Rain, Hail Hit County Crops

STORMS Tuesday afternoon in the North and South halves of the county dumped as much as 2.35 inches of rain in some sections along with hail and high winds.

Hardest hit were farmers from Whiteflat to Flomot where rainfall reports ranged from 1.4 to 2.35 inches. Hail and winds severely damaged crops in this area wiping out uncut wheat fields and young cotton. Some damage was reported to a few barns and storage sheds in this part of the county, but heaviest hit aside from crops were terraces and fences.

With water still standing from earlier downpours in low areas, additional rain washed out the fences and terraces. "Erosion is worse now than at any time since I've been farming," reported Furman Vinson who lives in the White Star community. His farm received 1.60 inches of rain.

The heaviest rainfall reported in the County was on the Crable Jones farm between Vinson's and Flomot.

South of Matador in the Roaring Springs area, wind, rain and some hail hit hardest west of town.

Rainfall around Roaring Springs measured up to .90 inches with some damage to crops reported, but little damage to buildings in the area. Hail and high winds along with rising waters alarmed some homeowners.

Civil defense storm warning sirens sent Matador residents to shelters, but the reported 24 inch of rainfall was minimal with little damage inside the city limits.

Tuesday's rain in Matador boosted the total to 6.53 inches for the month and 14.41 inches for the year. Last year's June total was 1.61 inches with 12.44 recorded at this stage on the yearly chart.

West of town hail broke gravel pit rain gauges with heavy rainfall and high winds reported in this area. "Water was about as high as I have ever seen here," Harold Campbell reported with Mrs. Campbell describing a possible tornado which ripped up mesquite trees and three highline poles between their ranch and Vance Campbell's ranch just on top of the Caprock.

Mrs. H. L. (Kathryn) Martin reported that hail and winds ripped off screens and broke windows in their home near Whiteflat.

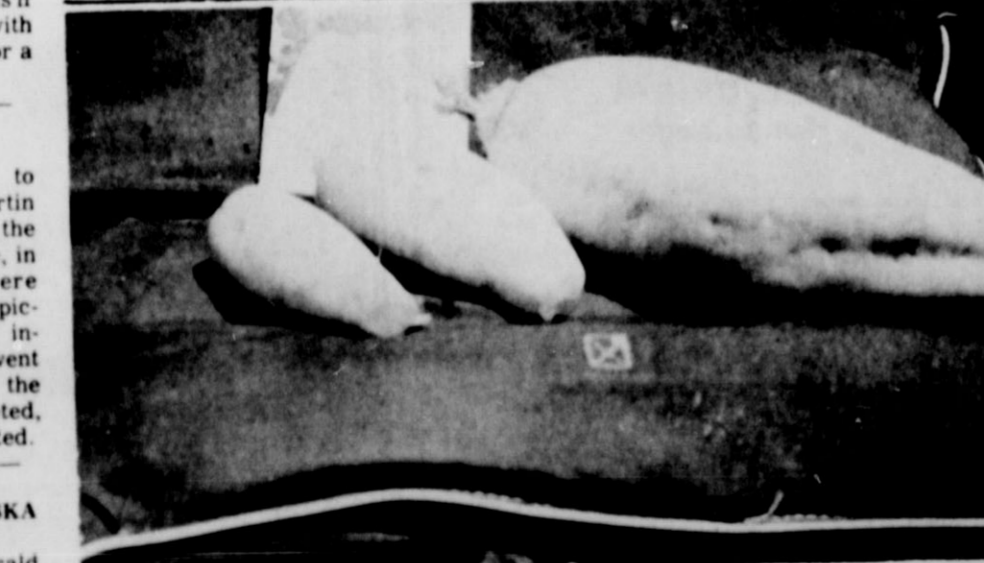
Recent Raft Ride Rife With Thrills

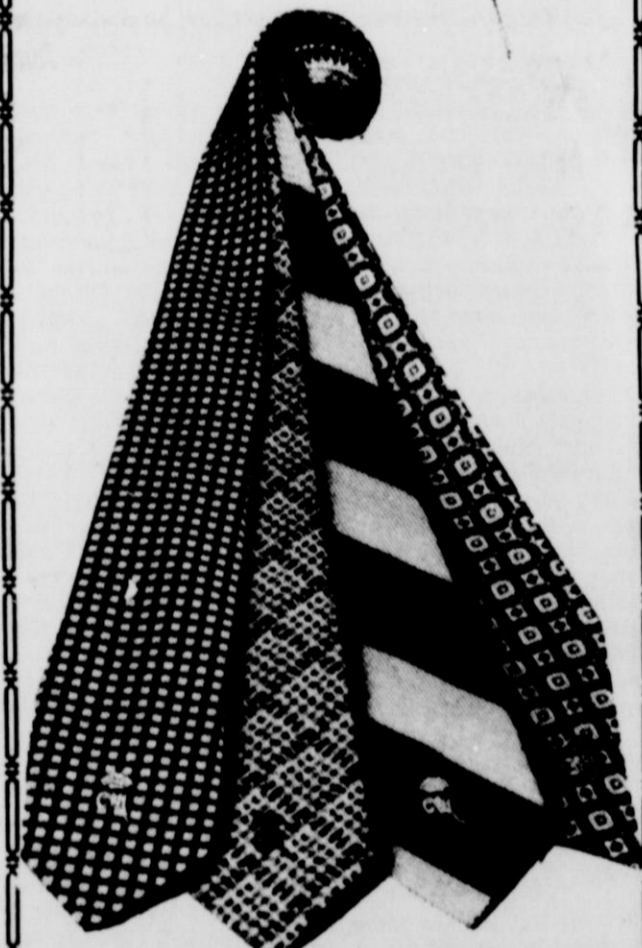
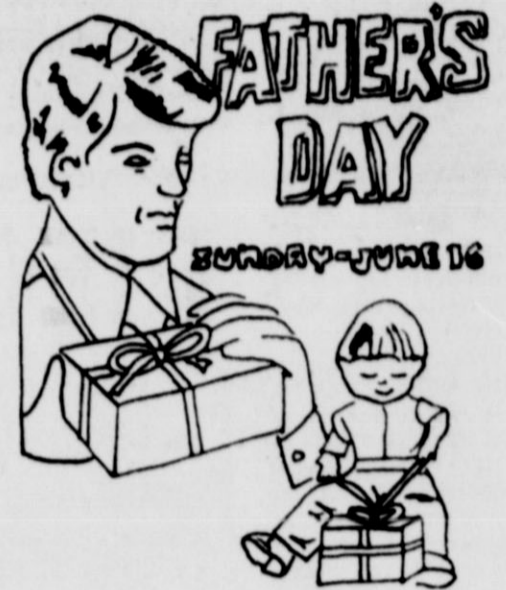
