The areas shaded with unbroken lines around the border are demanded outright; the areas shaded with broken lines are those in which Hitler demands that plebescites be held before November 25. Note there are three island areas in the interior in which Hitler has insisted the residents vote their choice of the nation of which they desire to be a part. School Tax Rate Is Fixed Again At \$1

Valuations Totaling \$8,842,101 Approved: Teachers' Salaries Fixed

Tax rate for the Big Spring independent school district for the year was fixed formally Monday night at \$1—no change—and the tax rolls were approved by the board of trustees in a special session. The \$1 rate represents the maximum allowed by law.

Tax rolls as approved cover taxable valuations (90 per cent) of \$8,-842,101, real property being valued at \$6,369,450 and personal property at \$3,150,680. Values were hiked this year a blanket ten per cent.

The trustees also approved an order providing that 36 per cent of the personner of the personn

LONDON, Sept. 27 (AP) — The Czechoslovak govern-ment announced today it re-fused to accept Adolf Hitler's demands on Sudetenland.

The Czechoslovak an from the Czech legation through Czechoslovak Minis-ter Jan Masaryk, was con-tained in a Czech note given to Foreign Secretary Vincent Halifax last Sunday.

"Cruel Demands"

The note stated: "My government wishes me to declare in all solemn ity that Hitler's demands in their present form are absolutely and unconditionally unacceptable to my

"Against these new cruel de mands my government feel bound to make their utmost resistance and we shall do so, God helping us. The note added that Czechoslo-vakia expected France and Great Britain to assist her.

The Czechoslovak map said the document and map presented by Hitler "Is a de facto ultimatum of a sort usually presented to a vanquished nation and not a proposition to a sovereign state which has shown the greatest possible readiness to make sacrifices for the appeasement of Europe.

Europe Will Need American Food

LONDON, Sept. 27 UP:—European nations looked hungrily to ward the Americas today in a mad scramble to fill their exphoneds for war and prevent the starvation that stalked the last conflict.






