### Citizens Discuss Dog Poisonings In Town Meeting

The Matador City Council was on hand to introduce the panel assembled in the Motley Courtroom Tuesday, 7:00 p.m. The panel made up of Linda Wyatt, Texas Department of Health, Regional Engineer, Dr. Halliburton, Biochemist and Dr. Montgomery, Pathologist, Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab of Amarillo. Jerry Bynum, Field Investigator, Structural Pest Control Board, and Bill Rogers, Texas Department of Agriculture, Pesticide Specialist.

To begin the meeting Wyatt explained how important it is to teach the children to wash their hands thoroughly; after playing outside and especially before eating, also to teach them to keep their hands out

of their mouth. These simple steps could prevent a child from being accidentally poisoned.

Dr. Halliburton described the symptoms of the strychnine poisoning and he stressed DO NOT INDUCE VOMITING in the dogs or a human. He explained that this causes a stimulant to this type of poison and causes it to work faster. Wyatt also stressed that you should stay calm and keep the patient as calm as possible. Wyatt also recommended that the child or adult with apparent poisoning be taken to the clinic or call the EMS or be rushed to the nearest hospital.

L. J. Barkley Jr. said the pledges were up to \$2,500.

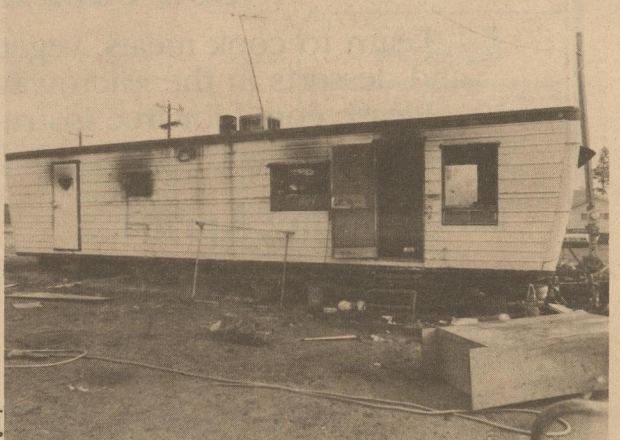

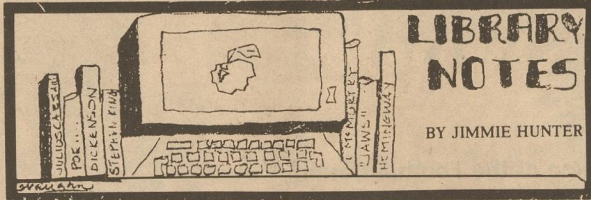
The bus went to Lubbock Monday with several people riding. Mrs. Vera Mitchell of Roaring Springs had a doctor's appointment.

## Motley County Clinic To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a

grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection unit will be made available to local women on Monday, April 10th.

The mobil unit will be parked at Motley County Clinic. Appointments may be made by calling 347-2641.

# READER'S COLUMN

## The Way It Was

One Saturday afternoon, Uncle Walter Ellithorp came by the house, stopping, he invited me to go and help him set his trap line. The back of the Maxwell was filled with steel traps. Getting in beside him, we headed for the creek in the number one Matador pasture, which bordered our farm on the West side.

He would set the traps in the runs, the animals used, coming to water. They were cleverly hidden, by sprinkling dirt and trash, maybe get a broom weed and brush out all signs and sprinkle something around to kill the human odor. Other sets were baited. Sets of three traps were used. Different sets for different game. The line ran a mile or two down the creek.

Having finished we went back by my house. I was given permission to spend the night at Uncle Walter's house. The requirement that I go to church on Sunday. I went in and donned my knee britches suit and other accessories.

Sunday morning came and I got to wondering what Uncle Walter had caught in the traps. Curiosity and the desire to go, overwhelmed my sense of right and wrong.

My brother Leland had also spent the night and he was with us. As we drove by our house, I got down between the seats to keep from being seen. Getting safely out of sight, I got up and sat on the seat. All the sets did not catch. Others had, maybe a skunk or a coon and if lucky a coyote. The catch was good so far. Uncle Walter was an expert marksman. He could shoot a skunk in the head and it wouldn't even throw the musk.

It was hard to remember where all the sets were. We had walked about a mile or so. Leland and Uncle Walter were walking together, ahead. They missed the set, but I found it. I had gotten about ten feet from the skunk, before I saw him. I was too late. I saw it coming, just before it hit me, in both eyes and the left side of my face, as well as on my Sunday clothes.

The pain in my eyes was excruciating. It was liquid fire. The stench was sickening. I could not see or breathe.

One minute I was walking along, happy and having a good time, the next I was in torment and abased. I was afraid I was blinded. I don't remember how long it was, before we got home or if we had

caught anymore fur, as I had suddenly lost all interest in trapping.

