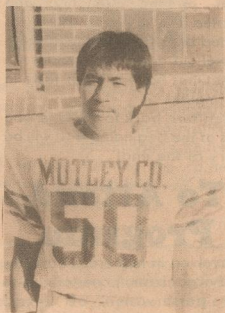




# District Play Opens With 26-6 Defeat

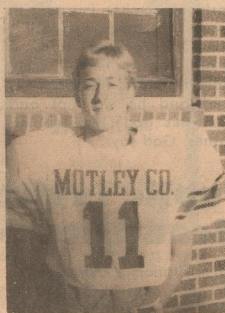


Matadors unsuccessfully struggled with the Spur Bulldogs Friday night.

The Motley County Matadors opened district play last Friday when they met the Spur Bulldogs here at home.

Spur scored first in the opening quarter on a two yard run. The Matadors defense held the Bulldogs on the two-point conversion attempt with 30 seconds left in the quarter.

Spur scored again in the second quarter on a 35 yard pass from Matlock to Courtney. The point-after attempt was again stalled as the Matadors defense held strong, ending the first half of play.

Third quarter play was offensively dominated by Spur. An eight yard run, along with a kicked PAT put the Bulldogs ahead 19-0. Before the quarter was over, Spur scored again with a 58 yard pass plus a kicked PAT.

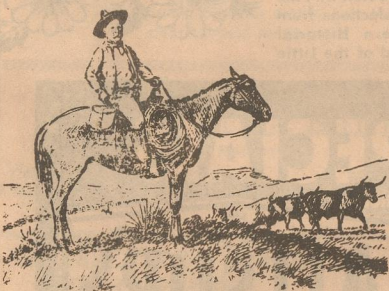
With a strong fourth quarter effort, the Matadors scored on a four yard run by Potts. The two-

point conversion attempt fell short as Potts was stopped on the one yardline. The Matadors defense held the Bulldogs scoreless in the final minutes, ending the game with the score: Motley County 6 -- Spur 26.

**Coach's Comments**

"I was disappointed with our performance on Friday night against Spur. We did not seem to have the intensity it takes to play against good football teams and win. Our players need to be more aggressive and physical in the upcoming games for us to be successful. We have the ability to win, but the players must understand that victory is something that has to be worked and fought for, not something that is going to be given to them by the opposing team.

We are going to work very hard this week on the fundamentals of blocking and tackling, and also on being more aggressive and physical."

## Northfield Representatives Meet With Commissioners

The Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday, October 14 for their regular monthly meeting. Those present were Commissioners Bill Washington, Joseph Simpson, J.M. Russell, Frazier Watson, County Judge Billy Joe Whitaker and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell.

After an invocation from Commissioner Washington, the meeting was called to order. Minutes from last month's meeting as well as a special called meeting on Oct. 7 were read and approved.

**Northfield School**

Approximately 20 resident of the Northfield community were present. Their purpose was to request the old Northfield school (gymnasium) be deeded to the Northfield Homecoming Association. Spokesman for the group, R.E. Hoover, explained that the group would like to do repairs on the building before it is ruined so that the community can use it for meetings and especially for their homecoming. There was a detailed discussion about the matter and about a water line to the facility with some dissension expressed.

Margie Cook of Northfield told those present that the community was split on things to which Mr. Hoover replied "You've been against everything we've tried to do." Franklin Jameson added that the community needs to get back

together again which Mrs. Cook and Hoover agreed that it was terrible to be "fussing".

At this point Mr. Clem Timmons, president of the Northfield Homecoming Association proposed that the group have a community meeting and vote whether or not the Northfield community wanted the original request concerning the school. Minutes will be made of this meeting to reflect the vote for request of the deed to be turned over to the organization.

Howard Traweek, attorney, felt that this would be the legal way to handle the situation although he will do further investigating.

The united group left expressing their appreciation to each commissioner for listening to them and considering their request which will be re-presented at another meeting.

**Sesquicentennial Delegation**

Michelle Bearden, Darla Gwinn and Marisue Potts informed the Commissioners about some of the detailed plans for the May 1986 Texas' 150th anniversary. A Sesquicentennial Coordinating Committee for the county has been appointed to plan the celebration for the county and this list of names was presented with Commissioner J.M. Russell added to the list as the County Courts representative.

The Commissioners of the court then signed a resolution

stating: Now, Therefore, it resolved, that Motley County as a local committee recognizes and supports the committee on the Sesquicentennial Coordinating Committee.

**Chief Williams**

Rodney Williams, Fire Chief of Matador VFD presented several proposals to the court for consideration. Some were long range but immediate action was taken to pay half the cost for a dump tank for the fire departments use. Williams had samples of the material which the tank is made of and informed the commissioners that he had spoken to another department that used this. The total cost is \$1200. The county will pay \$600 and the fire department the other half.

**Monthly Bills**

All bills were read and discussed by the Commissioners present and approval for payment was made. Some of these were \$8,853.00 to Plains Machinery for repairs on two road graders, \$3,050.00 for the new radar system in the DPS vehicle and \$1,525.00 to Dickens County for 61 days for 7 prisoners room and board.

**Other Business**

Hormonal Herbicide spraying, Indigent Health care and other topics of the county's interest were discussed in detail. Reports were presented including the Justice of the Peace report which showed \$3,833.00 that will stay in Motley County. With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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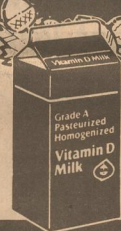
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## GFWC El Progresso Club Meets In Historical Traweek Home

### Test Forage For Feeding Value

Just how "good" is the hay you harvested this year?

