## Saturday Jamboree Pleases Good Crowd

Approximately two-hundred spectators and some thirty or more performers were on hand Saturday night for the second production of the Lions Club's "Country and Western Jamboree". The program was held in the new combination gym-auditorium at the newly completed Motley County School in Matador. Performers from Matador and Motley County, as well as musicians from several neighboring communities, provided a two and one-half hour variety show of country and western music, followed by an impromptu jam session lasting another two hours. The show was originally scheduled to have been held in the auditorium at the old Matador High School building, but completion of installation of the public address system and other last minute details allowed the program to be held in the new building. Acoustics in the new auditorium were described as excellent, and a vast improvement over those in the old auditorium.

## WATERLOGS LARGE AREA

Motley County's second cool front has lingered for ten days now and left the county with 6.42 inches of rain according to Bob Stanley, local pharmacist. That reading as of 6:00 p.m. Tuesday. Monday's rainfall was 1.32 inches and Tuesday's, through 6:00 p.m., was 1.65 inches. The 1973 total for September, through Tuesday the 24th, was 4.90 inches as compared to the 6.42 inches this year. Total rainfall this year has been 24.47 inches compared to 24.30 inches for the same period last year. Roaring Springs had 6.25 inches of rain for the same ten-day period.

A shade short of two years ago, when I tossed a cover atop my typewriter for what I thought was for good, it didn't occur to me that I'd ever do any more columnizing.

After all, 47 years of a daily column - longest stretch in the nation at that time - ought to be plenty for anybody, including readers. But the other night, with an old friend hospitalized, I was glad to slip the harness on again, just to help out.

Ben and Lila Meador are old and valued friends. We've labored together in the journalistic vineyards of West Texas for many years and now that they have their hands full with other things, why not chip in with something to slightly lighten their burden?

Anyway, Matador, for well over four decades, has been a second home town for me. And Ben Meador has been my home-town editor.

After all, when a guy's his own editor in his first home town, he has a right to another in a second home town. Correct?

So I've been a regular (paid) reader of the Tribune for so long as Ben and Lila have had it - even back when it was the Motley County News. And being in the trade, myself, I've often marveled at the way the Matador team has performed, year after year after year.

Getting out a "country weekly," which is what Ben Meador always has called his paper, never is easy.

When there are help shortages, droughts, breakdowns and other woes encountered, it's even harder.

But Ben and Lila not only have succeeded in "getting 'er out" week after week over all these years; they've built a shining reputation - in and out of the newspaper business - which, so far as I know, is unparalleled in this area.

So, naturally, those of us who are helping out while they are tied up with more pressing matters want the Tribune's presses to keep rolling.

As home folks over in what often has been called "the best darn' cow country in the world" well know, I've never been a resident of Matador.

But for a good many years, until the man with the scythe got in his licks, I spent a good many days over there.

My wife, the youngest of the four "Rufe Moore Girls," was born and got her primary and secondary education there, as did her sisters.

Her father, the late J. R. Moore, went to Motley County in the 80's as a 17 year old kid and stayed there until his death, in his early 90's.

Her mother, born Velma Burleson and a daughter of Motley County's first judge, arrived in Matador as a 12-year old astride a pony, part of a wagon train from near Dublin. She, too, remained there until her

death some seven or more decades later.

So, in the years following our marriage in 1930, I spent all the time I could in Matador and why not?

It's a great country. It has fine people, the food was good - and free. Further, I loved to fool around cattle and horses (probably because I didn't have to eat!).

Some of the happier hours of my life have been spent in Matador.

Mr. Moore, whom I grew to love and respect next to my own father, used to shepherd me around, introducing me to his neighbors and friends, some of whom became my friends.

I had a lot of fun going down to the City Drug to sop up a Coke and, for a short period of time when Matador had legal beer, going into Henry King's place for a cold schooner of brew. Lubbock was "dry" then - legally speaking, not actually - so guzzling a glass of legal beer in West Texas was really a swinging thing to do.

But the most fun of all was to go down to "Uncle Henry Pipkin's" barber shop, which was more like a club than a tonsorial parlor, and yakking it up with whoever happened to be squatting on their bootheels on the sidewalk out in front. Usually there were two or more passing the time of day and the stories I picked up, some of them probably "big windys," made grist for my newspaper mill.

I don't suppose the home folks over there ever thought about it, but there were some mighty interesting men in Matador and what they had to say often connected the chuckwagon to the jet airplane.

It was out in front of "Uncle Henry's," for example that I picked up some eye-witness stories about the days when the "brakes" were dotted with the bones of buffalo and the wagoners were picking them up to haul them downstate for pulverizing into fertilizer.

There were plenty of deer and antelope in Motley County before - and maybe even after - the turn of the century; plenty of cats and even some lobos, and the oldtimers would tell about them.

It was out in front of "Uncle Henry's," too, that I got eyewitness testimony about how madstones worked on the bites of rattlers and rabid polecats.

I printed those stories, right out of the mouths of men who were on hand when madstones successfully were used, and was verbally pummeled by some unbelieving Lubbock doctors as a result.

But as the controversy went on, testimony of other oldtimers, in other sections of West Texas, poured in, then, finally, one of the most experienced and respected physicians in all these parts came into the office. "Don't let them scare you off the madstone," said softspoken Dr. Charles J. Wagner, a pioneer in his field. "They work, I've seen them!"

Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.

Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.

Select correct, measured heat. The accurate heat selector switch or oven thermostat enables you to select, exactly, the same correct temperature each time you use it.

For good heat distribution around the pans, when baking, they should not touch the sides of the oven or each other. Allow one inch clearance. Check for doneness at minimum baking time on recipe, don't keep opening oven door to peek.
