## Pioneer Observes 90th Birthday

Hallowe'en has a special significance for C. D. (Uncle Charlie) Bird, resident of Motley County since 1885. He was born on Pumpkin Creek at Canton, Ga., and yesterday celebrated his 90th birthday.

"After being water-bound for 4 years in Arkansas," he relates, "my parents moved to Texas when I was about five years old, and settled in Erath County."

Mr. Bird began working for the Pitchfork Ranch in 1884 and later was a cowhand on the Matador Ranch. "Somebody I'll tell you the story of how I earned my first saddle and horse," he told a Tribune reporter.

He voted in the first county election of Motley County in 1891, and the same year was married to Miss Daisy Blair of Erath County. She died in March 1948, and he was later married in Colorado Springs, to Mrs. Ada E. Black, an early-day friend.

Mr. Bird was one of the original stockholders of First State Bank and has been associated with the institution for almost half a century.

Mr. Bird has one daughter, Mrs. John Moore of Bethesda, Md., and four sons: Carl and Gus of Matador, Cliff of Spur, and Glen, of Azle. He also has eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

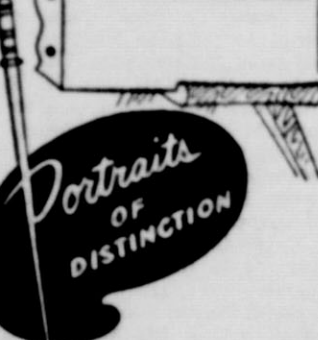

**Cotton Referendum Date Is Announced**

U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced the 1957 state acreage allotments for upland cotton; the national allotment for extra long staple cotton and set December 11 as the date for a referendum on marketing quotas for the 1957 cotton crop.

The total allotments available for distribution in the states were set by the USDA at 17,585,463 acres. The total allotment for Texas was set at 7,547,303 acres which includes 10,974 acres as Texas' share of the national reserve. The Agricultural Act of 1956 provides that a national acreage reserve of 100,000 acres be apportioned among States on the basis of the estimated needs of each State for additional acreage to establish minimum farm allotments under the act.

The marketing quota for the 1957 crop upland cotton was announced on August 31 as 11,014,493 bales of 500 pounds gross weight. The marketing quota for extra long staple cotton, just announced, is 76,565 bales, and the national acreage allotment was set at 89,357 acres for the 1957 crop.

At least two-thirds of the cotton producers voting in the December 11 referendum must favor

or the marketing quotas if they are to be effective on the 1957 crops. Whether quotas are approved or disapproved, 1957 cotton acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support.

The USDA announcement said that the state acreage allotments would be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among farmers according to provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. Individual farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum.

**Tax Refund Checks Should Be Claimed**

The Internal Revenue Service is diligently looking for 3,000 North Texans who have tax refund checks awaiting them, according to D. L. King, Administrative Officer of the Plainview office. The Dallas office has an employee who spends full time finding taxpayers due a refund check. A very large part of the taxpayers due a refund check have moved and failed to give Internal Revenue a forwarding address. In quite a few cases, the taxpayers plain forget to put their address on their tax return. Mr. King stated the checks ranged in size from a few dollars to

some amounting to several thousand dollars.

A Dallas newspaper recently printed 600 names and addresses of Dallas taxpayers due refund checks. Within three days, 400 of these taxpayers had claimed their checks. King advised Matador area taxpayers who are due a refund check to send their correct name and address to Miss Bonnie Reed, Claims Examiner, District Director of Internal Revenue, 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas. Miss Reed is as glad to hear from the taxpayers who have refund checks in her file as the taxpayers are glad to get the checks.

A few taxpayers have been notified that their returns are being audited before their refund can be made. Mr. King explained. These taxpayers will be individually advised concerning their refunds. They should not contact Miss Reed.