It's really hard to tell without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While a forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save money in supplemental feed or livestock condition.

Only when hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly

starving without a supplement.

A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tested for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers are available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Department, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

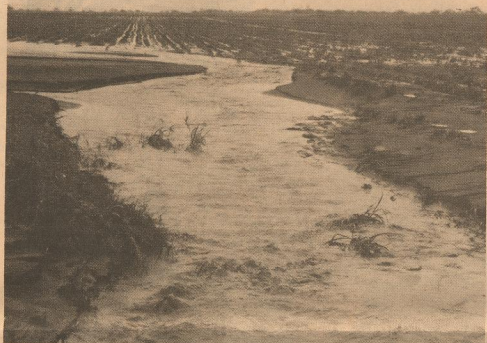

### Great Plains Conservation Program

DURING FISCAL YEAR 1985 FOUR NEW GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION CONTRACTS WERE SIGNED IN THE UPPER PEASE SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT. THE NEW CONTRACTS WERE SIGNED BY BOBBY CLAY, RONALD CLAY, JOE IKE CLAY AND GARY LANCASTER. THE GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION PROGRAM IS ADMINISTERED BY THE SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE AND ASSIST LANDOWNERS THROUGH COST SHARE AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IN APPLYING SOUND SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION PRACTICES. THERE ARE CURRENTLY 12 CONTRACTS IN THE DISTRICT TREATING 9,066 ACRES. OTHER PRODUCERS PARTICIPATING IN THE GREAT PLAINS PROGRAM ARE GEORGE HUGHES, EDDIE MORRIS, TRUITT READ, GALE STAFFORD, ROBERT MELCHER, TRAVIS JAMESON, GUY KIMBELL AND JAMES GWINN.



Heavy rains last spring caused severe water erosion damage in many parts of the county. Thousands of tons of soil were washed away, and growing crops were damaged throughout the county. The need for water erosion practices was very evident, as unprotected fields received the most damage. Water erosion can be controlled by numerous conservation practices such as terrace system, diversions, pipe-drops, contour farming, water-ways, ponds, or planting steep erodible land back to grass. If your land has a water erosion problem, here is a practice that can help before a wash turns into a gully.



Aerial spraying of mesquite followed by defoliation can speed up recovery of rangeland. This pasture was rested for three months after spraying, notice the increase of sidecoats-grama under the mesquite canopy. Defoliation after spraying lets the grasses utilize the released sunlight and moisture that was once used by the brush. This will lead to a healthier stand of grass with deeper and stronger root systems. With defoliation in the end, you will achieve a better return on your investment in brush management.



Conservation tillage is growing in acceptance as an alternative to conventional methods of farming. All over the nation farmers are turning to conservation tillage to decrease input costs, and cut down on soil loss from erosion. Farmers in Motley County are no exception as 15,000 acres of cropland in the county has some type of conservation tillage system. Several farmers in the county have devoted their time to attend conservation tillage meetings around the area, and promote the use of these farming methods. If you have an interest in conservation tillage contact the Soil Conservation Service. There are already several meetings scheduled for next year which you can attend, and learn about conservation tillage.



Wind strip-cropping, terraces, contour farming and ro-dikes are a few of the conservation practices that can be seen driving around Motley County. Many farmers are planting a cover on their terraces to help with wind erosion and lengthen the life of the terraces. Terraces and ro-dikes hold water to reduce run-off and save available moisture for the growing crop. 158,315 feet of terraces were installed last year for water erosion, and 14,000 acres of cropland was protected from wind erosion by wind strip-cropping. These are just a few of the ways to keep your soil where it belongs.

## Signs Along Roads To Be Registered

**CHILDRESS**--Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer of the Childress District of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, announced recently that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected before September 1, 1985 along a road outside an incorporated city or town in Texas is required by recent legislation to register the sign by December 30, 1985 or remove the sign. The new law is know as House Bill 1330 and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located. Mr. White stated that forms are available in the Childress District Office for use in registering a sign and that a form would be sent upon request. He also said that a \$25 nonrefundable fee is required with the filing of the registration application.

Mr. White pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or is the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a city or town which is controlling signs in such extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the State.

In enacting House Bill 1330, the legislature also authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to regulate on-premise and off-premise signs which are erected after September 1, 1985. A permit for each sign is now required. Permit application forms are also available in the Childress District Office, Mr. White said.

## Social Security

People who receive monthly supplemental security income (SSI) checks must tell Social Security about any changes in their situation that could affect the amount of their payments.

Failure to report such a change could result in too much money being paid (money that would have to be repaid) or in missing out on money to which the person may be entitled.

Any changes must be reported within 10 days after the end of the month in which the change occurs. Social Security will take steps to recover any money paid out as a result of a person's failure to report a change.

The same holds true if a person receives money to which he or she is not entitled because of having made a false statement. In addition, a person who, without good reason, reports a change late may have to pay a penalty of up to \$100.

If a single person has money and other assets that add up to more than \$1,600, or if a couple has money or other resources

that add up to more than \$2,400 Social Security must be notified. Resources include such items as real estate, personal property, life insurance policies and cars. Some items that don't count include the home an individual or couple lives in, a car, depending on its value, money kept separately for burial, and life insurance totaling up to \$1,500 per person.

A person who goes to work or starts a business must also notify Social Security. Earnings include not only cash but can include checks, food, or anything else received as payment while working for someone or in self-employment.

Social Security should also be informed if an SSI recipient is given money, food, clothing, or free housing of any individual or organization, or if the recipient enters a hospital, nursing home, prison, or any other kind of institution.


