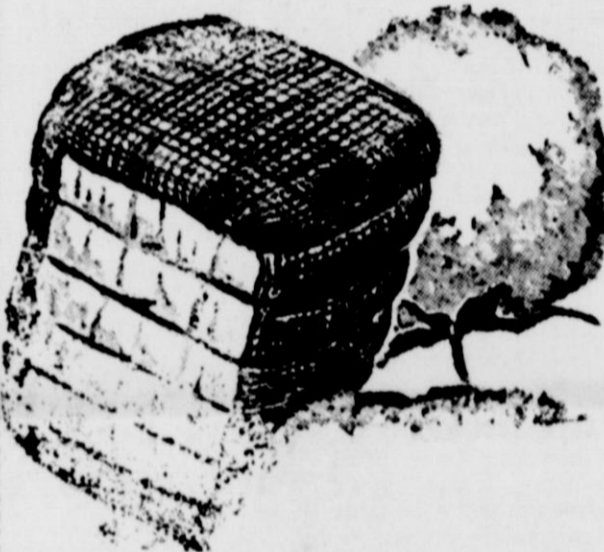

Not too surprising considering all the attention given by ecologists to some misuses of chemicals. Farmers however, are probably the most ecologically minded group in the country . . . have been for years. Making your living from the land means taking care of it. Proper applications of chemicals enhance vitality of the soil, replacing those elements used to produce the last crop. Necessary use of pesticides not only keeps quality of food production high, it also makes possible far greater quantity of production and thereby keeps food prices down. As far as overuse of chemicals is concerned, the guy paying the bills is going to be the last one to use more than is needed to do the proper job.
