Control of Mesquite Could Aid Economy

IF ALL THE MESQUITES in Motley County could be eradicated it would mean substantial increase in the economy. At least 5000 more cattle could be produced and the weight per animal could be increased.

The point has been vividly demonstrated on two test areas of the Matador Ranch, in the Russellville area. The two approximate sections of land were compared, one being treated by aerial spray and the other left untreated. Each section was stocked with 25 cows, over a three-year period. The treated area produced 1,020 extra pounds from the calf crop one year and 1,780 extra pounds in 1971. Five extra cows have now been placed on the treated section to consume the grass.

The demonstration was a part of the "Soil Conservation Week" excursion conducted Monday under the auspices of the Soil Conservation Service. Those making the tour were Rev. Henry Rhynes of Roaring Springs, Rev. Curtis Don Kidd of Flomot, Rev. Douglas Gossett, Rev. Gene Joplin, Ronnie Vandiver of the State Parks & Wildlife Dept., County Agent Bill Pallmeyer, Bennie Billington of the local Soil Conservation office and Douglas Meador.

First stop on the tour was the Bill Seale farm south of Roaring Springs to see 9½ surface acres recreation pond, which impounds water also being used for irrigation. Other stops showed the effects of modern terracing, and on the Adams Ranch the group saw dramatic effects of mesquite root plowing (and re-seeding) as a means of removing the brush.

At one stop Mr. Vandiver demonstrated the means of banning quail and dove. He also told of a check of the two game birds as well as turkey. He said the aver-

age life span of a quail is only 18 months.

Final stop on the tour was East Mound Cemetery where the Soil Conservation Service is aiding the cemetery association in fertilizing and seeding the new addition.

Mr. Bennington said the service is now able to help cities, individual home owners and others in a new "help people" policy.

Two Matador high school girls, Paula Pallmeyer and Jackie Martin, both members of the Motley County 4-H club, provided a very interesting demonstration on mesquite eradication. The demonstration followed a luncheon at El Matador restaurant at which they and members on the tour were guests of the Soil Conservation Service.

The girls presented factual charts regarding the results of the mesquite tests. They said approximately half of the county's income is from the production of cattle.

County Agent Bill Pallmeyer said Motley County has approximately 500,000 acres of grazing land, most of which is infested with mesquite.

Rainfall General

Motley County has received general rainfall registering all the way from overflowing rain gauges, to one inch, according to the Tribune's partial survey.

Pharmacist Bob Stanley has recorded 2.45 inches in Matador since April 28 (first rain which was accompanied by a hail storm). Many reports of over three inches have been received.

Farmers are awaiting fields to dry up sufficiently to start the planting of crops.

The largest rainfall in the county was probably in the vicinity of Turtle Hole Creek on the Northfield road. One resident reported seeing several rain gauges that were filled to overflowing. Water in the usually dry Turtle Hole Creek was more than bank full and flowed over the concrete FM highway bridge. Reports said the bridge withstood the flood water and would not require rebuilding.

Bob Stanley, who keeps accurate records on the weather said this week that two years have passed since he recorded as much as two inches of rainfall in a 24-hour period.

Previously, this activity was performed by teachers and entailed extra time from classroom duties, Edwards said.

Large Vote is Recorded Saturday As Texans Reject Governor Smith

Leary Defeated By Phil Cates

A TOTAL OF 975 voters in Motley County went to the polls Saturday in the first Democratic primary and nominated former sheriff Jinks Wilson over incumbent J. D. Spray, and Odell Meyer over incumbent Reece Timmons for commissioner of Precinct 3.

The county followed the state largely in rejecting Governor Preston Smith for Dolph Briscoe (he will be in a run-off with Mrs. Frances Farenthold for the highest state office).

Native son Eddie J. Leary of Childress won the county (534 to 322) for State Representative 66 Dist. but lost the race against Phil Cates of Pampa 9,619 to 7,247.

Nomination (considered tantamount to election in most Democratic voting states) will be decided definitely in the June 3 second primary. The Republican party did not hold a primary Saturday in Motley County.

Funeral services for Miss Amy Glenn, 87, were held at 10 a.m. Friday in the First Baptist Church. Rev. James Hancock, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Odessa, a former pastor here, and Rev. Gene Joplin, pastor, officiated.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery. Segler Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Miss Glenn passed away about noon, Wednesday, May 3, in Central Plains Hospital, Plainview.

The daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. C. L. Glenn, "Miss Amy," as she was affectionately known, was born in Pendergrass, Georgia, April 6, 1885. She came to Texas with her family about 1893. They lived in Weatherford for a time, then moved to Whitt, where Mr. Glenn engaged in the general mercantile business for a few years.

The family moved to Matador in 1900. Miss Glenn attended public school here and taught two years in the rural school at Ballard, and two years in the Matador schools before the family moved to Plainview in 1911. She taught four years in Wayland Baptist College. From 1918 to 1920 she did Civil Service work in Washington, D.C.

On returning to Texas, Miss Glenn graduated from Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, majoring in religious education. She later attended Tarleton State College at Stephenville and Baylor University at Waco, where she graduated in 1935.

