OPENING DATE FOR SPRAYING MESQUITE SET

The opening date for aerial mesquite spraying is set for June 10th, according to Ervin Willard of the local SCS Office. Cool spring weather delayed the leaf buds of the mesquite tree resulting in a later opening date than normal, Willard said.

It is also recommended that the soil temperature at a depth of 12-14" reach a minimum of 73-75 degrees prior to spraying, according to Willard. Research has found that permanent root kill increases with the increased soil temperature in the spring. 

A new vaccine is available to reduce newborn calf losses from a form of diarrhea caused by a reo-like virus. Known as reo-viral diarrhea vaccine, the new product has been licensed by the USDA and is available to cattle producers through local veterinarians. The vaccine was developed and patented by the University of Nebraska. The new vaccine is not a

cure-all for all types of diarrhea in young calves, but can be helpful where losses from calf scours occur during the first week of life. The vaccine is mixed with a diluent in a syringe, the syringe needle removed, and the vaccine sprayed into the back of the calf's mouth. Treatment should be as soon as possible after birth, and vaccination after the first day of life probably won't stop diarrhea.

As there is no alternative way to prevent this type of diarrhea in young animals, this new release appears to have a place in livestock production prac-
