




Motley County Clinic to merge with Crosbyton Hospital

Dr Pat Williams stated that he will be available at all times to be with her when she sees patients until she receives her Texas license. The is now licensed in the state of Iowa. Mrs. Ream will be an employee of Crosbyton Clinic Hospital.

Mrs. Butler explained that the hospital hopes to be able to provide excellent services through the local clinic with plans of expanding the clinic's pharmacy with a better selection of medicine. The clinic will re-

main on a sliding-fee pay scale.

Mrs. Butler also stated that the hospital affiliation should enable the clinic to be able to accept more insurance, such as the insurance City of Matador, and Motley County employees have. One clinic employee stated that these people have found it necessary to seek medical care elsewhere. due to the fact that the clinic is not able to accept their insurance.

The hospital also has available for clinic use additional facilities such as oxygen, paramedics, and many other medical needs for clinic use.







## Shannon is coming.... Shannon Davidson Day July 11

Note: The third installment of a historically-based short story which commemorates Shannon Davidson's endurance ride. On the old Butterfield stagecoach route, exhausted riders and lame horses fall by the wayside, but the surviving competition whips the Flomot cowboy on through Texas, New Mexico and into Arizona.

After a real short night, his last in New Mexico, Davidson heads for Arizona and crosses the border near San Simon, well in advance of his nearest rivals. The new front-runners George Cates and King Kerley pass the faltering Usselton, while Davidson trots into Phoenix bareback. The fresher mount is unloaded and saddled up, and then they're off again.


Now in the lead by 65 miles, Davidson continues to set the pace. He takes to the road at 4 a.m. and spends the next 18 hours riding through the

The combination of the grueling pace, the long hours in the saddle on the tarmac, and the desert heat takes it toll on the bevy of men and animals. Thinking like race horse trainers trying to get an edge at the track, Davidson's crew clips the horses, leaving hair only on an area reserved for the saddle blanket. Rocket founders, possibly from sun stroke or perhaps heat exhaustion since he has little insulation from the searing sun. Suspiciously, the men anticipate foul play, even poisoning. The bets placed on the outcome of the race represent high stakes, and the prize money