By the time we got home, the pain had subsided, some, and I could see a little. I began to try to get rid of the odor. I changed clothes, bathed, I even got a cake of Mama's homemade lye soap and scrubbed until I was raw.

I don't know how the family stayed in the house with me. I washed my clothes in gasoline. It did not help. I don't remember what I did with them. I know they were not worn for a long time.

I did not want to go to school, but I had to.

When the weather was damp, the odor was worse. The kids at school would say, "I smell a skunk, do you smell it, Emmett". I would say, "no I don't smell it," adding a lie to disobedience.

That was the most humiliating experience of my life. I was ashamed to go anywhere.

I didn't receive any punishment from my Dad. I guess he thought my bad experience was enough.

That was seventy years or more ago, and I remember it, as vividly as when it happened.

I don't know of anyone, who ever paid a more humiliating or painful price, as a result of disobedience.

In the winter of 1928 or 29, the price of fur was unusually good.

Walter Ellithorp and John Lee spent the winter on the old Jim Cooper place, north of the river and ran a trap line. They had an old buggy and team they used to run the line.

They lived in the vacant house that was on the place. There was a wood burning kitchen range, they used.

Horse feed was carried from home. There was a corral for the horses, so they had a good home, away from home.

Meantime Uncle Walter had retired the Old Maxwell and bought a new Chevrolet. They came home every weekend to get groceries and such supplies as needed.

They both liked to play dominoes, so that took care of the entertainment.

The catch was good and they had a very profitable season. They were the only professional trappers in the county, that I knew of.

That's the way it was.

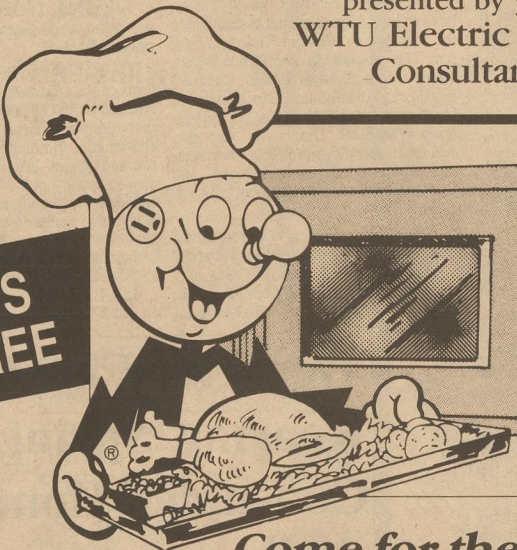

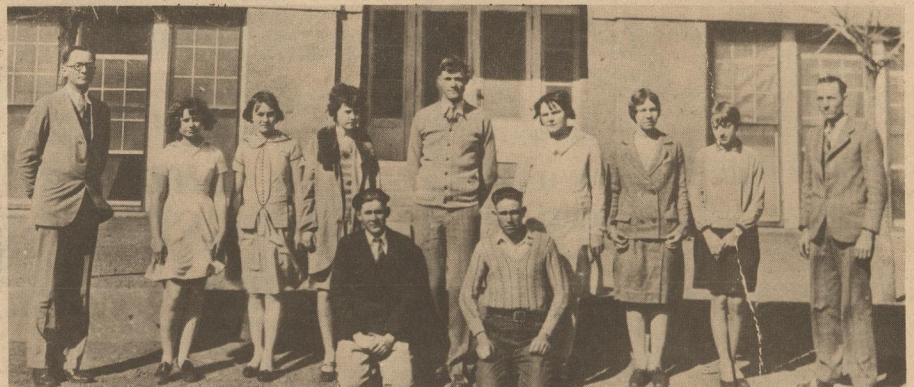

Whiteflat School, 1919-1920.

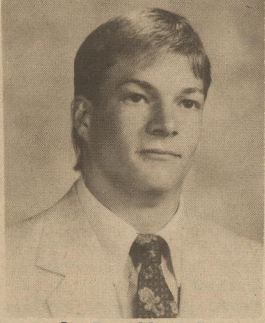

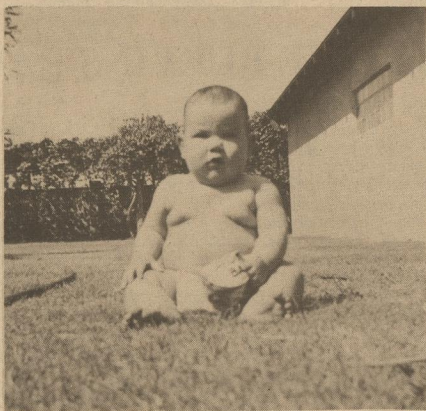

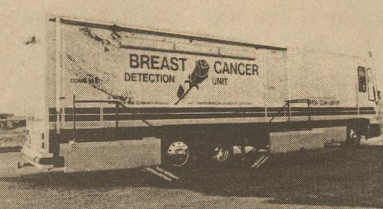
