

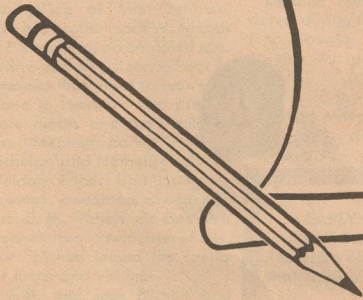

3 Matador Students Receive Degrees from Texas Tech

Texas Tech University has awarded degrees in 1984-85 to the following students from Matador:

Bachelor's degree-Shannon Horace Jameson, Route 1, bachelor of business administration in marketing; Pam Francis, bachelor of science in education; Kathy V. Moore, bachelor of business administration in marketing and Charles E. Cammack, bachelor of science in agricultural economics.

3 Matador Students on Honor Roll at Texas Tech

Eighteen hundred students at Texas Tech University qualified for the president's and dean's honor rolls in the university's six colleges during the 1985 spring semester.

To make the President's Honor List a student must earn a 4.0 (A) grade-point average while enrolled in 12 or more semester hours of classwork. For the Dean's List a student must finish 12 or more semester hours with a grade-point average of 3.5 or higher.

Students making the honor rolls included the following from Matador:

Chad Stephens of Motley County has been named to receive South Plains College's most prestigious scholarship award.

Stephens has been named a Smallwood Scholar for 1985-86 and has been awarded a \$2,000 stipend which will be dispensed over four consecutive fall and spring semesters in the amount of \$500 per semester.

SPC named 60 area students to receive the award, including eight area valedictorians, six salutatorians and 37 honor graduates.

"It gives the college great pleasure to name these students Smallwood Scholars," said Dr. Marvin Baker. "They are among the most academically adept students on the South Plains and we are pleased that they have chosen South Plains College to continue their education."

Stephens, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Stephens of Matador, was valedictorian of Motley County High, member of FFA and recipient of awards in algebra, biology, chemistry and geometry.

The scholarship honors John L. and Vergie Belle Smallwood, longtime business and church leaders in Levelland. Through their bequest to the College, funds are made available annually to recognize outstanding students.

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. 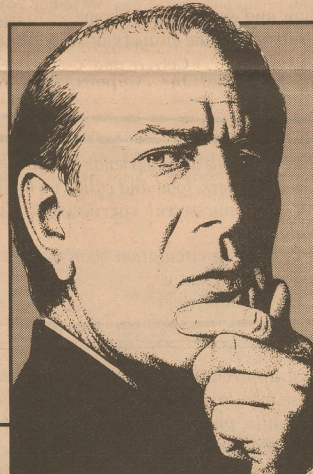

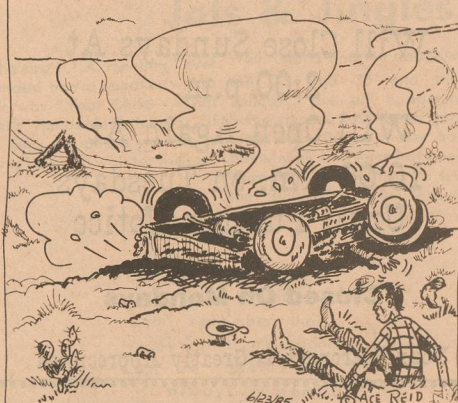

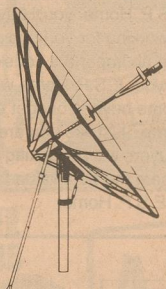
