It is unfortunate that so many of us see life as the engineer backing his train over an unfamiliar route, who views the rails over which he has passed.

Silence once the symbol of the great Plains of Texas has vanished in the vortex of Incandescent progress. lamps, like lonely fireflies glow in the strange expanse of night, each a watchman by a belching motor. A thousand spirings of pure, cold water rush through flumes to the thirsty soil and the world throbs in unison. A world of magic fields awaits the heated dawn, refreshed and vibrant, from rain that lifted beneath the cloudless stars

Life is the substance of suffering. Chuck-wagons piled high with bed rolls rumbled out of the ranges years ago but the gray-haired old cowboy has kept the memory. A sharp wind bearing the kiss of winter on its cheek, raced across the hills and yellow grass, when he heard the steer bellow. His sensitive ears knew the sound bearing distress, and he touched his horse with a spur. Beyond a second hill he found the Lobo Wolf and a suffering steer in a drama of the range. The steer with shoulder tendons cut, flounced on the bloody grass, while the wolf ate choice stomach fat from the animal's living

After long personal reconclusion definite black-eved peas have a narcotic effect on the indigenous denizen of this area. It is too early, of course, to release my findings to the public, especially during a season fraught with drouth when the diet may of necessity rest heavily on the opiate bean. Only last week I began developing spasms of delusion: a kettle of green snaps and shelled blackeyes, cooked slowly and to a tender delicacy with smoked bacon, a plate of brown and crusted cornbread. 

When the label is obtained, it contains information on how much material to use and safety precautions that should be followed. If these instructions are followed, the chemical is safe to use, but too many people think that if one pound will do the job, two will do it better and faster. This is where we get in

Misuse can cost your life, or that of your animals. It also runs up the cost of controls. but the main thing to

trouble.

consider is that this is often how inspectors pick up residues that can be used to ban the use of the chemical. It doesn't take as long to stop the use of a chemical as it takes to obtain clearance to use a chemical. It's up to the users of these chemicals to insure their continued use WHAT DO YOU WANT? 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
