Spur scored first in the opening quarter on a two yard run. The Matadors defense held the Bulldogs on the two-point conversion attempt with 30 seconds left in the quarter.

Spur scored again in the second quarter on a 35 yard pass from Matlock to Courtney. The point-after attempt was again stalled as the Matadors defense held strong, ending the first half of play.

Third quarter play was offensively dominated by Spur. An eight yard run, along with a kicked PAT put the Bulldogs ahead 19-0. Before the quarter was over, Spur scored again with a 58 yard pass plus a kicked PAT.

After an invocation from Commissioner Washington, the meeting was called to order. Minutes from last month's meeting as well as a special called meeting on Oct. 7 were read and approved.

There was a detailed discussion about the matter and about a water line to the facility with some dissension expressed.

Margie Cook of Northfield told those present that the community was split on things to which Mr. Hoover replied "You've heep against everything."

together again which Mrs. Cook and Hoover agreed that it was terrible to be "fussing". At this point Mr. Clem Timmons, president of the Northfield Homecoming Association proposed that the group have a community group have a community meeting and vote whether or not the Northfield community wanted the original request concerning the school. Minutes will be made of this meeting to reflect the vote for request of the deed to be turned over to the

further business, the meeting was adjourned.







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

Test Forage For Feeding Value
Just how "good" is the hay you
harvested this year?

Heavy rains last spring caused severe water erosion damage in many parts of the county. Thousands of tons of soil were washed away, and growing crops were damaged throughout the county. The need for water erosion practices was very evident, as unprotected fields received the most damage. Water erosion can be controlled by numerous conservation practices such as terrace system, diversions, pipe-drops, contour farming, water-ways, ponds, or planting steep erodible land back to grass. If your land has a water erosion problem, here is a practice that can help before a wash turns into a suits.

The picture to the left was taken in 1969, one year after this The picture to the left was taken in 1905, one year after this pasture was root-plowed, chopped and seeded. The right picture shows the pasture as it looks today. For 16 years since work was completed on this pasture it has been producing high quality forage for grazing. There are many conservation practices in the county that were done years ago that are still helping to conserve soil, water and our natural resources today. Although only about 200 acres of land was seeded back to native grass this year, range seeding is a good practice for marginal cropland and poor quality rangeland. The Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District supports practices that will not only improve land today but also for future generations.

Conservation tillage is growning in acceptance as an alternative to conventional methods of farming. All over the nation farmers are turning to conservation tillage to decrease input costs, and cut down on soil loss from erosion. Farmers in Motley County are no exception as 15,000 acres of cropland in the county has some type of conservation tillage system. Several farmers in the county have devoted their time to attend conservation tillage meetings around the area, and promote the use of these farming methods. If you have an interest in conservation tillage contact the Soil Conservation Service. There are already several meetings scheduled for next year which you can attend, and learn about conservation tillage.



Wind strip-cropping, terraces, contour farming and ro-dikes are a few of the conservation practices that can be seen driving around Motley County. Many farmers are planting a cover on their terraces to help with wind erosion and lengthen the life of the terraces. Terraces and ro-dikes hold water to reduce run-off and save available moisture for the growing crop. 158,315 feet of terraces were installed last year for water erosion, and 14,000 acres of cropland was protected from wind erosion by wind strip-cropping. These are just a few of the ways to keep your soil where it belongs.

Signs Along Roads To Be Registered

CHILDRESS--Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer of the Childress District of the State Department of Highways and Public of Highways and Public Transportation, announced recently that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected before off-premise advertising sign which was erected before September 1, 1985 along a road outside an incorporated city or town in Texas is required by recent legislation to register the sign by December 30, 1985 or remove the sign. The new law is know as House Bill 1330 and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located. Mr. White stated that forms are available in the Childress District Office for use in registering a sign and that a form would be sent upon request. He also said that a \$25 nonrefundable fee is required with the filing of the registration

Mr. White pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or is the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a city or town which is controlling signs in such extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the State.

In enacting House Bill 1330, the Legislature also authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to regulate on-premise and off-premise signs which are

off-premise signs which are erected after September 1, 1985. A permit for each sign is now required. Permit application forms are also available in the Childress District Office. Mr. White rold.

Social Security

People who receive monthly supplemental security income (SSI) checks must tell Social Security about any changes in their situation that could affect the amount of their payments. Failure to report such a change could result in the much

Failure to report such a change could result in too much money being paid (money that would have to be repaid) or in missing out on money to which the person may be entitled.

the person may be entitled.

Any changes must be reported within 10 days after the end of the month in which the change occurs. Social Security will take steps to recover any money paid out as a result of a person's failure to report a change.

The same holds true if a person receives money to which he or she is not entitled because of having made a false

of having made a false statement. In addition, a person who, without good reason, reports a change late may have

to pay a penalty of up to \$100.

If a single person has money and other assets that add up to more than \$1,600, or if a couple has money or other than \$1,600.

that add up to more than \$2,400 Social Security must be notified. Resources include such items as Social Security must be notified. Resources include such items as real estate, personal property, life insurance policies and cars. Some items that don't count include the home an individual or couple lives in, a car, depending on its value, money kept separately for burial, and life insurance totaling up to \$1,500 per person.

A person who goes to work or starts a business must also notify Social Security. Earnings include not only cash but can include checks, food, or anything else received as payment while working for someone or in self-employment.

Social Security should also be informed if an SSI recipient is given money, food, clothing, or free housing of any individual or organization, or if the recipient enters a hospital, nursing home, prison, or any other kind of institution
