 Week May 15-19The U.S. Postal Service has desig-
nated May 15-19 as "Mailbox Improvement Week.
"Each year a week in May is set aside oremind customers on rural, city motoramine and improve, where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes," says Roaring Springs Postmaster Lula Swim. "The purpose is to call attention to the need to provide mail receptacles that are,
conveniently located, safe to use, neat in. appearance and designed to protect the mail from the weather," Miss Swim continues.
There is not question that neat, atractive mail boxes improve the appearance of country roads and suburban streets. box Improvement Week means more than eye appeal.
"Say that an old dented box has sharp cutting edges or that the receptacle is too small, too hard to reach or made inaccessible by obstructions - in such cases, the
mail may be stamped undeliverable mail may be stamped undeliverable
and the customer would have to come to the post office to pick it up. We need the cooperation of our customers to maintain service at its highest level," says Miss
Swim.

Postal regulations require that rural and contract route carriers must have access to mailboxes without having to
leave their vehicles. $S$ uch boxes must
located on the right-hand side of the road in the carrier's direction of travel where traffic conditions would endanger a carrier driving to the left to reach the boxes The boxes also must be placed to con ions.
Customers are requested to remove bostructions - including vehicles, trashcans and snow - that make delivery diffiFor b
For both suburban curbline and rural
foadside boxes, the Postal Service quests a height of $31 / 2$ to 4 feet from the bottom of the box to ground level. The address should be clearly printed on the ecreptacle to assure more efficient deliv
There are approved traditional and contemporary mailbox designs. A cus-tomer-designed rural box needs the prior approval of the postmaster before it can
be installed be installed.
One last safety caution from the Postal
Service: Some mailbox supports are so massive (heavy metal posts, concrete farmequipment filled with concrete), they are damaging vehicles and causing serious injuries to people who accidently
strike them. The Federal Highway Adstrike them. The Federal Highway Ad-
