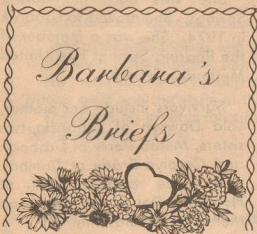

## Motley County Faculty Attends Workshop

Motley County ISD faculty members attended an Association of Texas Professional Educators workshop Saturday in Lubbock.

Focus of the workshop was an extensive review for the Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers test which faculty members will take on March 10.

Teachers attending were told by Mike Morrow, Executive Director of ATPE, that "students don't care how much teachers know until they know how much teachers care."

"Teaching school is much more than a college degree and passing a standardized test," Morrow averred. He added that the state can't measure the personal worth of a teacher on a

standardized test. He also stressed that a teacher's motivation, sensitivity, perseverance, and diligence cannot be measured.

Morrow challenged teachers not to protest taking the examination but to do the best they can just as their students did in October on the exit level TEAMS test.

"Our conduct and our perseverance must be as strong as our remembrance of our favorite teacher," Morrow added.

The Executive Director ended his address by saying that "it is important teachers capture the appreciation of their public because those we serve will call blessings on our names."

## Councilmen To Decide Fate Of Old Theatre Building

Matador City Council met Thursday, February 13 for their regular monthly meeting. Present at this meeting were Mayor Gary Lancaster, Councilmen, Lewis Bostick, L.B. Campbell and Doyle Rose; secretary Nell Berryman, and Bill Jameson.

First on the agenda were Sesquicentennial Folk Life Festival Committee Chairmen, Mrs. L.B. Campbell and Mrs. Roy Hobbs, who discussed needs for the festival, such as water, trash receptacles, use of dumpsters and the garbage truck.

The Festival Chairmen requested permission for the parade to come through city streets. They requested areas to be bladed or mowed for the carnival and the sour dough exhibition.

Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Hobbs reiterated that the old Rogue Theater was both an eyesore and a safety hazard. City Councilmen discussed the possibility of tearing the structure down or false front it with boards and banners.

Mrs. Hobbs gave a synopsis of events which will begin on Sunday, May 25 with dedication of Memorial Gazebo and Church Services.

Schedule

Sunday, May 25; Fiddlers Contest, Introduction of Queen Contestants and Children Costume Contestants, Art Show, Game and Food Booths, Memorial Service.

Monday, May 26; Chili Cookoff, Afternoon Entertainment, Demonstrations, Square Dance, Game Booths, Food Booths.

Monday Evening Program; Wagon Train Arrival, Parade, Contest Winners Announced, Drawings for Quilt and Bluebonnets, Queen Crowning, Fiddle Contest Winners to perform, Miss Texas (plans are not definite yet), Street Dance.

Mrs. Campbell stated that the Folk Life Festival Committee is in the process of raising funds to finance the Festival without going to the cities or merchants requesting donations.

Mrs. Hobbs and Mrs. Campbell thanked the City Council for their time and support.

Second order of business was an update by Kay Howard on grant for the water system. Cost of the project was \$156,620.75. The grant money available was \$156,100, leaving the City to pay \$520.75. City water

manager Bill Jameson and Mayor Lancaster spent extra time making sure the cost was kept in line with the original estimate. A resolution was passed by Councilmen to make the final payment. Kay informed Councilmen that an overrun in the water grant expense will cover this cost.

Reading of minutes were read and approved.

Next on the agenda was the City of Roaring Springs, \$150.00 bill to help pay maintenance expenses at the Matador City dump. Roaring Springs City Council voted to pay \$25.00 of this bill.

Discussion of the new Highway Beautification bill recently passed by legislature directing trash hauling which prohibits trash being scattered on the highway and prohibition of dumping non-combustible matter. The state's basic objective is a dump that looks as clean as possible.

City Council also discussed the necessity of billing homeowners who are delinquent on their water bill a charge of \$35.00 to replace meter plus the amount owed.

It was voted and approved to rent the City well house.

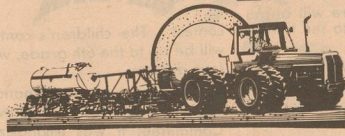

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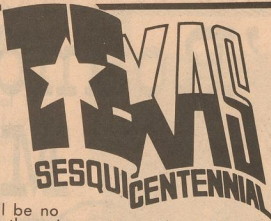

## Conservation Reserve Program Outlined

A number of farmers in Motley County may be eligible to participate in the Conservation Reserve Program of the recently passed farm bill. Meetings will be held Feb. 25 in Lubbock and Feb. 26 in Abilene to help explain the program to area farmers.

The program is to take erodible cropland out of production and plant it to permanent cover, such as trees and grasses.

The Extension Service working with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS), is conducting five regional meetings across the state in late February to help farmers better understand opportunities in this program.

The meeting Feb. 25 in Lubbock will be from 9 a.m. until noon at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the Lubbock Airport. The Abilene meeting Feb. 26 will be from 9 a.m. until noon in the jury

assembly room in the new courthouse.

Farmers whose land qualifies for the program (as determined by land classifications by the SCS) will be eligible for annual rent payments over the 10-year life of the contract and cost-sharing on cover establishment practices.

Farmers can check with their local ASCS of SCS office to determine if any of their crop acreage is eligible for the program. A 10-day sign-up period will be held March 3-14 at county ASCS offices.

