Tularemia is a disease that

can be transmitted from infected wild animals to man. The contact with infected animals, usually rabbits, comes when the hunter handles or dresses the game he kills. Another source of infection for Tularemia is transmission by vectors, such as ticks or fleas, that can carry the disease from the infected animal to man.

The rabbit population is unusually high this year and many hunters will be adding rabbit stew to the menu. Dr. Evers stresses that hunters should be warned not to dress or handle these animals with bare hands. Rubber or plastic gloves in good condition should be used. The raw meat should not be handled without protection until it is thoroughly cooked. In addition, care should be taken to see that the raw meat is not exposed to other

Tularemia causes symptoms of acute illness soon after exposure. There is a sudden onset of headache, chills, nausea-vomiting and high temperature. Confirmed diagnosis can be made only through laboratory

A longtime and well known West Texas cowhand, Carey L. "Humpy" Briggs was claimed by death, Thursday, December 18, in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, after a brief illness. He was 87.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Dec. 20, in Henderson Chapel, Lubbock. Officiating was Rev. Larry Heard, pastor of First Baptist Church, Idalou. Known as one of the best

sourdough cooks in West Texas, Mr. Briggs worked for several of the largest ranches in this area, including the 6666 Ranch, Pitchford Ranch and Matador Ranch. He began ranch work in 1903 and retired in 1958. During the years he was a regular attendant at the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion held annually at Roaring Springs. He and his longtime friend, Fred Collett of Hereford frequently brought their own bedrolls and slept on the lawn at the home of relatives while attending Old Settlers.

Matador, Mr. Briggs made his home in Floydada until moving to Lubbock in 1971. He was a Baptist, and a member of the Rodeo Club. Survivors include three daughters, Virginia Briggs of Lubbock, Velma Rogers of Idalou, and Mrs. Corine Moseley of Oklahoma City; ten grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchildren.





Significant changes are on the

horizon for researchers work-

ing on agricultural projects. Underlying factor for these changes is the growing concensus among scientists that current research with its aims at yield increases through better fertilization and cultivation technique may be nearing its peak. In short, there is a growing feeling that we are reaching the stage of making a plant produce all that is possible. That's the reason for the change in direction. Scientists are now beginning to experiment on changes in the biological potential of plants. Basic changes in photosynthesis are being considered. Methods of limiting a plant's respiration are under study and the strange yield increases of some plants when exposed to carbon dioxide are being examined. In short, the new direction for research involves changing the plant itself in ways which could develop new and much greater yield increases.