Upon her return to Matador, Miss Glenn taught in the local schools until 1947, when she retired and made her home with her late brother and sister, Mitchell and Sue Glenn.

Miss Glenn was a charter member of both El Progreso Study Club and the Matador Garden Club. She was an active member of the First Baptist Church and had held numerous offices in both the church and Sunday School. She was held in high esteem by all who knew her.

She is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Hattie Bouldin of Houston, Mrs. Pryse Metcalfe (Carolyn) of Dallas and Mrs. J. L. Woodruff (Lucy) of Matador, and several nieces and nephews.

Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery. Members of Mr. Moore's Sunday School Class, the Sigler Class, were named as honorary pallbearers.

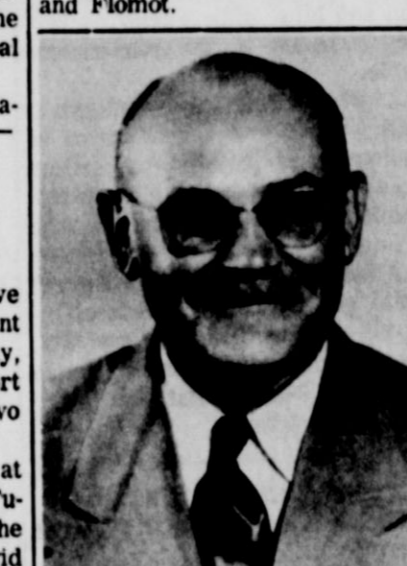

COME TO CHURCH SUNDAY

Maintaining Texas Trees is Subject of Program for Club

Quotation from Joyce Kilmer's poem "Trees," "I think that I shall never see a poem lovely as a tree," opened the program on "Maintaining Texas Trees," April 27 for El Progreso Study Club.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. W. F. Jacobs.

Mrs. Harry Willett presented a most interesting program on some of Texas' famous trees. She had visited the site of a number of these trees and gave a vivid description of each.

Included was the stately historic Treaty Oak, located in a small City Park in Austin, near the east bank of the Colorado River. "For centuries, its spreading branches observed Indian War Councils and dances, and religious ceremonies," she said. "The tree is believed to be 500 years old. Under this tree Stephen F. Austin, the 'father of Texas,' is reputed to have signed the first boundary-line agreement between the Indians and whites."

Motley County's famous tree, the Teepee City Cottonwood, was also described. "This tree," Mrs. Willett said, "still maintains its vigil over the site of the first community in Motley County, settled about a century ago."

"In the mid 1870's a 100-wagon train of settlers from Dodge City Kansas, crossed the small creek which flows near the cottonwood, and camped there on their way

south. When the wagon train moved on, about a dozen families stayed to become Motley's first settlers. Under the historic cottonwood, stood the hotel-saloon-gambling hall, the first plank building in town."

Recent visitors to the site of this tree believe that immediate action needs to be taken to preserve the famous tree. It is rapidly disappearing from wind erosion, dry weather and other elements, it was pointed out. "It would be a wonderful project for the clubs of Motley County to see that it is saved."

Mrs. Willett read to the club from the Book of Genesis, regarding God's creation of the world.

Mrs. Furman Vinson, president, opened the meeting with a business session and called attention to the state convention of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, May 5-8, at the Baker Hotel in Dallas.

A MUSICAL GENIUS, Bob Wills, returned Saturday to his native Turkey foothill country. It was more auspicious than his departure nearly four decades ago. It was "Bob Wills Day" in Turkey and thousands came to pay tribute.

Wills, who is confined to a wheel chair, was smiling, but

mostly speechless during his big day. Several members of his old Texas Playboy Band returned for a concert on the football field, following the barbecue luncheon.

The band probably played as it had never played before. Wills was able to hold a violin and finger the strings while another musician handled the bow for one

number.

The opera has claimed that music is the language of the emotions. It was evident Saturday as tears glistened in many eyes of the enthusiastic crowd.

Many of the people present had known Bob Wills when he was a young man. Some could remember when he once operated a barbershop in Turkey. But destiny had marked Bob Wills for greatness. The boy who had started playing a fiddle for country dances rose to national fame for his western and country music. It is ironical that the Texan should rise to greatness in Oklahoma, his adopted state. Thus the old hills, the mesquite prairie and the brown fields again absorbed the music that was to echo across the nation.

Buford Hobbs of Matador, not only knew Bob Wills, but he played a guitar in one of his first group of musicians. He was greeted warmly by the honored guest.

Among the oldtime bandmen present were Leon McCulloch of Rogers, Ark., of "take it away" fame; Al Strickland of Cleburne; Jesse Ashlock of Ft. Worth; John Lee Wills of Tulsa, and Curly Lewis and Sleepy Johnson of Fort Worth.

Harold "Tex" Brown of Yale, Okla., president of both the Bob Wills Memorial Fund and the Cimarron Valley Historical Society, presented Wills with a plaque designating the Ox Bow Crossing, near the old John Wills home 14 miles east of Turkey, where it will be set up.

An impressive parade on Turkey's main street Saturday morning started the "Bob Wills Day" and included riding clubs from Silvertown, Tulsa and Floydada, as well as colorful floats.
