# Rodeos About To Produce Two 'National Champions'

DENVER, Jan. 21. 49-The rodeos are about to produce two "national champions."

The Rodeo Cowboys association announced plans today to name a national champion cowboy. It's virtually certain that its top hand won't be the same one as that of the International Rodeo association which has had the field to itself until now.

The men who run the rodeos make up the IRA. At each rodeo sponsored by it, the association gives cowboys one point for each dollar of prize money they win. The points are totaled at the end of the year, and the one with the most points reigns as the rodeo circuit's top hand for

About 1,800 cowboys who ride and rope for money make up the RCA. The president, Toots plained that many of them appear in shows not affiliated with the IRA, and don't like the idea of getting no credit in the national standings for many performances.

The cowboys, who already name their champs for various events, will give their members one point for each dollar of prize and entry money won, and all shows approved by the RCA will be counted.

Entry fees make up a big part of the rodeo hands' winnings. At the National Western Rodeo where 300 are competing this year, the calf roping prize money is \$3,600, but entry fees boost

Is Suspect In Bremond Robbery Case

DALLAS, Jan. 21. (AP)-The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced today that Francis M. Hooper, 22, sought for the \$12,500 robbery of the First State Bank of Bremond, Dec. 23 was arrested last night in Los An-

Hooper's brother, John Bernard Hooper, 26, was shot and killed by Sheriff Bob Reeves of Robertson county as the robbers fled from the

The FBI said that Francis Hooper had \$5,750 in his possession at the time of his arrest. He was picked up by FBI agents and Hollywood detectives. He offered no re-

The last previous trace of Francis Hooper was found at Fort Worth Christmas Eve, when a blood-stained, bullet - marked car used in the robbery was discovered in the River Oaks section there. More than \$500 in packaged coins was found in the car. The car was identified as having been stolen in an armed robbery at Dallas last August.

Hooper is under charges of armed robbery in Robertson county. He formerly lived at Belton and Port Arthur.

Sheriff Reeves, whose office is at Franklin, happened to be in Bremond at the time of the robbery. He was in a garage across the street from the bank when the two robbers emerged with pistols in their hands.

He shot down J. B. Hooper. "It was either me or him," he said later.

The second gunman unsuccessfully tried to drag his companion into the car, then pushed the body into the street and sped away.



### Craft Catches Fire After It Hits Snowbank

**Passengers** Jump From High Exit

BOSTON, Jan. 21. (AP)-Fourteen passengers were injured as they leaped from a big Eastern Airlines Lockheed Constellation today after the plane skidded into a snowbank and caught fire when it landed in early morning darkness at Logan inter-

national airport. The \$1,000,000 airliner was almost completely consumed by the flames that spread from one of the four engines while 20 passengers and five crew members jumped or dropped 15 feet from a doorway on the opposite side into snowbanks. Enroute from Miami to Newark, the plane was rerouted first to New York and then to Boston because of stormy weather. Seven persons were treated in



#### Police Locate Child Actress Who Ran Away



For one thing, the show will reflect the importance of good breeding in stock. It also will reflect meticulous care and feeding on the part of club boys and Future Farmers of America. Perhaps many of these youngsters, having gained some know-how in their calf and lamb and capon projects, may be the ones to do something about our feeding and breeding potentialities in the years ahead.

#### Petrillo Is On The Carpet Again

The House labor committee is going through the travail of hearings on James C. Petrillo, head of the American Federation of Musicians.

First up in the series were heads of the broadcasting chains, who at the moment are engaged in negotiations with Bro. Petrillo. Rep. Leskinski has accused the committee of using the hearings to "intimidate the union" during the process of these negotiations.

He was, of course, making a statement for publication just as the chain heads had been speaking for quotation. So now that that phase of the hearing is past, the committee proposes to hear from members of the AFM to see if they like the way Bro. Petrillo runs things.

This is supposed to develop whether the

Washington's decision to reopen the war-time American airfield of Mellaha, near Tripoli in North Africa, has stirred the wrath of the Soviet press which (always inspired) charges that this is further evidence of Uncle Sam's imperialistic ambition to

rule the world. The accusers choose not to recall that Russia has made an open secret of her desire to become a Mediterranean power. Indeed, she wants a mandate over the Italian colony of Tripolitania. and is demanding that Turkey give her a hand in the control

of the strategic Dardanelles. Well. America has no imperialistic ambitions, but a couple of world wars, in which she has been compelled to play a leading role, have thrust world wide interests and obligations upon her. One of the theatres in which Uncle Sam's obligations and interests are heaviest is the Mediterranean, which has become one of America's front line defenses-one of the front-line defenses of the Western Hemi-

Out of that zone could came another world war.

The time was, of course, when Britannia ruled the waves and was mistress of the Mediterranean, though France and Italy had good places in the sun. But the Second World War knocked out the latter two, and has compelled England to acknowledge that she no longer is capable of mainteining her supremancy

2. Rents, under the present law, already have gone up. There's bad inflation in this

country now. Many landlords are a cinch to boost rents if Congress lets the controls die Feb. That would just kick the eost

of living so much higher. Since this is an election year the voters are likely to take it out on the political party they blame for adding to their living



For years Jesse Jones' construction Finance Corporation was the one and only government agency not subject to scrutiny by the government accounting office. Lindsay Warren, eagle-eyed comptroller general and boss of the general accounting office did his best to have his auditors examine Jesse's books, but Jesse's pull on Capitol Hill was so strong that he remained exempt.

Now, however, Comptroller General Warren finally has been able to probe certain operations by RFC subsidiaries, Simultaneously, indefatigable. Congressman G. Bender of Cleveland, O. is planning to air certain deals that the general accounting office has unearthed. Here is the

first. The Andrews Steel plant of Newport, Ky., is located along the Ohio river where it needs costly repairs every time the river is flooded. In 1942 it was owned by Lehman brothers, the New York banking firm, which sold it in 1943 to Paul Angell and Charles Stamm of Chicago, who had scarcely moved in before they threatened to close down unless the government took the plant over.

The defense plan corporation, a subsidiary of Jesse Jones' RFC sent its assistant vice president, T. W. Atkins, to inspect the plant. He reported that it was run down, needed repairs and that no more than \$472,890.68 of the total inventory was worth purchasing.

"It seems rather like economle suicide to carry on operations at Andrews Steel." Atkins report-

WHO WAS IN WOODPILE? However, Atkins was overruled. Someone up above took over the plant at terms virtually dictated by the company-namely \$395,976 in management fees. \$320,087 for repairs and \$97,500 or office rental.

Atkins protested that the management fee was excessive and most of the repairs superfluous. But again he was overruled. Later the Ohio river flooded

the plant for nine days, just as Atkins predicted, costing the government \$230,601 in damages. On top of this Defense Plan corporation purchased the inventory of the plant for \$808.028.

As a result of all this, the plant did not reach capacity production until after V-E day. And shortly thereafter, the owners. Stamm and Angell wanted the plant and inventroy back again. In fact they became so insistent that they threatened to assess storage charges if the government did not turn things back.