Once a farmer determines that his cropland is eligible for the program, he must submit a bid for the annual rent payment on the designated acres. Bids will be reviewed by county and state ASCS personnel, and farmers will then be notified as to whether or not they have been accepted. Annual payments will be limited to \$50,000 per producer.

More details about this new program also are available at the local SCS or ASCS office.

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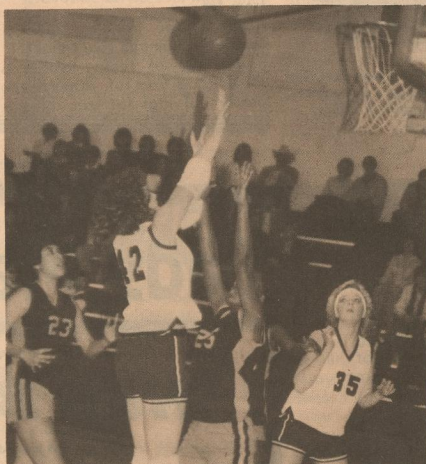
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## Former Matador Wagon Bosses

The Matador Ranch was the stuff of which legends are made. A sprawling ranch of million acres, it took in four Texas counties. Fences ran 100 miles in a straight line, and each spring at least 20,000 calves were born.

In 1951 the Matador was sold by the Scottish land corporation that had owned it since 1882, and the last roundup was staged. Many tall tales and legends concerning the ranch are part of Texas area history. Many of those stories surround the cowboys who earned the coveted title of Wagon Boss on the ranch. Only the roughest and toughest made the grade.

Today, only two of the Matador's former wagon bosses are still with us, Melvin "Wild Horse" Warren and Bill Hemphill. Both are still living in Texas and both still cowboying for a living.

"Horse" Warren, 74, is the senior of the two and a legend in the Texas plains south of Waco where he runs the Bar W Cattle Ranch.

Horse was 18 when he went to work for the Matadors. His 22 years with the ranch were interrupted only by military service in World War II and later in Korea. He returned from duty overseas in time to assist in the final cattle drive, then went to work for the highway department.

It didn't work out, however, because cowboying was still in

his blood. So, Horse and his family moved to central Texas where he took over as foreman of another ranch. He is still in the saddle daily, but he says ranching has changed a lot in his 55 years of involvement.

On the Matador he would leave camp with a group of cowhands and a chuck wagon and none of them would see civilization for six weeks or longer. Today, he drives to pastures in a pickup truck, unloads his horse from a trailer, does the work needed, loads up and returns home, all in one day.

Horse attended the Matador reunion in Roaring Springs 47 of the 54 times it has been held. He was kept from going only by service in Europe and Korea and by illness in his family.

"Year before last, five of us sat in the grandstands during the rodeo; five of us old-timers from the ranch. This year, only two of us are left. It's kinda sad," he said, his eyes searching the lonely plains where he works daily in the blazing sun.

Bill Hemphill was named Wagon Boss when Horse went to Korea and held that title until the ranch was dispersed. His wife, Florine Thornton, was born at Ballard Camp on the ranch. Today, Bill is wagon boss for the 358,000 acre 6666 Ranch of west Texas.

"Cowboying's as different now as daylight and dark," he told me. "We used to do it all on

horseback. Today we have corrals, chutes and pens. A lot of our work is done on foot. Although we still rope, drag and cut cows on horseback, it's changed."

Bill, at age 59, wants to be cowboy as long as he can. And like Horse, he does not believe a man on horseback can ever be totally replaced in cattle country. They ended their interviews with the same affirmation. "There will always be a place for a good man on a horse."

### How Much Fat?

Diet, fitness and fat just don't seem to go together. Yet nutritionists and medical authorities agree that some fat is a necessary part of a balanced diet.

The question is, how much fat is too much? Many health organizations recommend that we should get about 30 percent of our calories from fat.

So if you require 2,000 calories to maintain your weight, about 600 of those calories should come from fat. About ten percent of that fat can come

from saturated fat sources. Saturated fats come from meat fat, chicken and turkey skin, whole milk, hard cheese, cream and butter, plus certain vegetable oils including palm oil, coconut oil and hydrogenated shortening.

Here are some suggestions for ways to keep your fat consumption below the 30 percent mark:

\* Bake, broil, boil, steam or stir fry with little or no added fat.

\* Trim any visible fat from beef, veal, pork and lamb. Remove the skin from turkey and chicken.

\* Refrigerate gravies, stews and soups -- then skim off the hardened fat.

\* Select low-fat dairy products, such as skim or low-fat milk, low-fat cheeses, low-fat cottage cheese and low-fat yogurt.

\* Read the labels on processed foods to determine their fat content.

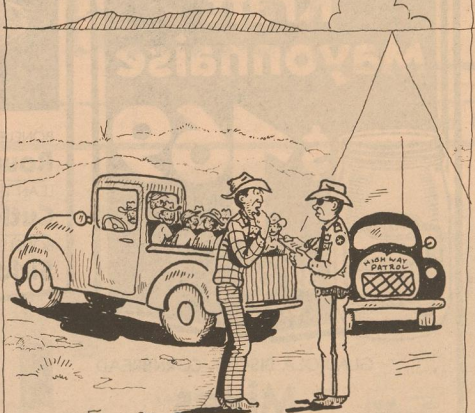

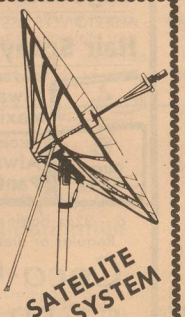
