By the time this is printed the editor-publisher and author of this column will be in intensive care at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, following surgery Tuesday morning. This is the first time he has ever been in a hospital as a patient.

"I guess I am an oddity. I am 73 and have never been hospitalized before . . . I think they brought people by, just to look at me I am amazed at what has happened. I know I was awake when they took a biopsy, Thursday because I could see the doctors and aides, with their funny shower-cap looking head gear, and the large overhead light.

"I didn't feel anything, until later, when my neck hurt. When they put me back in my room, they put a dress on me, which tied in the back, and was hard to keep in place they said I was in the

recovery room over an hour. which I don't remember.

"The nurses are pretty and the food is excellent. Of course they wake me up to give me a sleeping pill, and I have breathed so much oxygen, just to prove my lungs are in good condition, that I feel like I'll float off.

"All the cards, letters, beautiful flowers and visits of friends and relatives; telephone calls and your prayers have helped tremendously in dispelling my moments of depression. Bless each of you, and all the other good friends who are helping with the Tribune while Lila is here with me.



Richard M. Nixon "a free, full and absolute pardon' Sunday for any criminal conduct during his presidency, and Nixon responded with a statement of remorse at "my mistakes over Watergate.

In a surprise appearance before newsmen and photographers in his Oval Office Ford announced the pardon, saying, "I feel that Richard Nixon and his loved ones have suffered enough."

The proclamation signed by President Ford on Sunday granting pardon to former President Richard Nixon is:

Richard Nixon became the thirty-seventh President of the United States on Jan. 20. 1969 and was reelected in 1972 for a second term by the electors of forty-nine of the fifty states. His term in office continued until his resignation on Aug. 9, 1974.

Pursuant to resolutions of the House of Representatives, its Committee on the Judiciary conducted an inquity and investigation on the impeachment of the President extending over more than eight months. The hearing of the Committee and its deliberations, which received wide national publicity over television, radio, and in printed media, resulted in votes adverse to Richard Nixon on recommended Articles of Impeach-

ment. As a result of certain acts or omissions occurring before his resignation from the Office of President, Richard Nixon has become liable to possible indictment and trial for offenses against the United States. Whether or not he shall be so prosecuted depends on findings of the appropriate grand jury and on the discretion of the authorized prosecutor. Should an indictment ensue, the accused shall then be entitled to a fair trial by an impartial jury, as guaranteed to every individual by

the Constitution. It is believed that a trial of Richard Nixon, if it became necessary, could not fairly begin until a year or more has elapsed. In the meantime, the tranquility to which this nation has been restored by the events of recent weeks could be irreparably lost by the prospects of bringing to trial a former President of the United States. The prospects of such trial will cause prolonged and divisive debate over the propriety of exposing to further punishment and degradation a man who has already paid the unprecedented penalty of relinquishing the highest elective office in the United

Now, therefore, I, Gerald R. Ford, President of the United States, pursuant to the pardon power conferred



Knowing which fastener to use will protect both the item being held and the wall.

### **County Oil Revenue** Far Exceeds 1973

Current higher prices for crude oil and natural gas produced in Motley County point to a significant jump in 1974 income for county land and royalty owners who last year received \$227,907 as their share of the county's output, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

With the average price of Texas crude oil now at about \$6.70 a barrel, compared with the 1973 average of \$3.84 a barrel, and with some newly discovered natural gas selling intrastate for more than \$1 per thousand cubic feet, the outlook for the economy of producing communities is encouraging if prices hold up." according to Sherman Hunt, Dallas, Association president.

"Should price rollback sheemes and other tax-andcontrol proposals now underway in Congress be successful, current economic gains will evaporate," Hunt said. The Association's study collected \$83,586 in oil production taxes and \$463 from natural gas. Also adding to the dollar
